DIRECTIONS

To FAIRGROUNDS...

From Houston: IH 10W. Take Houston Street Exit. Turn Right on the first street (Commerce Street). At the light turn Right on Houston Street. At the next light turn right on AT&T Center Parkway.

From Kerrville: IH 10E to IH 35N. Take IH 35N to Walters Street/AT&T Center Parkway Exit. Cross Walters Street and go to AT&T Center Parkway. Turn Right on AT&T Center Parkway.

From Corpus Christi: IH 37N to IH 10E. Take IH 10E to the Houston Street Exit. Turn left on Houston Street and cross under I10. Continue across Commerce Street to AT&T Center Parkway. Turn right on AT&T Center Parkway.

From Blanco: 281 S to IH35N. Take IH35N to Walters Street/AT&T Center Parkway. Cross Walters Street and go to AT&T Center Parkway. Turn Right on AT&T Center Parkway.

To SAN ANTONIO STOCK SHOW & RODEO – SALADO CREEK PROPERTY (Livestock & Ag Mech Staging/Trailer Lot)...

From Fairgrounds East Gate: From the East Gate turn Left (North) onto AT&T Center Parkway. Turn Right just before the I-35 overpass and travel North on the Frontage Road (Do not merge onto I-35). Proceed approximately 1 mile and turn Right on the street (Pace Picante Place) located between S.W. Brake & Alignment and the Truck Accessory Outlet. Proceed over 3 sets of active railroad tracks and onto the lot. (3930 I-35 Frontage Road; San Antonio, Texas 78219)

To ESC-Region 20 (Ag Public Speaking Contest)...

From Fairgrounds East Gate: Turn Left out of the East Gate. Continue on AT&T Center Parkway to I-35. Turn Left onto the I-35 South Access Road. Turn Right onto Hines Ave. Region 20 will be on the Right at 1314 Hines Ave.

To GEMBLER LOT (Poultry Staging/Shuttle Parking)...

From Fairgrounds East Gate: Turn Left out of the East Gate onto AT&T Center Parkway. Turn Right onto Gembler Road. Gembler Lot will be on the Right with signage.

To COLORADO BOXED BEEF CO. (Meat Judging Contest)...

From Fairgrounds East Gate: Turn Left out of the East Gate. Turn right onto Gembler Rd. Turn left onto Creekview Dr. Turn right onto Profit Dr. The warehouse is on the left at 4231 Profit Drive, Suite A.

To NATIONAL SHOOTING COMPLEX (Junior Shoot-Out and Wildlife Recreation & Management Contest)...

From Fairgrounds East Gate: Turn Right out of the East Gate. At the first street, turn Left onto Houston Street toward I-10. Enter the ramp onto I-10 West. Merge onto Hwy. 90 West. Continue on Hwy 90 West and merge onto Stotzer Parkway/Hwy 151 toward Sea World. Stay straight to go onto 1604 Loop North. Turn Left onto Culebra Road (FM 471). Turn Left onto Roft Road. The complex is on the right at 5931 Roft Road.

SHOW SCHEDULE TERMINOLOGY

Arrival*: The term "Arrival" shall refer to the time at which animal and ag mechanics projects (projects) may arrive at Salado Creek Property. **All Projects must arrive at Salado Creek Property, except Poultry (Gembler), before entering East Gate (Gate E).** Exhibitors will be given further directions on stalling and unloading procedures upon arrival.

*The front gate to the Salado Creek Property will be open twenty-four hours a day for exhibitors' access. Trailer processing will begin prior to Barn Unload beginning.

Arrival Deadline: The term "Arrival Deadline" shall refer to the time at which Projects <u>must</u> have arrived at Salado Creek Property. Projects not having arrived at Salado Creek Property by the Arrival Deadline of the respective show/contest are subject to disqualification.

Exhibitor Check-In: The term "Exhibitor Check-In" shall refer to the time allotted for exhibitors to provide necessary information (ex. Registration Papers, Animal Entry info, Disposition Cards, etc.) to Show Management for their respective show/contest. Some shows may require exhibitors to input animal information into an online check-in, personal device QR code or kiosk system. *Exhibitors who fail to complete the check-in requirements for their respective show/contest are subject to disqualification.*

Late Arrival: The term "Late Arrival" shall refer to rare exceptions to the Arrival Deadline approved exclusively by Show Management. Exhibitors should contact the Competitive Events Office at 210-225-0575 prior to the arrival deadline of the respective show to request a Late Arrival. When requesting a Late Arrival, be prepared to provide the following information:

Exhibitor's Name(s) Number of Head

Club or Chapter Truck Information (make, model, color, license plate)

Project Type Trailer Information (type, length, color, license plate)

Breed Expected time of arrival

Release: The term "Release" shall refer to the time at which exhibitors may remove their Projects and tack from the grounds. Projects removed prior to the Release time are subject to disqualification and forfeiture of all premiums and awards. No livestock may exit the grounds between 10 PM and 7 AM.

San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo – Salado Creek Property: The term "Salado Creek Property" or "SCP" shall refer to the area located at 3930 I-35 Frontage Road; San Antonio, Texas 78219 dedicated to receiving and staging Projects. No animal projects may be unloaded at Salado Creek Property at any time. Each vehicle must have a representative who remains at Salado Creek Property at all times. No open flames or BBQ pits will be allowed at the Salado Creek Property. Personnel at Salado Creek Property may move exhibitor trailers as necessary.

Tack Vehicles: The term "Tack Vehicle" shall refer to any vehicle or vehicle/trailer combination associated with animal projects transporting tack/equipment only. Tack vehicles must obtain a staging credential before entering the East Gate (Gate E). Show Management reserves the right to determine what constitutes an acceptable tack truck.

Significant Changes and Updates for 2024

• Premium List to be released October 1, 2023 – Please read and if you have any questions, contact us.

• REMINDERS:

- o **Bedding:** NO OUTSIDE BEDDING WILL BE ALLOWED.
 - NO cedar fiber allowed to be used in the Cattle Barn.
 - ➤ Shredded cardboard and cedar fiber will still be used for Angora goats.
- o If you want to stall together, you must arrive at Salado Creek Property together.
- o There will be no pre-stalling for market lambs and goats.
- Exhibitor Campgrounds: Campground space will be extremely limited for most shows. Parents, CEAs, ASTs, adult leaders or their representatives are asked to assist in reducing the number of chairs from their respective county or chapter. No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Livestock Barns. Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes. Exhibitors must be aware of their surroundings and cognizant of others when making space for their campgrounds. Exhibitors abusing campground areas will be subject to disqualification.
- o SCHEDULE There are a few changes. Check it out.

GILTS –

- All Purebred gilts must have been farrowed between <u>June</u> 1 (not July) and September 15, 2023 inclusive. In 2024, Purebred gilt classes will be broken and shown by <u>weight</u>. Range: 200 350 lbs with 15-lb weigh-back.
- o The Crossbred Gilts will follow this same weight range of 200 350 lbs with a 15-lb weigh back.
- o We will add <u>Hereford</u> gilts to our 2024 Junior Purebred Breeding Gilt Show. We would like to get an idea of how popular this breed may be in our show, but we do not want to prevent anyone from bringing two gilts of breeds currently eligible for scholarships. Therefore, we will allow exhibitors to enter a maximum of three (3) head in the Junior Purebred Gilt Show, BUT AT LEAST ONE (1) AND NO MORE THAN TWO (2) MUST BE A HEREFORD GILT. This will be enforced at Check-in. If anyone is found violating this rule, ALL entries will be disqualified. Hereford Gilts will not be eligible for a scholarship in 2024, but Premiums will be awarded.
- o Additionally, we will be working with the swine registries to DNA test, at minimum, Breed and Reserve Breed Champions in the Purebred Gilt Show.

ANGORA GOATS –

- o Angora Goats will show on Sunday, February 11th @ 8 am
- o Bucks (Kid, Yearling, Aged) will be allowed to enter.

BREEDING HEIFERS –

- o Split Hereford/Polled Hereford Heifers & Grey/Red Brahman Heifers Scholarships offered to each breed.
- o Any Simbrah heifers designated "*Simbrah" will be required to be shown in the ARB classes.
- MARKET TURKEY TOMS Top 15 Market Turkey Toms will be sold in the Junior Livestock Auction
- MARKET STEERS Split Hereford/Polled Hereford Steers (3 classes each; Herefords 1st 3rd & Polled Herefords 1st 2nd make the Junior Livestock Auction)
- **COMMERCIAL STEERS** Initial Weight: Aug. 26 Sept. 1 & Final Weight: Jan. 26 Feb. 1; Record Books must be mailed by UPS/FedEx and posted by February 3, 2024.

- FOOD CHALLENGE Will move to a TEAM COMPETITION in <u>2025</u>.
- HORSE SKILLATHON Will now be under Competitive Events and will be entered through our Online Entry System.
- **PHOTOGRAPHY CONTEST** Will move to all DIGITAL photo submissions. No mounted photos will be accepted.

PREMIUM PASSES

- o 40 Premium Passes will be offered during the Breeding Sheep & Goat Arrival
- 20 Premium Passes will be offered for Breeding Heifer Wave 1 and Wave 2 as well as Market Steer Wave 1 and Wave 2.
- o All Premium Passes <u>must</u> be purchased during the ONLINE ENTRY PROCESS. Closes December 15th, 2023.

ALL SHEEP & GOAT SHOWS (BREEDING/COMMERCIAL & MARKET)

- o Free-standing head-stanchions and fitting mats of any kind will ONLY be allowed to be set up inside of the pens.
- O Pens will not be taken apart or altered in any way without Superintendent approval. Any approved alterations, must be back in original place before departure.
- **CATTLE STALLS** Front and end panels may be covered, but there will be no panels or covering behind the cattle without Superintendent approval.
- **GOAT/SHEEP/SWINE PENS** Pens may be lined on 3 sides at panel height only. Nothing may cover the gate or over the pen.
- SCRAPIE TAGS No scrapie tags will be allowed in any market lambs or goats. Only the Texas Validation and TLBA/TGBA tag will be allowed in the ear of Market Lambs & Goats. All other tags will be removed. If the Scrapie tag is removed, it will be linked to the Texas Validation tag number by agreement with Texas Animal Health Commission and Texas Lamb & Goat Validation.
- **JUNIOR AG MECHANICS** Welding Contest will be added in 2024. More details to come.
- **JUNIOR SHOOT-OUT** Entry Fee increase American Trap & American Trap Doubles \$125 each; Sporting Clays \$150
- **NEW ITEMS** Cattle Barn will have all new bleachers in 2024.
- ENTRY SYSTEM Please make sure all information is updated for your exhibitors prior to Sept 1, 2023 or those exhibitors will be removed from the entry system.
- **PARKING PASSES** LS1/LS2 Parking Pass fee increase
 - Open Show Exhibitors: Each exhibitor may purchase up to three Parking Passes for the week they are showing. Week 1 Parking Passes may be purchased at time of entry through the Competitive Events Entry System ONLY.
 - <u>Junior Show Exhibitors</u>: Each exhibitor may purchase <u>one</u> Parking Pass for each week they are showing. Week 1 and/or Week 2 Parking Passes may be purchased at time of entry through the Competitive Events Entry System ONLY.
 - <u>Club/Chapters:</u> Each Club/Chapter will be issued <u>one</u> free Parking Pass valid for each week exhibitors are showing for the AST/CEA or CTE/STEM Director to supervise projects. Each Club/Chapter will have the option to purchase up to three additional Parking Passes per week for additional AST/CEA or CTE/STEM Directors who will be supervising projects. Each judging team will receive <u>one</u> (1) free Day Parking Pass valid for date of contest.

- & Rodeo has been working to reduce the time required for the Junior Market Lamb and Barrow Auctions. These auctions have typically lasted until midnight or the early morning hours which has been difficult for exhibitors/parents and buyers. We know this decision will be met with varying emotions from folks glad they didn't have to drive back for the sale and spend more on fuel, meals and lodging; and there will be those who would prefer the status quo with the opportunity to walk the sale. Please know we want to do what we feel is best for our exhibitors and our buyers. Therefore, we will be starting the Goat and Poultry Auctions earlier. In turn, the Lamb and Barrow Auctions will start earlier and we are reducing the lots required to walk through the following Lamb and Barrow Auctions by 56 and 92, respectively. This should allow the auctions to conclude at a more reasonable time. We are not reducing the number of animals that qualify for the sale. The "non-walking" lots will receive a minimum base amount plus any add-ons received similar to all other lots in the auction. All sale lots will be subject to potential allocations of any surplus revenue at the conclusion of all of our Junior Livestock Auctions. Again, we know there will be differing opinions on this decision, but we expect the end result to be an overall positive for the exhibitors, buyers and the Show as a whole.
 - SALE LOTS: Refer to each individual species' Special Rules to determine how many placings from each class will make the sale. 1,012 lots will sell: 35 pens of broilers, 35 turkey hens, 15 turkey toms, 108 goats, 254 lambs, 346 barrows and 219 steers.
 - ATTENDANCE:
 - WALKING LOTS: All walking, sale-making exhibitors are encouraged to be present on Sale Day.
 Substitute exhibitors will be allowed with proper paperwork submitted through the Competitive Events Office.
 - o NON-WALKING LOTS: Youth exhibitors with non-walking, sale-making lots do not attend the auction. A guaranteed-base amount of \$1,500 will be awarded to each exhibitor of non-walking lots along with any funds generated through the Add-On Portal for that respective lot.
 - Junior Market Lamb Auction All exhibitors with 7th through 9th place lambs are non-walking lots.
 - Junior Market Barrow Auction All exhibitors with 5th through 6th place barrows are non-walking lots.

GENERAL RULES

Junior Show Entry Deadline: December 1, 2023

The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo is committed to the humane treatment of all animals exhibited. Every reasonable precaution is taken to promote the animals' safety and well-being. The production practices in the livestock industry are based on good principles of animal husbandry. No one has a greater economic stake in the welfare of animals than the livestock producers and organizations involved in the promotion of agriculture.

Civil Authority Evacuation

The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, along with all other large venue and public gathering places and events around the country, has been advised by Federal, State, and Local Authorities that an emergency evacuation of the premises may be ordered by any of those authorities at any time. This decision would be driven by information available to those authorities that (1) may not be available to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, or classified by the authorities, and therefore the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo could not share it with our exhibitors; (2) could arise out of an actual or threatened act of terrorism; (3) or arise from any number of other public safety concerns the authorities have for the safety of the public at our show.

If an evacuation order occurs, you will be asked to leave the premises immediately. Your cooperation is not only required by law but for your own safety and the safety of other members of the public at the show. San Antonio Police Department (SAPD) and San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo uniformed Police Officers will direct the evacuation. We are further advised that any evacuation will be for persons only and no other property, animals, trailers or anything but your immediate means of transportation will be allowed off the premises. This is for the purpose of achieving the most timely and efficient clearing of the public from the threatened area. Do not attempt to load personal property, merchandise, animals, or anything but yourself and your family and friends into your vehicle and leave the premises immediately.

The evacuation plan calls for certain, designated Law Enforcement personnel, San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo management, and maintenance personnel to remain on the Show Grounds to secure the premises.

In the unfortunate event this occurs, the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo will do everything possible to care for personal property, animals, commercial exhibitors' merchandise, etc. until the authorities remove the evacuation order and you are allowed back onto the Show Grounds. No one will be allowed back on to the Grounds until the authorities issue that order. San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Police and SAPD will enforce the order strictly and in accordance with instructions from the authorities.

Your entry and participation in the 2024 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo is conditioned on your understanding and agreement that none of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. ("S.A.L.E."); Bexar County, Texas ("County"); Bexar County Community Arenas Board ("CAB"); Community Arena Management ("CAM"); San Antonio Spurs, LLC ("Spurs"), or their respective Directors, Officers or Employees shall have any liability whatsoever for any loss, damage, destruction or personal injury to any exhibitors or patrons or their personal property, merchandise or animals during or after such an event, particularly with respect to an evacuation of the premises in the event of an emergency.

Important Definitions:

Arrival*: The term "Arrival" shall refer to the time at which animal and agricultural mechanics projects (projects) may arrive at the Salado Creek Property or other designated official location. All projects must arrive at Salado Creek Property or other designated official location before entering East Gate. Exhibitors will be given further directions on stalling and unloading procedures upon arrival. NOTE: There will be no RV Campers/Trailers allowed onto Salado Creek Property.

Exhibitor Check-In: The term "Exhibitor Check-In" shall refer to the time allotted for exhibitors to provide necessary information (ex. Animal ID, Weight, Breed, Registration Papers, Disposition Cards, etc.) to Show Management for their respective show/contest. Some shows may require exhibitors to input animal information into an online check-in, personal device QR code or kiosk system. Exhibitors who fail to complete the check-in requirements for their respective show/contest are subject to disqualification.

Project: The term "project" shall be defined as any animal, agricultural mechanics project, agricultural science fair project or any entry competing in the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Competitive Events Show.

S.A.L.E.: The term "S.A.L.E." means San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. and includes all of S.A.L.E.'s officers, directors, volunteers, veterinarians, agents, employees and members, as well as all of its affiliates, subsidiaries, successors and assigns. As used in paragraphs 7a and 7b, "S.A.L.E." also includes Bexar County, Texas; Bexar County Community Arenas Board; Community Arena Management; San Antonio Spurs, LLC; and their respective officers, directors, managers, volunteers, agents, employees and members. S.A.L.E. is sometimes referred to in these Rules as the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.

Show Management: The term "Show Management" shall be defined as any full-time staff member of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, show/contest Superintendent or volunteer leader within the Livestock, Ag Mechanics, Junior Shoot-Out, Calf Scramble or Western Art Committees.

Tack Vehicle: The term "Tack Vehicle" shall refer to any vehicle or vehicle/trailer combination associated with animal projects transporting tack/equipment only. Tack vehicles must obtain a staging credential before entering the East Gate (Gate E). Vehicles not meeting this description will not be allowed onto the Salado Creek Property or through the East Gate (Gate E) for unloading. Show Management reserves the right to determine what constitutes an acceptable tack vehicle.

AST: Agricultural Science Teacher (FFA Supervisor)

CEA: County Extension Agent (4-H Supervisor)

CTE/STEM Director: School CTE/STEM Program Supervisor

Club/Chapter: County 4-H Club, FFA Chapter or CTE/STEM Program

- 1. Interpretation and Violation of Rules: Exhibitors are requested to report any rule violation to Show Management immediately so that appropriate action may be taken. S.A.L.E. reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules, and to settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of or connected with, or incident to, the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo; and to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. Any exhibitor who violates any of the rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as S.A.L.E. may order.
- 2. Special Rules: Special Rules are published in any department where necessary. If there is a conflict between the Special Rules and the General Rules, Show Management will make a ruling as to such conflict, which shall be binding and final.
- **3. Decisions:** The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases, except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at or before the time of award, is proven. Any objections to a judge must be submitted in writing to Show Management prior to the event in question.

- 4. Official Protests: Official Protests must be submitted in writing to the Livestock Office and accompanied by a \$300.00 deposit, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. The protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, giving good and sufficient reasons therefore, and must be delivered to Show Management immediately upon the occasion for such protest. Any protest not officially filed within 24 hours of the alleged incident will not be considered. These cases are referred to the Executive Director & CEO, who will have full power to act, and from whose decision there can be no appeal. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation.
- **5. Disqualification:** Should any project, contestant or team awarded a prize be disqualified, the lower placing project, contestant or team will not move into the higher position unless noted in Special Rules.

6. COVID-19 Safety Information, Duty to Self-Monitor and Assumption of the Risk:

All Exhibitors, their family members and other related persons participating in the livestock events or ongrounds at S.A.L.E.'s facilities shall comply with all health and safety orders, rules and guidelines related to COVID-19 promulgated by the State of Texas, County of Bexar, City of San Antonio, CDC and S.A.L.E. While participating in SALE events "social distancing" must be practiced and face coverings worn in strict compliance with local health regulations and ordinances to reduce the risks of exposure to COVID-19 as well as wash hands frequently, use hand sanitizer or antibacterial wipes, maintain social distancing and submit to non-invasive body temperature measurement. Any person presenting a body temperature above the temperature threshold designated by local health officials, will not be permitted to participate in the events or be on property at the S.A.L.E.'s facilities.

- a. Safety Information: Because COVID-19 is extremely contagious and is spread mainly from person-to-person contact, SALE has put in place preventative measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19. However, SALE cannot guarantee that its participants, volunteers, partners or others in attendance will not become infected with COVID-19.
 - In light of the ongoing spread of COVID-19, individuals who fall within any of the categories below should not engage in SALE events or other face to face fundraising activities. By attending a SALE event, you certify that you do not fall into any of the following categories:
 - i. Individuals who currently or within the past fourteen (14) days have experienced any symptoms associated with COVID-19, which include fever, cough and shortness of breath among others;
 - **ii.** Individuals who believe that they may have been exposed to a confirmed or suspected case of COVID-19 or have been diagnosed with COVID-19 and are not yet cleared as non-contagious by state or local public health authorities or the health care team responsible for their treatment.
- b. Duty to Self-Monitor: Participants and volunteers agree to self-monitor for signs and symptoms of COVID-19 (symptoms typically include fever, cough, and shortness of breath) and, contact SALE at (210) 225-5851 if he/she experiences symptoms of COVID-19 within 14 days after participating or volunteering with SALE.
- **c. Assumption of the Risk:** I acknowledge and understand the following:
 - i. Participation includes possible exposure to and illness from infectious diseases including but not limited to COVID-19. While particular rules and personal discipline may reduce this risk, the risk of serious illness and death does exist;
 - **ii.** I knowingly and freely assume all such risks related to illness and infectious diseases, such as COVID- 19, even if arising from the negligence or fault of the Released Parties; and
 - **iii.** I hereby knowingly assume the risk of injury, harm and loss associated with the Activity, including any injury, harm and loss caused by the negligence, fault or conduct of any kind on the part of the Released Parties.

7. Liability:

- a. All exhibits will be under the control and direction of the hosting organization, but S.A.L.E. shall not be responsible or liable for any loss, injury or damage which may occur. The exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or property exhibited by him/her, and for its description in the Premium List. All owners and persons in charge of property or animals shall care for, guard, protect and preserve the same, as S.A.L.E. does not undertake any obligation to do so and shall not be held responsible for any loss, shrinkage or damage to such property, animals or any owners or exhibitors thereof.
- b. <u>RELEASE AND INDEMNITY:</u> EACH EXHIBITOR, BY ENTERING OR EXHIBITING A PROJECT AT THE SAN ANTONIO STOCK SHOW & RODEO:

EXHIBITOR HEREBY INDEMNIFIES, RELEASES AND HOLDS HARMLESS, AND AGREES TO DEFEND, S.A.L.E., COUNTY, CAB, CAM AND SPURS, AND EACH OF THEIR RESPECTIVE DIRECTORS, OFFICERS, MANAGERS, PARTNERS (GENERAL AND LIMITED), EMPLOYEES, OWNERS, INVITEES, AGENTS, SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS (COLLECTIVELY, THE "RELEASED PARTIES") FROM AND AGAINST ANY DEMANDS, CAUSES OF ACTION, PROCEEDINGS, FINES, PENALTIES, LOSSES, LIABILITIES, DAMAGES, COSTS, EXPENSES (INCLUDING REASONABLE ATTORNEYS' FEES) OR CLAIMS FOR INJURIES TO PERSONS, INCLUDING DEATH, OR DAMAGE TO PROPERTY (COLLECTIVELY, "LIABILITIES") TO WHICH THE RELEASED PARTIES, OR ANY OF THEM, MAY BECOME SUBJECT, WHICH ARISE FROM OR IN CONNECTION WITH, OR IN ANY WAY RELATE TO (I) ANY BREACH BY EXHIBITOR OF ANY OF THE TERMS OF THIS AGREEMENT; (II) ANY ACT OR OMISSION BY EXHIBITOR OR ANY OF ITS AGENTS, EMPLOYEES, INDEPENDENT CONTRACTORS, INVITEES OR GUESTS, INCLUDING ANY NEGLIGENT ACT OR OMISSION OR WILLFUL MISCONDUCT; OR (III) EXHIBITOR'S PARTICIPATION IN, INVOLVEMENT WITH OR ATTENDANCE AT ANY S.A.L.E. EVENT, OR EXHIBITOR'S ENGAGING IN A FARM ANIMAL ACTIVITY AS DEFINED IN SECTION 87.001 OF THE TEXAS CIVIL PRACTICE AND REMEDIES CODE, INCLUDING ALL SUCH LIABILITIES RESULTING FROM THE ALLEGED OR ACTUAL NEGLIGENCE OF S.A.L.E. OR ANY OF THE OTHER RELEASED PARTIES. EXHIBITOR HEREBY ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES THAT THE FOREGOING INDEMNITY AND RELEASE PROVISIONS INCLUDE INDEMNIFICATION AND RELEASE BY EXHIBITOR FROM AND AGAINST THE RELEASED PARTIES' OWN **NEGLIGENCE.**

8. Entry Rules

- **a. Eligibility:** Competition is open to the world, with the exception of the Junior Show (See Junior Show Rules). This is an invitational livestock show; S.A.L.E. reserves the right to extend or withhold an invitation to any exhibitor or associated person(s).
- b. Junior Show Entry: Entries are not considered complete unless they have been submitted online on or before December 1, 2023. If payment is being mailed, it must be postmarked on or before December 8, 2023. Incomplete entries (entries not submitted online by the appropriate date) will be assessed an additional 10% fee.
 - i. Late Entries: For any Junior Show entries submitted online from December 2-15, 2023, all standard entry fees will be doubled, if accepted. Junior Shoot-out entries will be assessed a \$50/event late fee instead of double.
 - ii. Past Due Entries: For any Junior Show entries postmarked or received from December 16, 2023 until the end of exhibitor check-in for the respective show or contest, a late entry fee of \$250 per entry will be assessed, if accepted. No past due Junior Shoot-Out entries will be accepted December 16, 2023 or after.
 - iii. Show Management may turn away any late entry without explanation.

- c. Open Show Entry: Entries are not considered complete unless they have been submitted online on or before December 1, 2023. Incomplete entries (entries not submitted online or postmarked by the appropriate date) will be assessed an additional 10% fee.
 - i. Late Entries: For any Open Show entries submitted online and postmarked from December 2, 2023–January 15, 2024, all standard entry fees will be doubled, if accepted.
 - ii. Late Entries: For any Open Show entries postmarked or received from January 16, 2024 until the end of exhibitor check-in for the respective show or contest, a late entry fee of \$100 per entry will be assessed, if accepted.
 - iii. Show Management may turn away any late entry without explanation.
- **d. Entry Forms:** Application for entry must be submitted online. Junior Show Entry Agreement, Group Class Entry Forms, Late Entry Forms and other important documents can be found at https://www.sarodeo.com/p/about/livestock-show (Photocopying forms is acceptable, however all signatures must be original).
- e. Mailing: Please mail the following items to the Competitive Events Department.

 - Payment (Check from Club/Chapter account, Cashier's Check, Money Order) *No Personal Checks will be accepted. Credit card payments are accepted via the online entry system.

ii. Open Show:

All entry information and payment must be submitted online. Nothing is required to be mailed to the Competitive Events office.

The right is reserved to reject entirely or accept conditionally any entry and to refuse any accepted entry admittance to the Grounds.

f. Entry Fees: An entry is not valid until it is paid in full. If the check accompanying entries should be returned by the bank for any reason, the entry will be cancelled and returned. There will be a \$35.00 service charge on all returned checks. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo has the right to ban any exhibitor or club/chapter from future participation should there be a continuous problem with fees from exhibitor or club/chapter.

Parking Passes

Parking Passes must be fully affixed to the windshield. Partially applied, laminated, wrapped, or taped stickers are not valid. Failure to comply will result in confiscation of Parking Pass and loss of parking privileges. Parking Passes will NOT be sold at the Competitive Events/Livestock Office in 2024.

Open Show Exhibitors: Each exhibitor may purchase <u>up to three</u> Parking Passes for the week they are showing. Week 1 Parking Passes may be purchased at time of entry through the Competitive Events Entry System ONLY.

<u>Junior Show Exhibitors</u>: Each exhibitor may purchase <u>one</u> Parking Pass for each week they are showing. Week 1 and/or Week 2 Parking Passes may be purchased at time of entry through the Competitive Events Entry System ONLY.

<u>Club/Chapters:</u> Each Club/Chapter will be issued <u>one</u> free Parking Pass valid for each week exhibitors are showing for the AST/CEA or CTE/STEM Director to supervise projects. Each Club/Chapter will have the option to purchase up to three additional Parking Passes per week for additional AST/CEA or CTE/STEM Directors who will be supervising projects. Each judging team will receive <u>one</u> (1) free Parking Pass valid for date of contest.

Premium Passes

The Premium Pass is an optional pass designed to assist exhibitors who work with others to consolidate their animals into fewer trailers. Purchasers of the Premium Pass will receive access to a more expedited arrival process. Premium Pass includes separate arrival and staging lanes that allow exhibitors to bypass traditional staging lines at the Salado Creek Property. Premium Passes are not substitutes for any other Parking Pass as privileges do not extend beyond the Salado Creek Property. Premium Passes will be available for purchase by AST/CEA via the online entry system (up to the maximum limit) on a first-come, first-serve basis *up to December 15, 2024*. The Premium Pass is **NON-TRANSFERABLE, NON-REFUNDABLE** and is available for the following arrivals only:

Salado Creek Property

A Premium Pass Set (1 Livestock & 1 Tack) is valid at the Salado Creek Property for one vehicle/trailer hauling livestock and one tack vehicle/trailer. When arriving at the Salado Creek Property, the Premium Pass hangtag/permit must be hanging from the rear-view mirror or displayed on the driver's side dashboard of each respective vehicle. Drivers should follow signage and receive further instruction from volunteers. Expedited arrival services do <u>not</u> extend beyond the Salado Creek Property. **NOTE: There will be no RV Campers/Trailers allowed onto Salado Creek Property.**

Minimum Head per Trailer Requirements

Fundamental to the Premium Pass concept, minimum head-per-trailer requirements will be strictly enforced. Any combination of Junior Breeding Gilts and Crossbred Gilts may be used to meet Breeding Gilt requirement. If different species arrive on one trailer (ex. Junior Market Barrows + Junior Breeding Heifers), the trailer must meet the minimum head-per-trailer requirement for at least one specie. (i.e. 5 Breeding Gilts, 5 Market Goats, 5 Market Lambs, 3 Junior Heifers, 5 Market Barrows). No animals will be allowed on the tack trailer. **Those not meeting stated requirements will void the Premium Pass and be assigned to the end of the staging line.**

Stalling

Exhibitors will be stalled upon arrival. Groups wishing to be stalled together <u>must</u> arrive at the Salado Creek Property together. All vehicles in the group must have a Premium Pass. Those without a Premium Pass will be assigned to the end of the traditional staging lanes. The Premium Pass does not grant any additional stalling considerations.

- 10. Unloading: In order to expedite the unloading process, exhibitors are asked to follow all directions related to arrival at SCP and Grounds. Once on Grounds, exhibitors must follow unloading directions by volunteers and security. Any resistance or failure to follow instructions by the driver will make any animals on that trailer subject to disqualification. Exhibitors taking an excessive amount of time to unload will be warned and given a deadline to complete unloading. Those failing to meet the deadline may be subject to removal by tow truck at the discretion of SALE staff and volunteer committee leadership at the vehicle owner's expense.
- **11. Parking:** Livestock Exhibitor parking will be in Lots 6 & 7 (Gate G). Overflow parking will be available, if necessary. **NOTE:** There will be <u>NO</u> Livestock Exhibitor Parking permitted in Lot 5.
- 12. **Project/Animal Substitution:** Substitutions are to be made only in the Competitive Events/Livestock Office or directly to the show Superintendent, unless otherwise announced. Substitutions not officially recorded in this manner are invalid. Substitutions will not be permitted once Check-In is complete. Substitution Forms must be filled out completely. Registration Certificates will be required to verify ownership. Substitution of owners is not permitted. Substitution Forms are located on the website at Livestock Show (sarodeo.com).

Animal/project substitutions mailed to the Competitive Events Office and postmarked by January 15, 2024 = No Charge. Substitutions made <u>after</u> January 15, 2024 = \$100.

SUBSTITUTIONS MAY ONLY BE MADE WITHIN THE SAME DEPARTMENT (Otherwise it is considered a separate entry and will be charged a late entry fee).

- **13. Refunds:** There will be no refund of fees. In the event of cancellation of a specific contest/show, refunds may be offered in-partial or in-full, and will be determined solely by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.
- 14. Premiums: Premium monies will be distributed by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. In some cases, premium checks may be held until all funds from all sources are received by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Auction checks will be issued by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Junior Livestock Auction and may be mailed separate from premium checks or commission (floor) checks to the 4-H or FFA address. If premium and/or auction checks are reissued for any reason a \$35 fee per check will be subtracted from the premium/auction total.
- **15. Barred Exhibitors:** The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, in cooperation with member shows of the North American Livestock Show and Rodeo Managers Association Rule Infraction Database, reserves the right to refuse entry of any exhibitor who has been barred from any other show on the basis of unethical practices.
- **16. Ownership Requirements:** All animals must be entered in the name of the owner(s) as shown on the Original Registration Certificate.
- 17. **Breeding Animals:** Animals in the breeding classes (with the exception of Crossbred Gilts, Commercial Ewes and Commercial Does) must be recorded or accepted for record in the Herdbook of their Association. Exhibitor must give the following: (a) owner's name; (b) mailing address; (c) breed; (d) name; (e) registration number; (f) sex; (g) birthdate; (h) sire name; and (i) dam name of the animal. If any of this information is not given, the entry will not be accepted unless otherwise stated in individual Department Rules.
- 18. Stalling: Insofar as possible, shelter will be provided for projects. The Show does not charge a stall fee in barns and does not guarantee stall space to any entry. Stalling will be based on the number of eligible projects arriving at the SCP and not the number of original project entries. Stalls will be assigned upon arrival at the Salado Creek Property Staging Office. Certain stalling requests in extenuating circumstances may be granted, but no other general stalling requests will be considered. Exhibitors found deliberately attempting to gain more stalls than appropriate will be subject to punishment from Show Management including, but not limited to, disqualification, removal from the Grounds, banning from future competition, etc. No early arrivals are allowed without permission from the Competitive Events/Livestock Office.
- 19. Erroneous Entry: Projects that have been erroneously entered may be transferred to the proper class prior to judging and upon application to the Superintendent, who will determine the matter. If such classes have been judged they shall not be reopened. No project shall be changed from one class to another after the Check-In unless it is ineligible for the class in which it is entered. In some cases, the project may be disqualified.
- 20. Sifting/Classifying Committees: Breed Associations and/or the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo may appoint Sifters and Classifiers to inspect projects. Projects may be reassigned or disqualified based on the decisions of Sifters and Classifiers. Decisions of the Sifters and/or Classifiers will be final and protests will not be considered. Interference with Sifters and/or Classifiers will not be tolerated. Exhibitors and others are requested not to question their decisions, and to do so may disqualify the exhibitor concerned.
- 21. Judging: Exhibitors are responsible for knowing the times at which their projects will be judged. Any project not presented promptly will be ruled ineligible and barred from competition, and in the case of a Market Barrow, Broiler, Goat, Hen, Lamb or Tom will be required to take the animal immediately to the floor buyer. No complaint or protest on the Grounds that the judge overlooked projects will be considered.
- 22. Interference: If any exhibitor or associated person(s), in any way, whether in person or by agent, or servant, interferes with the judges during their adjudication, or shows any disrespect to them or the show, is subject to be penalized. Show Management may demand a proper apology from the exhibitor, may exclude him/her from competition, bar him/her from the Grounds, and may also withhold any prizes that may have been awarded.
- 23. Restraint / Unruly Animals: Exhibitor and patron safety are a top priority. Therefore, Show Management or Livestock Committee Leadership/Ring Stewards may remove any unruly animal from the show and/or the Grounds at any time; there will be no appeal. Cattle must be shown with halter and be sufficiently gentle to be properly handled by one attendant. If exhibition of a project poses a danger to the exhibitor and/or other parties, Show Management reserves the right to allow a substitute exhibitor or remove the project from competition. In some cases, projects may be instructed to be removed from the Grounds.

- **24. Show Equipment:** Livestock shows provide an opportunity for the general public to be exposed to agricultural exhibits. Exhibitors should be mindful of the show equipment being used and the manner in which it is being used. Show Management or Livestock Committee Leadership/Ring Stewards reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor. <u>Cable halters and pronged chains are prohibited for all species.</u>
- 25. Release: No project may be removed from the Grounds prior to posted Release Times and/or Announcement. All livestock must remain in stalls or pens until their designated release time. There will be no early release of projects unless the Superintendent says otherwise. Anyone attempting to load projects before their release time may have their truck and/or trailer towed away. No livestock may exit the Grounds between 10:00 PM 7:00 AM. Any violation of release times will cause the forfeiture of all premium and/or auction monies earned, and the exhibitor may be barred from future participation.
- 26. Photographs: Exhibitors agree to present their project(s) at the request of show officials for official photographs. All photographs taken by the official photographer(s) become the property of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Unofficial (i.e. personal) photographs may not be published without written approval of Show Management. Exhibitors wishing to purchase photographs must contact the Official Show Photographer. Note: All animals qualifying for the Junior Livestock Auction are required to have their photograph taken for the Add-on Portal. Those individuals who do not fulfill this responsibility will forfeit the use of a photo on the site.
 - Commercial photography and filming are often conducted at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. You may be depicted in photographs or video recordings of any San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo event, and by entering the Grounds and/or competitive events associated with the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, you consent to the use of any depictions in connection with advertising, news reporting, public relations, webcasts or other broadcasts, or any other activities relating to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, and you further release and waive all claims for compensation and any rights of review and approval, copyright, and right of publicity with respect thereto.
- 27. **Project Care:** Exhibitors must remain in charge of their project(s) and care for them for the duration of the show at all times. If needed, the exhibitor may have a competent caretaker (must be an immediate family member of the exhibitor, other 4-H/FFA member, or AST/CEA) care for the project(s). However, the exhibitor is the absolute insurer of and is responsible for the condition of their animal/project(s). Show Management reserves the right to decide what constitutes acceptable treatment of animal projects. Unacceptable treatment of animal projects will not be tolerated and could result in immediate disqualification of the exhibitor along with his or her club/chapter.
- 28. Project/Animal Care/Security: All owners or persons in charge of property, or livestock, shall care for, guard, protect, and preserve same, as the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo does not undertake to do so, and it shall not be held responsible for any loss, shrinkage, or damage to said property or livestock or the owners or exhibitors thereof. All exhibitors are responsible for security of their own animal/project(s) until they depart for their final destination (processing/ranch/etc.). The exhibitor is the absolute insurer of and is responsible for the condition of their animal/project(s). The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo is not responsible for the acts of a third party.
- **29. Unethically Fitted Livestock:** The showing of unethically fitted livestock or livestock of an ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, and the misrepresentation of breeding or milking status, are prohibited.
 - a. **Description:** Unethical fitting means any attempt to alter the natural appearance, conformation, musculature or weight of an animal by any unnatural means, as well as changing the normal conformation of any part of the animal's body or using drugs, medications, chemicals, or other substances (including over-the-counter and extra-label substances and uses), or mechanical devices to alter the physical makeup or performance of the animal. Unethical fitting includes but is not limited to the following:
 - i. Animals that are in milk due to an unnaturally induced lactation.
 - ii. Balancing the udder by any means other than leaving naturally produced milk in any or all quarters.
 - iii. Treating or massaging any part of the animal's body, internally or externally, with an irritant, counterirritant, or other substance to temporarily improve conformation.
 - iv. Blocking the nerves to prevent limping or switching of the tail.
 - v. Bruising or blemishes negatively impacting food safety or marketability of an animal's carcass.

- vi. Surgery or other practices performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, hide, or hair, or feet (this is to include any materials added to the feet of an animal) except the removal of warts or horns and the permitted clipping and dressing of hair and trimming of hooves.
- vii. Insertion of foreign material under the skin.
- viii. Changing the color of hair, spot or area on the animal's body. Any grooming material that allows color to come off of any animal will not be allowed at the show.
- ix. The act of artificially filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping, drench tubes, or any other method per os (by esophagus). Pumps found in the Barns or on Grounds will be confiscated and will become the property of S.A.L.E.
- x. The use of diuretics.

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- xi. Administration of an illegal, unapproved, or performance enhancing drug internally or externally.
- **b. Verification:** The exhibitor specifically represents that no animal entered by him/her is unethically fitted, and that the breeding, age, and milking status are correctly stated. All Junior Market and Junior Breeding Animals will be required to have signatures on each entry certification stating that the animal is not unethically fitted. These forms must be signed by all of the following:
 - i. Junior Exhibitor
 - ii. Parent or Guardian
- c. Medication received prior to the show: In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA-approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear the system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs and varies from animal to animal. Adequate time must have passed so that an exhibitor's animal does not test positive for drugs upon arrival. Once the animals arrive on the S.A.L.E. Grounds, they must remain free and clear of all residues of medications, drugs, chemicals and other substances. Those animals that have consumed or been given, even under the care of a licensed veterinarian, any type of performance enhancing medication, drug, chemical or substance, including but not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and pain killers within the residual clearance time, are ineligible for competition. Exhibitors with questions regarding medications or eligibility should consult with the Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Veterinarian prior to competition.
- d. Medication during the Show: The Official Show Veterinarian Office is located at the northwest corner of the Sheep/Goat/Swine Barns. For the convenience of exhibitors, the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo arranges to have veterinarians available; however, they do not donate their services or medications. Fees should be discussed before treatment. Additionally, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to properly communicate to the veterinarians if the animal is eligible for further competition. All medication and treatment administered during the livestock show must be administered by the Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Veterinarian and a written medication record must be filed. Animals receiving performance enhancing drugs (including, but not limited to, steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and pain killers) in this manner are ineligible for competition. The Official Show Veterinarian is authorized to remove any animal from competition if the health, safety, or welfare of the animal is in question.
- e. **Drug:** The term "drug" shall mean any substance the sale, possession, or use of which is regulated by federal, state, or local law or regulation, as well as any substance used by the medical or veterinary professions that affects the circulatory, respiratory, muscular, skeletal or central nervous system of any species of livestock. If drugs are used by the Official Show Veterinarian to treat a recognized disease in market animals, the withdrawal times listed by the drug manufacturer will be strictly followed.
- f. Beta-agonists: S.A.L.E. will not tolerate the presence of ractopamine hydrochloride (re OptaflexxTM; Paylean®) in market entries other than market steers or market barrows, respectively. S.A.L.E. will not tolerate the presence of ractopamine hydrochloride (re TopmaxTM) in Market Poultry, specifically all turkeys and broilers. S.A.L.E. will not tolerate the presence of zilpaterol hydrochloride (re Zilmax®) in any market species or breeding animal.

g. Inspection/Testing:

i. Each exhibitor, by entering or exhibiting an animal at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, agrees that any animal entered by him or her may be subjected to inspection or examination by any veterinarian

appointed by S.A.L.E. and that S.A.L.E. may subject any such animal to any tests, sample-takings, or inspections that S.A.L.E. deems necessary or appropriate, including but not limited to testing for drugs or other substances, at any time. S.A.L.E. shall have the right to conduct or have conducted for it all tests, inspections, or analyses it deems appropriate or necessary, including but not limited to ultrasound, D.N.A., blood, tissue, fiber and urine laboratory analysis, on any animal entered in or exhibited at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. The exhibitor or approved substitute exhibitor (and, for Junior exhibitors, the exhibitor's parent, legal guardian, or AST or CEA) must be present during the collection of an initial urine sample for testing and must witness, seal and sign the sample, thereby establishing that the sample was properly collected and prepared for analysis. Subsequent samples of any sort may be taken by or for S.A.L.E. without the presence of the exhibitor or his or her parent, legal guardian or AST or CEA.

- ii. All decisions, determinations, and conclusions based on any test, inspection, analysis or examination shall be final and conclusive without recourse against S.A.L.E. or any of its officers, directors, volunteers, and employees, or any veterinarian appointed by S.A.L.E.
- EACH EXHIBITOR, BY ENTERING AND EXHIBITING AN ANIMAL OR PROJECT IN OR AT THE SAN ANTONIO STOCK SHOW & RODEO, WAIVES AND RELEASES S.A.L.E. FROM ANY AND ALL CLAIMS, SUITS, CAUSES OF ACTION, LIABILITIES, DAMAGES, DEMANDS, COSTS, EXPENSES (INCLUDING ATTORNEYS' FEES), AND OTHER LOSSES OF EVERY SORT BASED ON, ARISING OUT OF, OR RELATING TO THE INSPECTION OR TESTING OF ANY SUCH ANIMAL AND ANY RULING, DECISION, OR ACTION TAKEN AS A RESULT OF OR IN RELIANCE ON THE RESULTS OF ANY TEST OR INSPECTION, WHETHER OR NOT SUCH TESTING OR INSPECTION WAS CONDUCTED IN COMPLIANCE WITH THESE RULES. THE FOREGOING WAIVER AND RELEASE APPLIES TO ANY CAUSES OF ACTION, CLAIMS, AND DEMANDS BASED ON S.A.L.E.'S ACTUAL OR ALLEGED NEGLIGENCE.
- iv. All testing conducted at the election of S.A.L.E. will be paid for by the Show. Payment for any other tests (i.e. blood typing, etc.) required in the Junior Livestock Show will be the sole responsibility of the exhibitor and at the discretion of the Official Show Veterinarian.
- h. Breeding Animals: As breeding animals are not entering the food chain, the USDA Wholesome Meat Act does not apply; however, breeding animals will be closely screened for any performance enhancing compounds. This includes, but is not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers and pain killers.
- i. Wholesome Meat Act: The USDA Wholesome Meat Act applies to all market livestock. Only animals eligible for immediate slaughter may be brought onto the Grounds and exhibited:
 - i. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
 - ii. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
 - iii. If drug or chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.

The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo will in no way be liable or responsible for the condition of carcasses or the sale price of the animal.

- j. Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act: As required in 21 CFR 589.2000, entry in the Junior Commercial Steer, Junior Market Goat, Junior Market Lamb, and Junior Market Steer Show shall serve as verification by the exhibitor that, to the best of their knowledge, while under their ownership, possession or direct control, the animal(s) were not fed any feed containing ruminant-derived meat or bone meal. Entrants agree to allow packer inspections of feed ingredient records and facilities.
- k. Consequences: In the event that S.A.L.E. determines any animal to be unethically fitted, the Executive Director & CEO is authorized to disqualify the exhibitor and his or her animal and may permanently bar the exhibitor and his or her family from any further participation in the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Reinstatement of any barred exhibitor may be made only by the Executive Director & CEO. The exhibitor will forfeit all titles, awards, prizes, auction proceeds, premiums and scholarships if the animal or exhibitor is disqualified. Market/Floor money will be forfeited if the animal is condemned at slaughter or deemed unmerchantable. S.A.L.E., in cooperation with member shows of the North American Livestock Show & Rodeo Managers Association, reserves the right to submit the name(s) of any disqualified exhibitor to the organization's Rule Infraction Database.



- **30.** Therapeutic Practices: The practice or use of any therapeutic application including, but not limited to, animal chiropractic services, acupuncture, lasers, magnetic or electrical massage stimulation on show grounds is prohibited.
- 31. Exhibitor Behavior: The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo does not condone and will not permit aggressive behavior towards animals or any other persons. Any exhibitor or anyone assisting an exhibitor is not allowed to aggressively pop, slap, hit, or strike any animal at any time during the show or at any place on the Show Grounds. Any aggressive or unwarranted behavior by an exhibitor or anyone assisting an exhibitor towards another individual will not be tolerated. If such behavior is witnessed, it may result in immediate disqualification of the exhibitor, and/or forfeiture of all fees, premiums, and awards. In certain cases, the exhibitor or associated persons may be banned from the Grounds and/or any future competition. Protests are not permitted.
- **32. Animal Health Requirements:** State Law requires most stock entering the Grounds to be accompanied by proper health papers that shall be presented at the time stock arrives on the Grounds at the Salado Creek Property Staging Area. See Texas Animal Health Commission Rules for detail, there will be no exceptions. All livestock must enter through the East Gate (Gate E) only with the proper credentials from Salado Creek Property Staging Area.
- **33. Diseased Animals:** No animals found to have a disease of any character will be admitted to the Grounds at any time, and Superintendents are instructed and authorized to refuse unloading privileges to any stock found to have an undesirable ailment. This includes market barrows that stress and are unable to walk off of the trailer and to their assigned pen on their own.
- **34. Exhibitor Numbers:** Each entry will be assigned a number. If an exhibitor is assigned a back number, this number must be displayed by the exhibitor when project(s) is being judged.
- **35. Scales:** Exhibitors will not be allowed to bring portable scales on the Grounds. Insofar as possible, scales will be provided by the show in all barns but are unofficial and provided for exhibitor's convenience only.
- **36.** Exhibitor Campgrounds: Campground space will be <u>extremely</u> limited for most shows. Parents, CEAs, ASTs, adult leaders or their representatives are asked to assist in reducing the number of chairs from their respective county or chapter. <u>No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Livestock Barns.</u> Exhibitors must be aware of their surroundings and cognizant of others when making space for their campgrounds. Exhibitors abusing campground areas will be subject to disqualification.
- 37. Fire Regulations: Due to fire code regulations, equipment, showboxes, trim chutes, chairs, tables, etc. will NOT be allowed in aisles or doorways. Blocking of any aisle or doorway will be strictly prohibited. *Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes.* Please make necessary provisions, if needed, to store equipment safely in or above pens in the lamb/goat and swine barns.
- **38. Objectionable Exhibits:** Show Management reserves the right to remove from the Grounds any exhibit, animal or project that may be falsely entered or deemed unsuitable or objectionable, without assigning a reason therefore. All fees will be forfeited.
- **39.** Unauthorized Projects: Any project(s) brought onto the Grounds which is/are not entered for competition, exhibition or consigned to sales are subject to becoming the property of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.

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- **40. Bedding:** <u>NO OUTSIDE BEDDING WILL BE ALLOWED.</u> All bedding will be provided by the show. The use of artificial grass mats and carpets are prohibited as bedding in all barns. Cedar fiber, straw and hay bedding is prohibited in beef cattle stalls. Insofar as possible, appropriate types of bedding will be available for sale on the Grounds at the FEED STORE. Discretion as to what constitutes acceptable bedding is held exclusively by Show Management.
- **41. Feed:** Exhibitors may not bring excessive amounts of feed/hay onto the Grounds. No round or large square bales will be permitted in the barns. Exhibitors will not be allowed to store excessive amounts of tack and feed in the stalling areas, and nothing will be allowed on top of the cattle stalls. Insofar as possible, feed and hay will be available for sale on the Grounds at the FEED STORE.

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42. Stalls, Pens and Alleys: Stalls, pens, alleys and exhibit spaces must be cleaned before 8:00 AM each day. No automatic waterers will be allowed in any stalls/pens. Pens will not be taken apart or altered in any way without Superintendent approval. Pens may be lined on 3 sides at panel height only. Nothing may cover the gate or over

the pen. Front and end panels may be covered, but there will be no panels or covering behind the cattle without Superintendent approval. No lights of any kind are to be strung on the pens. Refuse matter must be disposed of as follows: Manure and/or bedding into designated dumpsters; trash into trash barrels. Feed, chairs, equipment boxes, etc. are not permitted in the main alleys or barn aisles, in doorways and/or fire lanes. Exhibitors may be granted access to the livestock barns 24 hours per day.

43. Tack: Tack vehicles must obtain a staging credential before entering the East Gate (Gate E). Show Management reserves the right to determine what constitutes an acceptable tack vehicle. Vehicles not meeting this description will not be allowed onto the Salado Creek Property or through the East Gate (Gate E) for unloading.

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- **44. Fans/Heaters:** ONLY CORDLESS fans will be allowed in the barns. No fans will be permitted in aisles at any time. Corded Fans will be allowed for use on **CATTLE ONLY.** Fans behind cattle are **not** allowed. Fans will be limited to one fan per five head of cattle. *Portacool or similar fans will not be permitted on Grounds unless provided by the show.* Heaters are not allowed in any Livestock barns.
- **45. Signs:** A sign, of reasonable size, provided by the exhibitor is recommended over each project including exhibitors/owner's name and organization. No sign, which refers in any way to a commercial product, including "For Sale" signs, may be placed over any livestock exhibit, on walls, posts, and doors; such signs will be confiscated. Show Management reserves the right to remove any sign for any reason.
- **46. Electrical Equipment:** All electrical equipment brought onto the Grounds must conform to all applicable safety regulations. Any exhibitor who refuses to cooperate with Show Management in this matter will have their exhibit/project immediately removed from the Grounds and will forfeit all fees and premiums.
- 47. Generators/Fuels: Generators and flammable fuels are prohibited on Show Grounds.
- **48. Campers/Trailers:** Pickup trucks with campers may park inside Grounds but cannot be used as living quarters. House and cook trailers are not permitted to enter the Grounds. When livestock trailers are on Salado Creek Property exhibitors may not use slide outs or awnings. There will be no RV Campers/Trailers allowed onto Salado Creek Property.
- **49. Pets:** No pets are allowed on Grounds. Service animals are defined as dogs (or miniature horses when reasonable) that are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for persons with disabilities. Such animals are welcome in areas where the public is normally allowed to go. Under the ADA, service animals must be harnessed, leashed, or tethered, unless these devices interfere with the service animal's work or the individual's disability prevents using these devices. In that case, the individual must maintain control through voice, signal, or other effective controls.
- **50. Smoking:** Smoking is prohibited in all indoor venues/barns. This includes the use of e-cigarettes and vaping devices.
- **51. Cooking:** Cooking is not allowed on the Grounds at any time. No cookers, crock-pots, microwaves, coffee pots, warmers, or any other cooking utensils are permitted on the Grounds. No open flames or BBQ pits will be allowed on the Salado Creek Property Staging Lot. Any cooking utensils, including coffee pots, brought onto the Grounds will become property of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.
- **52. Trailer Parking:** Trailers must be unhooked from vehicle when stored at Salado Creek Property. All trailers must be removed from the Salado Creek Property Lot by 1 PM, Sunday, Feb. 25. San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo personnel reserve the right to relocate trailers on the property, when necessary, at Salado Creek Property.
- **53. Electronic Communication:** The use of electronic communication devices (i.e.: two-way radios, cell phones, smart watches) by exhibitors during competition, including judging contests, skillathons, livestock shows, etc. is prohibited.

UNDER TEXAS LAW (CHAPTER 87, CIVIL PRACTICE AND REMEDIES CODE), A LIVESTOCK SHOW SPONSOR IS NOT LIABLE FOR AN INJURY TO OR THE DEATH OF A PARTICIPANT IN A LIVESTOCK SHOW RESULTING FROM THE INHERENT RISKS OF LIVESTOCK SHOW ACTIVITIES.

JUNIOR SHOW

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW RULES

Junior Entry Deadline: December 1, 2023

1. Eligibility: The Junior Show is limited to entries from within the state of Texas. The term "exhibitor" shall mean the bona fide owner of the project. Junior Show exhibitors are subject to the General & Junior Rules as well as the Special Rules. Exhibitors are responsible for knowing and complying with all rules of this show.

Exhibitors must be bona fide members of a Texas County 4-H Club or Texas FFA Chapter. Exhibitors must have continuously, personally, fed and cared for their projects under the direct supervision of an AST or a CEA.

Exhibitors may enter as either a Texas 4-H or FFA member, but not as both in the same Department. Any exhibitor who enters as both in the same Department will have all his/her entries disqualified without refund of fees.

To be eligible, boys or girls must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at time of show; be between the ages of 9 and 18 on August 31, 2023, or be between 8 and in the third grade and 18 on August 31, 2023, and be bona fide residents of the State of Texas. Exhibitors or contestants born on or before August 31, 2009 but not on or before August 31, 2004 are considered to be in the Senior Division of contests (14-18 yrs old).

Junior exhibitors and contestants suspended under Texas Education Code 33.081 "No Pass, No Play" are ineligible to participate in any San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Junior Livestock Show activity, event or competition. Any project owned by an ineligible exhibitor is ineligible for competition, this includes Agricultural Mechanics and Junior Shoot-Out entries.

All 4-H and FFA exhibitors are considered to be academically eligible by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo to participate in the Junior Livestock Show at the time entries are received from the AST/CEA. Any AST/CEA who has a member in his/her 4-H or FFA program who becomes ineligible to participate in the Junior Livestock Show according to Texas Education Code must provide written and signed notification to the appropriate Superintendent or to the Livestock Office at least 24 hours prior to the beginning of Check-In/Registration for the respective show/contest. If such notification is not received at least 24 hours prior to the beginning of Check-In/Registration, the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo will consider the exhibitor as eligible to participate.

- 2. Social Security Number Requirement: All exhibitors and contestants must have a personal Social Security Number to be eligible to participate in the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Social Security Numbers must be recorded during the entry process. Intermediate and Junior contestants registering on-site for Judging Contests will not be required to have a SSN. Any contestant, regardless of age, participating in a Senior Division of a contest will be required to have their Social Security Number at registration. Exhibitors/Contestants offered a scholarship must provide their Social Security Number to show management upon request in order to fully qualify for funding.
- **3. Foreign Exchange Students:** Foreign Exchange students are ineligible to compete in the Junior Livestock Show. Such individuals are eligible to participate in the Open Livestock Show.
- **4. Non-United States Citizens:** Non-United States Citizens are ineligible to compete in the Junior Livestock Show. Such individuals are eligible to participate in the Open Livestock Show.
- 5. Entry: The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to ASTs and CEAs in charge of 4-H Clubs or FFA programs the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Junior Livestock Show, subject to these Junior Rules. These rules are only minimum requirements for participation in the Show and are not intended to limit the right of any AST or CEA, or the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension or the Texas Education Agency, to impose additional requirements as they deem necessary. The opportunity to enter 4-H Club and FFA members' projects in the Junior Livestock Show is made available to Parents, Exhibitors and ASTs/CEAs supervising these Junior Show projects. The opportunity to enter 4-H Club or FFA Chapter Program members or their non-animal projects in the Junior Contests is made available to Parents, Exhibitors and ASTs/CEAs supervising these Junior Show projects. In no event are these rules to be construed as making any offer or

opportunity available to any 4-H Club or FFA member. In no event shall any AST or CEA be considered to be an agent of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo for any purpose.

All entries in the Junior Livestock Show must be made by the Parent, Exhibitor or AST or CEA under whose supervision the projects were managed via the Online Entry System. The AST or CEA must certify the exhibitor is a bona fide member of their respective Chapter or Club and are eligible under the rules of this show. It is the responsibility of the Parent, Exhibitor and AST/CEA to read all rules. The Parent and Exhibitor must sign the Junior Show Entry Agreement at time of entry. If entries are not correctly submitted they will be returned.

4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters must submit their payment in order for entries to be considered valid. Junior entries must be completed using the online entry system along with one (1) check to cover total fees due (entries and passes), if electronic payment was not made. Entries may be made through the Parent, Exhibitor or 4-H Club/FFA Chapter and submitted online here. Checks for Junior entries must be drawn on 4-H or FFA accounts, money orders, or cashier's checks. **Personal checks will not be accepted for the Junior Livestock Show.**

- **6. Signatures:** All exhibitors must have the required original signatures (Exhibitor and Parent or Guardian) on each Junior Show Entry Agreement Form.
- 7. Quality Counts: To be eligible to compete in the Junior Breeding, Junior Commercial and/or Junior Market Shows, exhibitors will need Quality Counts verification. The Quality Counts verification number must be recorded on the online entry when entering the project. Please refer to the website https://agrilife.org/qualitycounts/ for information on how to become verified.
- 8. Ownership: Exhibitors must own, feed, care for, and exhibit their animals/projects at the beginning of and throughout the entire feeding and fitting period. It is critical for the exhibitor to be actively involved in all phases of the project to maximize the educational experience. The exhibitor may receive assistance from the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer, or other 4-H or FFA members. Show Management will rule on all issues regarding ownership.

UPDATED

Ownership/Fitting Periods: The required ownership and fitting periods are:

Market Animals. Validation will be used to verify ownership date for market animals.

Market Steers June 30, 2023

Market Lambs October 31, 2023

Market Goats October 31, 2023

Market Barrows November 30, 2023

Registration Certificates will be used to verify ownership date for breeding animals with the exception of Crossbred Gilts, Commercial Ewes and Commercial Does. Animals must be registered in the Herdbook of their Association in only the name of the Junior owner(s) on or before the required ownership date (see below). Registration Certificates must state the name of the Junior owner(s) only. Registration Certificates that list any additional names besides the name(s) the entry is validated under will be disqualified. Original Registration Certificates must be available upon request.

Purchase, delivery, possession, transfer, and registration must all take place on or before the required ownership date listed below.

Registered Sheep, Registered Boer Goats: October 1, 2023 (Must be validated through Breeding Sheep or Breeding Goat Validation on or before October 31, 2023)

Commercial Ewes, Commercial Does: October 31, 2023 (Must be validated through Breeding Sheep or Breeding Goat Validation on or before October 31, 2023)

Angora Breeding Goats, Beef Breeding Heifers, Dairy Heifers: November 1, 2023 Beef Breeding Heifers must complete all phases of heifer validation through the Texas 4-H & FFA Breeding Heifer Validation Program on or before November 1, 2023. All Registration Papers must be uploaded by **November 8, 2023.**)

Purebred Gilts, Crossbred Gilts: December 1, 2023 (Gilts must be validated through Breeding Gilt Validation on or before December 1, 2023. All Registration Papers for Purebred Gilts must be uploaded by January 2, 2024.)

- **10. Partnerships:** Partnership animals are not eligible in the Junior Livestock Show. Co-ownership of some animals in the breeding show may be eligible based on Validation Rules. Refer to Special Rules for respective show for more details.
- 11. Ineligible Animals: Any animal that has been sold during the feeding period via private treaty or public auction is ineligible to show. If ownership changes or has the possibility of changing through a sale offering (including animal(s) purchased back by the exhibitor), regardless of method or length of time, that chain of animal ownership is considered broken and the animal is ineligible. This specifically excludes animals sold at the local or county level at a Premium Auction, where the animal in question never had the possibility of changing ownership. Any animal that has sold at auction at any major livestock show is not eligible for the Junior Show.
- 12. Ineligible Exhibitor: A Junior exhibitor who has placed a Grand Champion Pen of Commercial Steers, Market Steer, Market Lamb, Market Barrow, Market Goat, Market Turkey (Hen or Tom), Market Broiler or named exhibitor(s) of the Agricultural Mechanics Marketplace Project at any prior San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo is not eligible to enter the Department in which that Grand Champion was selected.
- **13. Double Entries:** Animals shown in the Junior Show may also be shown in the Open Show if classes are available. See instructions in the Special Rules of each department.
- 14. Exhibitor Substitution: Entries in the Junior Show must be shown by their owner. Exhibitor substitutions may be allowed under the conditions outlined below. (Market Steer exhibitors see Market Steer Special Rules for more details.) In all cases, the Department Superintendent must approve the exhibitor substitution and will do so only if all conditions are met. NOTE: All Exhibitor Substitution Forms must be submitted to the Competitive Events Office preferably before the show starts for the respective day but at least 30 minutes prior to the exhibitor entering the holding area for their respective class. Forms will be given to Superintendents for approval.

Substitute exhibitors may show only one project (except in departments which exhibitor may enter more than one project), in addition to their own project, in each Junior Department. Substitute exhibitors must be entered and exhibiting their own project in the respective department in which they are serving as a substitute. An exhibitor of a past grand champion in a respective junior market animal department is not eligible to serve as a substitute exhibitor within that department.

- a. Substitution A Other School Activity: This request must be made on the Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Exhibitor Substitution Form provided by Show Management. This request must be accompanied by a statement, signed by a School Administrator, on school letterhead stating the specific reason a substitute is requested. The completed Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Exhibitor Substitution Form and the statement must be submitted to the Competitive Events Office. Attending school or practice does not constitute as an Other School Activity. Examples of Other School Activities are UIL events, school sports, or similar events.
- b. *Substitution B Sickness*: This request must be made on the Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Exhibitor Substitution Form provided by Show Management. This request must be accompanied by a statement, signed by a Physician, on his/her letterhead. The completed Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Exhibitor Substitution Form and the Physician's statement must be submitted to the Competitive Events Office.
- c. Substitution C More Than One Entry In A Class or the Exhibitor Has Entries In More Than One Department Showing At The Same Time: This request must be made on the Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Exhibitor Substitution Form provided by Show Management. The completed Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Exhibitor Substitution Form must be submitted to the Competitive Events Office.

In any of the three situations listed above, or in the case of an emergency, the Department Superintendent may use his/her own discretion as to whether a substitute exhibitor will be allowed. If a positive decision is rendered, the substitute should be from the same school, FFA Chapter, or 4-H Club as the original exhibitor with the following two exceptions:

- i. The original exhibitor is the only exhibitor from that school, FFA Chapter, or 4-H Club entered in that Department.
- **ii.** All other members from that school, FFA Chapter, or 4-H Club are exhibiting at the same time. In either case, any junior exhibitor, who is entered and exhibiting in the respective department, meeting the approval of the Department Superintendent may exhibit the animal.

The Department Superintendent may also require positive identification of the substitute exhibitor.

- 15. Fitting: The exhibitor is expected to feed, care for, fit, and exhibit their animal/project while at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or other 4-H or FFA members. Any project fed or cared for by a custom fitter is not eligible. A custom fitter is considered anyone who is not a family member, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or another 4-H or FFA member. Violators of this rule may be barred from future participation.
- 16. Project Care: Exhibitors must remain in charge of their project(s) and care for them for the duration of the show at all times. If needed, the exhibitor may have a competent caretaker (must be a family member of the exhibitor, AST/CEA other 4-H/FFA member, or Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer) care for the project(s). However, the exhibitor is the absolute insurer of and is responsible for the condition of their animal/project(s). Show Management reserves the right to decide what constitutes acceptable treatment of animal projects. Unacceptable treatment of animal projects will not be tolerated and could result in immediate disqualification of the exhibitor along with his/her club/chapter.
- 17. Junior Auction Animals: All placing Market Barrows, Market Broilers, Market Goats, Market Turkey Hens, Market Lambs and Market Steers must be sold through the Junior Livestock Auction. Animals sold in the Junior Livestock Auction must remain under the exhibitor's care and at his/her expense for the duration of the Show (unless other arrangements are made through the Competitive Events Office) and be displayed under the direction of the Show. The Junior Livestock Auction is limited to placing animals. Decoration of market animals for the Junior Livestock Auction is prohibited; animals must be presented for Auction in their natural show state (i.e. no glitter, paint, balloons, etc. allowed).
- 18. Junior Livestock Auction Exhibitors: Exhibitors with projects eligible for the Junior Livestock Auction need to be aware that auction procedures may dictate that an exhibitor is required to walk a designated project across the auction block in place of their own project, or the exhibitor may be required to walk across the auction block without a project. The exhibitor must present his/her project for the Auction or the project will be sold as a noplace. Exhibitors who are unable to attend the Junior Livestock Auction may request a substitution. This request must be made on the Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Auction Exhibitor Substitution Form provided by Show Management. Auction Exhibitor Substitutions must be approved by Show Management.
- 19. Terminal Shows: This is a terminal show for Commercial Steers, Market Barrows, Market Goats, Market Lambs, Market Poultry and all placing Market Steers. All Commercial Steers, Barrows, Goats, Lambs, Poultry and placing Market Steers brought onto the grounds must go to market via the contracted floor-buyer or other official show buyer. Non-placing Market Steers may be sold at the market "floor" price or they may be released.

UPDATED

20. Sift, Non-Place, Premium, and Auction Checks: Owners will be paid by the Commission Company for sifted and non-placing animals based on official turn-in weight. Projects that weigh less than the designated allowance within the specific department may be documented, sold on the re-weigh weight, and the exhibitor will be administered at \$20 office handling fee which will be deducted from their floor check. Checks will be mailed directly from the Commission Company for projects that do not qualify for the Junior Livestock Auction. If applicable, premium monies for class placing will be distributed by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo and mailed to the 4-H or FFA address. Auction sale checks will be issued by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Junior Livestock Auction and may be mailed separate from premium checks or commission checks (floor) to the 4-H or FFA address. The floor checks for animals qualifying for the Junior Livestock Auction will be retained by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.

Market Animal Disposition

The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo strives to ensure a fair price for market animal projects. Market conditions may dictate the sale of market animals be conducted through local terminal markets (i.e. sale barns, etc.). The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo reserves the right to charge the exhibitor freight, yardage, and any and all marketing fees applicable to the sale of each animal. Animals should be in accordance with all representations throughout the validation/ownership period. Any animal deemed unmerchantable due to weight, lameness, illness, blindness, etc. will receive no value. The Commission Company reserves the right to deem an animal unmerchantable and may refuse to accept non-placing Market Steers based on the criteria previously mentioned.

- 21. Animal Load-Out: It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to deliver his/her animal to the designated load out area and that all documentation has been appropriately filed and completed.
- **22. Market Animal Eligibility:** To meet Country of Origin labeling requirements, all animals entered or exhibited in a Junior Market Division must be bred, born and raised, in the United States.
- **23. Blocking Tables & Trim Chutes:** No Market Lamb or Market Goat Blocking Tables are permitted on grounds. No Steer or Junior Heifer Trim Chutes are permitted on grounds.
- 24. Blow Dryers: No blowers, corded or cordless, will be permitted during the Junior Market Shows.

JUNIOR SHOW

JUNIOR CONTEST RULES

Junior Entry Deadline: December 1, 2023

1. Eligibility: The Junior Show is limited to entries from within the state of Texas. The term "exhibitor" shall mean the bona fide owner of the project. Junior Show exhibitors are subject to the General & Junior Rules as well as the Special Rules. Exhibitors are responsible for knowing and complying with all rules of this show.

Exhibitors must be bona fide members of a Texas County 4-H Club or Texas FFA Chapter. Exhibitors must have continuously, personally, fed and cared for their projects under the direct supervision of an AST or a CEA.

Exhibitors may enter as either a Texas 4-H or FFA member, but not as both in the same Department. Any exhibitor who enters as both in the same Department will have all his/her entries disqualified without refund of fees.

To be eligible, boys or girls must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at time of show; be between the ages of 9 and 18 on August 31, 2023, or be between 8 and in the third grade and 18 on August 31, 2023, and be bona fide residents of the State of Texas. Exhibitors or contestants born on or before August 31, 2009 but not on or before August 31, 2004 are considered to be in the Senior Division of contests (14-18 yrs old).

Junior exhibitors and contestants suspended under Texas Education Code 33.081 "No Pass, No Play" are ineligible to participate in any San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Junior Livestock Show activity, event or competition. Any project owned by an ineligible exhibitor is ineligible for competition, this includes Agricultural Mechanics and Junior Shoot-Out entries.

All 4-H and FFA exhibitors are considered to be academically eligible by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo to participate in the Junior Show at the time entries are received from the AST/CEA. Any AST/CEA who has a member in his/her 4-H or FFA program who becomes ineligible to participate in the Junior Livestock Show according to Texas Education Code must provide written and signed notification to the appropriate Superintendent or to the Livestock Office at least 24 hours prior to the beginning of Check-In/Registration for the respective show/contest. If such notification is not received at least 24 hours prior to the beginning of Check-In/Registration, the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo will consider the exhibitor as eligible to participate.

- 2. Social Security Number Requirement: All exhibitors and contestants must have a personal Social Security Number to be eligible to participate in the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Social Security Numbers must be recorded during the entry process. Intermediate and Junior contestants registering on-site for Judging Contests will not be required to have a SSN. Any contestant, regardless of age, participating in a Senior Division of a contest will be required to have their Social Security Number at registration. Exhibitors/Contestants offered a scholarship must provide their Social Security Number to show management upon request in order to fully qualify for funding.
- **3. Foreign Exchange Students:** Foreign Exchange students are ineligible to compete in the Junior Livestock Show. Such individuals are eligible to participate in the Open Livestock Show.
- **4. Non-United States Citizens:** Non-United States Citizens are ineligible to compete in the Junior Livestock Show. Such individuals are eligible to participate in the Open Livestock Show.
- 5. Entry: The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to ASTs/CEAs/CTE-STEM Directors in charge of respective FFA, 4-H Clubs or CTE-STEM programs the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Junior Show, subject to these Junior Rules. These rules are only minimum requirements for participation in the Show and are not intended to limit the right of any AST, CEA or CTE-STEM Director, or the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension or the Texas Education Agency, to impose additional requirements as they deem necessary. The opportunity to enter 4-H Club, FFA and CTE-STEM members' projects in the Junior Show is made available to Parents, Exhibitors and ASTs/CEAs/CTE-STEM Directors supervising these Junior Show projects. The opportunity to enter 4-H Club, FFA Chapter or CTE-STEM Program members or their non-animal projects in the Junior Contests is made available to Parents, Exhibitors and ASTs/CEAs/CTE-STEM Directors

supervising these Junior Show projects. In no event are these rules to be construed as making any offer or opportunity available to any 4-H Club or FFA member. In no event shall any AST/CEA/CTE-STEM Director be considered to be an agent of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo for any purpose.

All entries in the Junior Show Contests must be made by the Parent, Exhibitor or Program Supervisor using the Online Entry System. The Program Supervisor (AST/CEA/CTE-STEM) must certify the exhibitor is a bona fide member of their respective organization. It is the responsibility of the Parent, Exhibitor and Program Supervisor to read all rules. The Parent and Exhibitor must sign the Junior Show Entry Agreement at time of entry. If entries are not correctly submitted they will be returned.

4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters and CTE/STEM Programs must submit their payment in order for entries to be considered valid. Junior entries must be completed using the online entry system along with one (1) check to cover total fees due (entries and passes), if electronic payment was not made. Entries may be made through the Parent, Exhibitor or 4-H Club/FFA Chapter and submitted online here. Checks for Junior entries must be drawn on 4-H or FFA accounts, money orders, or cashier's checks. **Personal checks will not be accepted for the Junior Livestock Show.**

6. Signatures: All exhibitors must have the required original signatures (Exhibitor and Parent or Guardian) on each Junior Show Entry Agreement Form.

JUNIOR COMPETITIVE EVENTS SCHOLARSHIPS

The San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. (S.A.L.E.) will award college scholarships to eligible exhibitors and contestants competing in the Junior Livestock Show & Junior Agricultural Mechanics Show who are U.S. citizens and Texas residents, and currently attending or a graduate of a Texas public, private, or home school. Furthermore, the exhibitor will attend an accredited Texas college or university or an accredited, recognized agricultural or natural resources vocational or technical training school in Texas. Scholarships will be awarded based on the ranking of the contestant in a given show/contest. Judging and/or show procedures may dictate that not all scholarships for each category be given.

Eligible exhibitors and contestants will have an opportunity to compete for scholarships during the 2024 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo (the amounts and designations for Livestock and Ag Mechanics are outlined below). Previous scholarship recipients in the Livestock Show, Junior Shoot-Out, Junior Ag Mechanics, Calf Scramble and/or Horse Show who have received less than \$20,000 in scholarships are eligible to win additional scholarships up to \$20,000 maximum. Exhibitors and contestants who have been awarded \$20,000 in scholarships through the Livestock Show, Horse Show, Junior Shoot-Out, Calf Scramble and/or Junior Ag Mechanics are not eligible to win additional scholarships through competition at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.

The total amount of scholarships offered to Junior Ag Mechanics, Livestock Show (includes Calf Scramble), Pitmaster Challenge, Shoot-Out, Vaquero Cook-Off and Western Art exhibitors in 2024 is \$1,710,000. (Outlined below)

The San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret or to amend these designations at any time at its discretion and to settle and determine all disputes, questions, matters regarding, or incidents arising from, the Scholarship Program. Recipients must follow the rules and regulations of the current Livestock Premium List as well as adhere to the rules and guidelines of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. Scholarship Program.

I. OVERVIEW AND UPDATES

- A. Program Overview The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo is a volunteer organization that emphasizes agriculture and education to develop the youth of Texas. Western Art Committee's mission is to support the education of the youth of Texas through its western art contest which encourages an appreciation of our western heritage. The subject matter for all artworks must be Western Art. The following will be a guideline as to what is considered Western Art. "Western art is representational of the heritage, lifestyle and landscapes of the American West, both historical and present day."
- **B.** Eligibility This contest is open to South Central Texas high school students ages 14 to 18 as of August 31, 2023, and currently attending a Texas public, private or home school. (See Appendices for list of eligible school districts and counties.) Those wishing to seek accommodations for the age requirement must do so by contacting the S.A.L.E. office before check-in of the event. Contestants must be citizens of the United States and able to provide a valid Social Security number. Students who have had or are in the process of having artwork published and/or used for profit are not eligible.
- C. Scholarship Opportunities The San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. (S.A.L.E.) will offer college scholarships to eligible exhibitors and contestants competing in the Western Art Contest who are 1) U.S. citizens and Texas residents and 2) currently attending or a graduate of a Texas public, private, or home school. Scholarships will be awarded based on the ranking of the contestant in each show/contest. Judging and/or show procedures may dictate that not all scholarships for each category be given. Eligible exhibitors and contestants will have an opportunity to compete for scholarships during the 2023 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Previous scholarship recipients in the Livestock Show, Junior Shoot-Out, Junior Ag Mechanics, Western Art, and/or Horse Show who have received less than \$20,000 in scholarships are eligible to win additional scholarships up to

\$20,000 maximum. Exhibitors and contestants who have been awarded \$20,000 in scholarships through the Livestock Show, Horse Show, Junior Shoot-Out, Western Art, and/or Junior Ag Mechanics are not eligible to win additional scholarships through competition at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. If the exhibitor is not eligible to receive additional scholarship funds, the scholarship will not be awarded.

Within the Western Art Contest, scholarships will be offered only to the contestants of the respective Champion in Class/Category (outlined in Section V below) provided they are eligible to receive scholarship funds. If the contestant is not eligible to receive scholarship funds, the scholarship will not be awarded. The total amount of scholarships offered to contestants in the 2024 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Western Art Contest is \$125,000. The San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret or to amend these designations at any time at its discretion and to settle and determine all disputes, questions, matters regarding, or incidents arising from, the Scholarship Program. Recipients must follow the rules and regulations of the current Western Art Contest Rules & Regulations as well as adhere to the requirements and criteria of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. Scholarship Program. Scholarship recipients must attend an accredited Texas college or university or an accredited, recognized agricultural or natural resources vocational or technical training school in Texas. Western Art scholarship recipients may attend an accredited college or university within the continental United States only if majoring within a Liberal Arts Program.

D. Updates

- 1. The Western Art program is shifting to an online application process. All contestants must enter online on the Western Art Competition page https://www.sarodeo.com/p/competitive-events/western-art-competition not later than November 15, 2023. If students are minors at the time of contest entry, the student's parent or legal guardian is required to review and acknowledge the online entry as indicated. Contestants who fail to enter online will forfeit their ability to participate in this year's art contest.
- 2. The Western Art program will again offer 12 scholarships totaling \$125,000. These scholarships will be offered to the Champion in each specific class/category.

II. GENERAL CONTEST AND ENTRY GUIDELINES

- **A.** Students, parents, and teachers are not permitted to be present during the judging.
- **B.** Only one entry per student in contest.
- **C.** A Western Art illustration or sculpture must be entered in one of the following classes:
 - 1. 3D Clay
 - 2. 3D Other Medium
 - 3. 2D Oil/Acrylic Painting
 - 4. 2D Watercolor Painting
 - 5. 2D Mixed Media Painting
 - 6. 2D Graphite Pencil/Charcoal Drawing
 - 7. 2D Pen/Ink Drawing
 - 8. 2D Pastel/ Chalk Drawing
 - 9. 2D Colored Pencil/Conte Drawing
 - 10. 2D Mixed Media Drawing
 - 11. 2D Other Medium
 - 12. 2D Digital Art
- **D.** Only the student may work on his or her artwork under the supervision and critique of a teacher from the student's school, school district or homeschool program.
- **E.** The students whose entries are judged to be the Top 12 entries, based on Judging Criteria and Award Selection Process below, will be eligible for college scholarship funds from S.A.L.E.

- **F.** By entering the contest, students indicate that they understand and agree that their artwork, if judged as one of the Top 12 entries, will not be returned, and becomes the property of S.A.L.E. Receipt and distribution of the scholarship funds is subject to meeting the criteria and rules established by S.A.L.E. Students who fail to meet these criteria will forfeit these funds.
- **G.** By entering the contest, student and/or parent(s) agrees and understands that S.A.L.E. reserves the right to reproduce all placing artwork for any purpose and students are releasing their rights to the image.
- H. All contestants must enter online on the Western Art Competition page https://www.sarodeo.com/p/competitive-events/western-art-competition not later than November 15, 2023. If students are minors at the time of contest entry, the student's parent or legal guardian is required to review and acknowledge the online entry as indicated. If required, additional paperwork must be uploaded online at the time of entry (i.e. Photography Release Form, Copy of photo source references if used). Students may continue to work on their artwork up until the art check-in date, but online applications must be submitted by the November 15, 2023, deadline. See section VII.A. Online Entry for additional information.

III.ORIGINALITY

A. Overview

- 1. There have been many questions and concerns on the topic of student "originality" in art. Many students do not have personal knowledge of the subjects required for this competition. Therefore, published, and printed material may be one of the tools the student uses to research the idea for his or her art. Please be careful how this tool is used. For example: When a student researches a paper for History or English, published material is used to compile his facts or thoughts on the subject. It is very unlikely that a student will receive a grade if he copies the material. The same holds true for art. PUBLISHED MATERIAL MAY NOT BE COPIED, IN WHOLE OR IN PART. ANY LEGAL ISSUE ARISING FROM THE INFRINGEMENT OF COPYRIGHT LAW IS THE SOLE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE STUDENT AND HIS/HER LEGAL GUARDIANS.
- 2. The online entry form includes a Declaration of Originality that declares the artwork to be the original composition of the student. If, after the competition is completed, a winning piece of artwork is found to have been copied, any proceeds on behalf of the student will be forfeited. Failure to comply with the "Rules and Regulations" will also result in forfeiture of awards. Repeated violations of this rule, or any other rule(s), may disqualify the offending school from future participation in this competition.

B. Originality Guidelines

- 1. All artworks must be the student's original composition. No copies, by hand, electronic or mechanical device, of any previously published piece of art, previously published photograph, or other copyright protected material will be allowed.
- 2. Published images may not be used as a primary source reference. Releases to use a published image will not be accepted.
- 3. Trademarked logos, slogan and licensed characters are not permitted in part or in whole. This also applies to the title of the artwork.
- 4. Student must indicate the source of inspiration on the Western Art Contest Online entry form to avoid disqualification due to copying.
- 5. Unless a photograph was taken by the student artist, a <u>non-published</u> photograph which the student has secured the appropriate releases to use should be used as a source reference and <u>not copied</u>, as it is not the student's original composition. Use of online stock photography as a reference source is not allowed.

- 6. In the Digital Art Class, any photo used as the starting point of design must be the student's original unpublished photograph. Photos taken by another person may NOT be used. A copy of the original photo and the signed Photography Release form completed by the student must be uploaded on the online entry page.
- 7. If any photograph is used as an original or source reference, the photographer must sign the "Photography Release" form. If the student, or another student, took the photo and is a minor, that student's parent or legal guardian must also sign the release. They are releasing the rights to the student to use the image as well as to S.A.L.E. to reproduce students' work, which utilized their imagery, if artwork places. There are no exceptions to having the photography release signed and the release cannot be modified. Use of online stock photography as a reference source is not allowed.
- 8. When any such non-published photo is used for reference, a good quality copy of the photo must be uploaded with the "Photography Release" form on the website entry page. THE ORIGINAL PHOTO(S) OR DIGITAL DISK SHOULD BE KEPT BY STUDENT AND MUST BE AVAILABLE FOR REVIEW UPON REQUEST.
- 9. Only the student submitting the artwork can perform work on the entry.

IV. JUDGING CRITERIA

- **A. Artwork Classes/Categories** The artwork must be entered under one of the following classes/categories:
 - 1. Class/Category I 3D Clay three-dimensional, representational, art done in petroleum base or water base clay by hand. (No molds).
 - 2. Class/Category II 3D Other Medium three-dimensional, representational, art done in wood, metal, wire, papier-Mache, plaster, or stone by hand. (No molds)
 - 3. Class/Category III 2D Oil/Acrylic Painting Oil and/or Acrylic mediums applied by brush or palette knife.
 - 4. Class/Category IV 2D Watercolor Painting Watercolor mediums applied by brush or palette
 - 5. Class/Category V 2D Mixed Media Painting a combination of two or more painting media, such as watercolor and acrylics
 - 6. Class/Category VI 2D Graphite Pencil/Charcoal Drawing monochromatic drawing using pencil and/or charcoal
 - 7. Class/Category VII 2D Pen/Ink Drawing monochromatic drawing using pen, ink, and/or marker
 - 8. Class/Category VIII 2D Pastels/Chalk Drawing- use of colored pastels or colored chalk
 - 9. Class/Category IX 2D Colored Pencil/Conte Drawing use of colored pencil or conte stick/conte crayon
 - 10. Class/Category X 2D Mixed Media Drawing a combination of two or more media, from any of the above drawing classes/categories
 - 11. Class/Category XI 2D Other Medium use of other media such as mosaic, scratch board and other medium not actually drawn or painted.
 - 12. Class/Category XII 2D Digital Art Original images produced with the use of computers and digital design software. Note the photo use restrictions in Section III(B)(6) above.
 - S.A.L.E. reserves the right to re-class art to another class/category if any one category does not meet a minimum participation level of 5 entries. S.A.L.E. reserves the right to re-class any piece of art determined to be categorized incorrectly. For example, an entry using one color paint can be moved from monochromatic drawing to painting.
- **B.** Artwork Judging Criteria The following six criteria will be used in each class/category to judge the entries and weighted equally.

- 1. Composition and Design Design elements work as a whole. Elements flow together. Balanced visual weight. Color/values create balance and flow. Apparent focal point.
- 2. Command of Medium Skilled use of brushwork, blending, color mixing, and control of medium. Artist understands and uses techniques appropriate for medium.
- 3. Artistic Skill demonstrates excellent drawing skills, with subjects being drawn accurately and in proportion. Use of accurate linear and atmospheric perspective, contrast of values, use of light and shadows, and texture.
- 4. Creative, Fresh Approach Creativity and skillful application of innovative approach to subject matter (i.e., unusual point of view, or other original approach)
- 5. Western Theme Subject obviously Western themed, or in a western context (i.e., a portrait of a goat would not rank as high as a picture of a goat in a typical western ranch setting)
- 6. Overall Impression The Wow factor. Does the artist succeed in creating a striking and memorable unique work of art? The Title of artwork should also be considered.

V. AWARDS

- **A.** Number of Scholarships Awarded Eligible contestants may compete for one scholarship during the 2024 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Contest. A total of 12 scholarships will be available.
- **B.** Scholarships The scholarship values to be awarded are:
 - 1. Champions in Class 12 Scholarships at \$10,000 each The Champion contestant in each of the Class/Categories may be awarded up to a \$10,000 scholarship.
 - 2. Best of Show. If eligible, one of the twelve champions will be judged "Best of Show" and may be awarded an additional \$5,000 in scholarship funds.

Receipt and distribution of the scholarship funds is subject to meeting the requirements and criteria of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. Scholarship Program. Exhibitors and contestants who have been awarded \$20,000 in scholarships through the Livestock Show, Horse Show, Junior Shoot-Out, Western Art, and/or Junior Ag Mechanics are not eligible to win additional scholarships through competition at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Students who fail to meet these criteria will forfeit these funds.

VI. ARTWORK ENTRIES

A. General

- 1. Title Artwork should be titled
- 2. Grid Work It should be indicated on the "Artwork Receipt Tag" whether a grid was used by the student
- 3. Digital Art- A detailed description of process, steps and layers must be printed with the photos and program steps and layers and provided with the artwork entry. They will be reviewed by the judges. The final design must be printed and matted following all the guidelines in Section VI(D) below.

B. Acceptable Entries

- 1. The art must be western art. (See definition- Sec I(A)) The following are considered acceptable subject matter:
 - a) Ranch Life (Past or Present)
 - b) Cowboy or Rodeo events
 - c) An imaginative country and western scene or landscape
 - d) Texas agriculture landscape
 - e) Imaginative still life depicting cowboys, Native Americans, pioneers and/or related paraphernalia
 - f) If wildlife is used, it MUST be native to the continental USA and MUST be shown in a western setting.

C. Unacceptable Entries

- 1. The following subject matters will not be accepted and are subject to disqualification:
 - a) Satanic or violent art

- b) Nudes and inappropriate clothing, or lack thereof
- c) Items with profanity or of a lewd nature
- d) Gang symbols or themes
- e) Any wildlife not naturally found habituating in the continental USA such as tigers, zebra, elephants, etc
- f) The following are not acceptable, unless pictured in a western setting:
 - i. Fishing scenes
 - ii. Individual pictures of fish, butterflies, frogs, or other wildlife
 - iii. Pictures of bowls of fruit or flowers, unless symbolic of Texas, "Old West" or in a Western setting
- 2. The following types, styles and methods of artwork will not be accepted and are subject to disqualification.
 - a) Jewelry/Belt buckles
 - b) Photographic work except in context of Digital Art Category
 - c) Framed illustrations
 - d) Wet painting
 - e) Charcoal or pastels that are not sprayed
 - f) Entries made from mechanical or electronic devices such as (but not limited to):
 - i. Except in Digital Art Category, computer generated or computer enhanced art, including the use of scanners
 - ii. Assistance of opaque or overhead projectors
 - iii. Photocopied or otherwise professionally or mechanically reproduced images
 - iv. Sewing Machine
 - v. No commercial molds (only if created by student in sculpture process)
- 3. The following materials may NOT be used in artwork submitted. Artwork using any of these materials will not be accepted and are subject to disqualification.
 - a) Glitter
 - b) Plastic Figures
 - c) Pre-packaged, pre-cut craft or art kits
 - d) Commercial newsprint lettering, stencils, or rub-on letters in their original form
 - e) Sand (unless it is glued or sealed, not loose)
 - f) Wax
 - g) Any fragile material that easily breaks or may be damaged by routine handling during setting up or our exhibit (i.e., soft clay, glass, etc.)
 - h) Living things

D. Illustrations Guidelines for 2D Drawings, Paintings and Digital Art Entries

- 1. Acceptable medium examples for Drawings & Paintings:
 - a) Pastels
 - b) Watercolor
 - c) Oil Paint
 - d) Acrylic Paint
 - e) Ink
 - f) Charcoal
 - g) Pencil
 - h) Mix of above Media
 - i) Chalk
 - j) Scratchboard
- 2. Digital Art Category entries must be printed, and are subject to dimension, matting, and paperwork guidelines.
- 3. Size of illustrations- Dimensions may be vertical or horizontal, but they must not exceed specified sizes. Incorrect sizes are subject to disqualification. Sizes are inclusive of required matting.
 - a) Minimum dimension inclusive of required mat 11" x 14"

- b) Maximum dimension inclusive of required mat 18" x 24"
- 4. Matting and mounting of illustrations:
 - a) Illustrations must be matted. "Professional" mats are recommended, but they are not required. At a minimum, sturdy material such as poster board or heavy construction paper should be used that prevents sagging of artwork when hung.
 - i. Maximum Mat size must not exceed 3 ½" on any side. Double matting is acceptable, but total width of the double matting must not exceed the 3 ½" maximum
 - ii. Mat color is limited to white, black, or gray.
 - b) Paintings on canvas with wooden stretcher frames, or on wood or heavy metal, must have a hook or wire on back for hanging, but do not need to be matted.
 - c) If a protective acrylic covering is used, it is to be taped across the top only, so that it can be flipped to the back for judging. Any covering used is not to be placed between the mat and the artwork. Please do not use excessive amounts of tape that could damage artwork when covering is moved.

E. 3D Sculpture Guidelines

- 1. Sculpture should be made by hand.
- 2. Sculptures should be well made and able to stand alone.
- 3. Any sculpture made of any fragile material must have a base to support it and should be securely attached to base.
- 4. Artwork cannot be top heavy.
- 5. Soft clay will not be accepted.
- 6. All sculpture must be able to withstand repeated transporting and handling.
- 7. Acceptable Materials:
 - a) Clay (air dried or fired)
 - b) Wire, chicken wire, etc
 - c) Metal
 - d) Plaster
 - e) Wood
 - f) Other materials within rule boundaries
- 8. Maximum dimensions- Sculptures are not to exceed 20" in height, width or depth, including the base/easel.
- 9. Weight- Sculptures should not be excessive or weigh more than an average person can easily carry.
- 10. Transport- Sculptures should be transported in boxes with padding to protect them. Use a heavy marker to write your name and the name of the school on the outside of the box.
- 11. Fragile Sculptures- Our reception will be open to the public including small children, and although we do our best to protect all artwork, it is impossible for us to control the activity of every person viewing the artwork. FRAGILE SCULPTURES SUBJECT TO DAMAGE BY ROUTINE HANDLING SHOULD NOT BE ENTERED. S.A.L.E. will not be responsible for damage.

VII. CONTEST ENTRY

- **A. Online Entry** Each student and their parent or guardian (if a minor) is required to complete the online entry form on the San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo website. A link to the entry form is on the Western Art Competition page https://www.sarodeo.com/p/competitive-events/western-art-competition Review the entire form prior to completion as all fields must be entered prior to submission.
 - 1. S.A.L.E. Online Western Art Contest Release Agreement
 - a) Complete all Student Information
 - b) Complete all Education Information
 - c) Complete all Alternate Contact Information
 - d) Upload Photography Release Form and copy of source reference photo (See Section B below).

- e) Each section of the Online Western Art Contest Release Agreement form must be read and acknowledged by the student or if student is minor by parent/legal guardian. Enter student and parent/legal guardian name after final acknowledgement.
- 2. **Photography Release Form** If any photograph is used as a primary or source reference in any category as allowed only under Sec III(B)(5-8), the photographer must sign the "Photography Release" form. If the student artist, or another student, took the photo and is a minor, that student's parent or legal guardian must also sign the release. They are releasing the rights to the student to use the image, as well as releasing the rights to S.A.L.E. to reproduce students' work, which utilized their imagery. There are no exceptions to having the photography release signed and the release cannot be modified. The photography Release Form and a copy of the photo must be uploaded prior to submitting the online entry form. Reminder that any source photography for Digital Art Entries must be the student's original unpublished photograph.
- 3. **Artwork Receipt Tag** Based on the online entry information an artwork receipt tag will be provided and attached to the entry by a Western Art Committee representative, upon intake of the artwork for the contest. This is the identifying tag that stays with art throughout judging. This information should be reviewed upon contest entry of artwork for accuracy by the student and/or teacher at drop off. A copy of the form will be provided at drop off to student/teacher as receipt of artwork and to be used for pickup.
- 4. **2D Digital Art** Each entry <u>must</u> include a printed "storyboard" showing the progression of the piece and steps used to create the artwork. It should include process photos as well as printed layers. The program used to create the artwork must be provided on your storyboard paperwork. This is <u>required</u> additional paperwork to be included with entry is dropped off on the art check-in day.
- 5. **3D Sculpture** A printed "storyboard" may be included if you feel it will help support the originality/creativity of the work. This is optional additional paperwork to be included with entry when artwork is dropped off on the art check-in day.
- 6. Submittal Form Confirmation Upon submission of the online entry form, contestant will receive a submittal confirmation to the email address listed in the entry form.

VIII. ART CHECK-IN AND CHECK-OUT

A. Check-In

- 1. All artwork will be checked in at the Dairy Center, on the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo grounds, on the **Friday** prior to the judging on Saturday.
- 2. Check-in time is from noon until 7:00 p.m. on Friday.
- 3. Each entrant must have previously completed the online Western Art Contest Release Agreement and uploaded their Photography Release form and copy of photo(s) as required in Section VII.
- 4. The following paperwork should be attached to the artwork entry.
 - a) Digital Art "storyboard" per Section VII(D) above.
 - b) Sculpture "storyboard" per Section VII(E) if you feel it will help support the originality/creativity of the work.

B. Check-Out

- 1. All artwork not judged to be Top 12 will be checked out to the student or teacher following the reception on the Sunday afternoon following the Student Reception.
- 2. Check-out time is from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. on Sunday. If for any reason you cannot pick-up your artwork at this time you **must** make prior arrangements with your school team liaison. Artwork not picked up at that time may not be returned unless a special arrangement has been made in advance.
- 3. The artwork judged to be in the Top 12 will be retained by the Western Art Committee and exhibited at The Briscoe Western Art Museum and during the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo in February in the Expo Hall. Artwork in the Top 12 will not be returned to student.

COOKING RULES

- 13. Parents please understand this is a **KIDS' COOK-OFF!** Adult supervision is required; however, the child **MUST** be responsible for prepping, seasoning, cooking and presenting their entry.
- 14. Kid Cooks will cook on charcoal grills provided by the Buckaroo Que Committee in the Buckaroo Que Area.
 - Kid Cooks MUST use the charcoal provided by the Committee prior to using any other charcoal, woodchips, etc.
 - b. Due to safety concerns and space restrictions, **NO** propane tanks of any size are allowed in the contest area. A BBQ Committee member will be on hand with a small portable propane tank to assist in lighting if needed.
- 15. The competition pork chops will be provided by the Buckaroo Que Committee.
- 16. No other pork chop is to be present in the Buckaroo Que area other than the pork chops provided.
- 17. Pork chops must be prepped in the Buckaroo Que area. Pork chops may not leave the Buckaroo Que area under any circumstance. If a pork chop leaves the Buckaroo Que area, the pit/contestant is disqualified.
- 18. Pork chop may NOT contain decorations, toppings, stuffing or additional items.
- 19. Sauce must be cooked on; no additional sauce may be added once the pork chop is in the tray. No pooling of sauces or liquids is allowed in the turn-in tray.
- 20. NO GARNISH is allowed. Only the pork chop is allowed in the turn-in tray.
- 21. Pork chops may not be marked in any way, with the exception of grill marks.
- 22. Pork chops may be lightly trimmed before, but not after, cooking.
- 23. Pork chops must be submitted in the turn-in trays distributed by the Buckaroo Que Committee. The foil provided must stay in the tray under the pork chop, unfolded.
- 24. If the Kid Cook abandons the pit for any reason, other than a medical emergency or to use the restroom, the Kid Cook must notify a Buckaroo Que Committee Member. If at any time, the adult is completing the primary preparation or cooking of the pork chop the pit/contestant may be disqualified. If the pit has been abandoned by the Kid Cook without notifying the Buckaroo Que Committee, the pit/contestant may be disqualified.

- 1. Registration: All Registration: All team registrations must be completed online at the following link: https://www.sarodeo.com/p/competitive-events/junior-pitmaster-competition. Online registration will close when the capacity of 50 teams has been reached.
- 2. Payment: Entries are not valid until paid in full. The registration fee is \$150.00 per team. Payment must be made at the time of registration. Payments can be made online by credit card, by school check, cashier's check or money order. NO PERSONAL CHECKS ACCEPTED. All registrations not paid in full by January 26, 2024, will be considered void. One form of payment per team. There will be a \$35.00 service charge on all returned checks.
- 3. Refunds and Cancellations: If the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Bar-B-Que Committee (SABBQ) is notified of team's cancellation more than 30 days before the date of event, team will receive 50% refund of payment. Refunds will not be processed if notification of cancellation is received less than 30 days from the event.

CONTEST INFORMATION

The Junior Pitmaster Challenge is **NOT** a sanctioned event, but will follow the guidelines set forth by the Lone Star Barbecue Society, as follows:

- 1. TEAMS: Each team must consist of a minimum of two (2) and a maximum of five (5) members.
- 2. COOKED ON-SITE: Teams are responsible for providing their own meat. All meats will be cooked on-site. The preparation and completion (excluding pre-trimming) of any and all meats in competition is within the confines of the cook-off site and during the time limits designated by the promoter. Pre-trimming competition meat may be removed from the store packaging and pre-trimmed, but NO meat will be allowed to leave the team's site area. The promoter will advise teams of the "START" time.
- 3. COOK AREA: The cook area will be 36' x 36'. The area will be roped off and only team members will be allowed to be in this area while the competition is taking place. The only people besides team members allowed in the space will be volunteers from the SABBQ Committee. No other adults will be allowed in the cook area. The only exception will be if there is an emergency that requires the attention of an adult. Not following this rule will lead to disqualification from the competition.

4. SANITARY CONDITIONS: Teams are to prepare and cook in as sanitary a manner as is possible including, but not limited to using gloves, washing hands and avoiding cross- contamination. Cooking conditions are subject to inspection by the SABBQ Committee. Infractions identified or witnessed will be immediately addressed and the team will be subject to disqualification.

BBQ PIT AND SPACE RULES

- 1. BBQ PITS Any commercial or homemade, trailered, or un-trailered, pit or smoker normally used for competitive barbeque may be used.
- 2. A BBQ Pit may include gas or electricity for starting the combustion of wood or wood products but **NOT** to complete cooking. Once the meat has been placed on the cooker, you cannot restart your fire with gas or electric starters.
- 3. Pit should be of a permanent design that contains separate individual cooking chambers and heat sources (no sharing of heat sources).
 - a. Electrical accessories such as spits, augers or force drafts are permitted.
 - b. The use of heat lamps, proofing cabinets or any other electrical heating or holding device is prohibited.
 - c. The process of sous vide, boiling or frying of competition meat is not allowed.
- 4. No camping overnight Friday night.
- 5. Gates will be open at 4:00 a.m. on Saturday for teams to begin competition.
- 6. The event will have fire control and EMS services on site for emergency purposes.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR MEAT TURN-IN

<u>TURN-IN TIMES</u> – Teams are responsible for making sure they know the turn-in times. A turn-in window of ten (10) minutes before and after the set turn-in time will be recognized.

- 11:00 a.m. Chicken
- 1:00 p.m. Pork Spare Ribs
- 3:00 p.m. Beef Brisket
- 1. Any and all garnishes and condiments are prohibited, as they do not reflect the true quality of the cooked meat.
- 2. Meats may be cooked with sauces and/or other liquids, but once the cooking is complete, sauces and/or liquids may not be added once put into the tray. Cook will be asked to correct their turn- in if sauce or juice is added to the meat. There should be no "puddling" of juices or sauces in the tray.
- 3. Each tray will include one sheet of foil placed unfolded under the contents of the tray. A team member must sign the back of the exposed ticket in the presence of a SABBQ Committee member. Cooks are responsible for ensuring that the containers they receive remain clean and undamaged. The container must not be altered or marked in any way or it will be disqualified.
- 4. All three meats: chicken, pork spare ribs and brisket are required to be turned in meat side up. Each turn-in tray will consist of the following for this event:
 - a. <u>CHICKEN</u>: Two (2) separate ½ fully jointed chicken (to include breast, wing, thigh and drumstick). SKIN ON (No Cornish game hens). The chicken must fit in the tray with the lid closed.
 - b. <u>PORK SPARE RIBS</u>: Seven (7) individual cut ribs (bone-in) (St. Louis cut acceptable). Ribs must be placed in the tray MEAT side up lying parallel to the hinge. Starting at the hinge of the lid, place the ribs parallel to the hinge working forward until the bottom is filled (the bones on this row must be the same direction all to the left or all to the right). Start a top row at the hinge placing the ribs parallel to the hinge until the required amount is in the tray (the bones on this row must be the same direction all to the left or all to the right). No baby back ribs will be accepted at turn-in.
 - c. <u>BRISKET</u>: Seven (7) full slices, recommended 1/4" to 3/8" thick. <u>Blocking brisket ends is allowed for presentation purposes</u>. The fat cap may be trimmed or cut away before the slices are placed into the tray. Starting at the hinge of the lid, place the slices parallel to the hinge working your way forward.

JUDGING FORMAT

1. Only the approved SABBQ judging sheets will be used. The judging area will be set up and managed by the Other Contest Division Chair and SABBQ Committee members.

- 2. DOUBLE BLIND JUDGING All entries will be submitted in containers which will be provided by the SABBQ Committee. The container is a hinged foam tray with a pair of identically numbered tickets; One ticket will be affixed to the tray. One ticket must have the team's name written on it in ink, when trays are picked up.
- 3. The signed ticket will be the ONLY ticket used to match the ticket number on the ticket taken from the tray during the awards ceremony.
- 4. Each team will be provided with a piece of foil for each turn-in. That foil will be supplied by the SABBQ Committee and may not be substituted with any other foil. The foil supplied is to be placed in the bottom of each tray. The meat is placed on the foil inside the box.
- 5. **TIE BREAKER Brisket will be the tie breaker.** If there is a tie in points, the team that finishes higher in the brisket category will be the one who places higher overall. Example: Teams A and B have 35 points each and are tied for 2nd place. Team A placed 3rd in brisket and Team B placed 2nd in brisket. Team B now becomes 2nd overall and Team A becomes 3rd overall.

CONTESTANT RULES

- 1. Interpretation and Violation of Rules: Contestants are requested to report any rule violation to Contest Management immediately so that appropriate action may be taken. San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. (S.A.L.E.) reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules, and to settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto or otherwise arising out of or connected with, or incident to, the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo; and to amend or add to these rules as its judgment may determine. Any contestant who violates any of the rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as S.A.L.E. may order.
- 2. Decisions: The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases, except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at or before the time of award, is proven. Any objections to a judge must be submitted in writing to Contest Management prior to the event in question.
- 3. Official Protests: Official protests must be submitted in writing to the Contest Management and accompanied by a \$300.00 deposit, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. The protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, giving good and sufficient reasons therefore, and must be delivered to Show Management immediately upon the occasion for such protest. Any protest not officially filed within 24 hours of the alleged incident will not be considered. These cases are referred to the Executive Director and CEO, who will have full power to act, and from whose decision there can be no appeal. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation.
- 4. COVID-19 Safety Information, Duty to Self-Monitor and Assumption of the Risk: All contestants, their family members and other related persons participating in the events or on-grounds at S.A.L.E.'s facilities shall comply with all health and safety orders, rules and guidelines related to COVID-19 promulgated by the State of Texas, County of Bexar, City of San Antonio, CDC and S.A.L.E. While participating in S.A.L.E. events "social distancing" must be practiced and face coverings worn in strict compliance with local health regulations and ordinances to reduce the risks of exposure to COVID-19 as well as wash hands frequently, use hand sanitizer or antibacterial wipes, maintain social distancing and submit to non-invasive body temperature measurement. Any person presenting a body temperature above the temperature threshold designated by local health officials, will not be permitted to participate in the events or be on property at the S.A.L.E.'s facilities.
 - a. Safety Information: Because COVID-19 is extremely contagious and is spread mainly from person-to-person contact, S.A.L.E. has put in place preventative measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19. However, S.A.L.E. cannot guarantee that its participants, volunteers, partners or others in attendance will not become infected with COVID-19.  - a. Contestants suspended under Texas Education Code 33.081 "No Pass, No Play" are ineligible to participate in any San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo activity, event or competition.
- 6. Social Security Number Requirement: Exhibitors/Contestants offered a scholarship must provide their Social Security Number to Contest Management upon request in order to fully qualify for funding.
- 7. Foreign Exchange Students: Foreign Exchange students are ineligible to compete in the Junior Pitmaster Challenge.
- 8. Non-United States Citizens: Non-United States citizens are ineligible to compete in the Junior Pitmaster Challenge.

SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

Fire Extinguishers

Portable fire extinguishers must be identified and readily accessible. Minimum fire extinguisher requirements:

- One 2A-10 BC fire extinguisher is required in each team space.
- One class K fire extinguisher is required when cooking with oil.
- All fire extinguishers must have current (within a year) inspection sticker from a licensed company <u>or</u> team must provide proof that the extinguisher is new (store receipt).

Open Flames, Cooking Equipment and Heaters

- Barbeque pits shall not be located within ten (10) feet of combustible materials.
- Screening must be utilized to contain ALL open flames.
- Ground fires are strictly prohibited.
- Gas cylinders/propane containers must be properly secured at all times to prevent tipping or falling (i.e. tied to a trailer or other structure within barbeque space).
- Propane tanks shall not be located within ten (10) feet of a door or window of a building.
- All dumping ashes and/or coals must be done in a SABBQ provided ash dumpster.

Other Safety Areas

- Golf carts, ATV's and other motorized vehicles are strictly prohibited except for the official use of SABBQ personnel. Bicycles, skateboards and motorized scooters are prohibited.
- All Tents must be anchored and set up as per manufacturers' instructions.
- Tent stakes are strictly prohibited.

- All tents must be flame retardant.
- All tents must be erected with appropriate fittings, fasteners, etc.
- Firearms are not permitted on the premises unless carried by official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Security personnel.
- Alcohol is prohibited on contest property.
- Umbrella and canopy heaters are not allowed inside a tent.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

- 1. Pets are not allowed on the premises; however, service animals will be permitted. Service animals are defined as dogs (or miniature horses when reasonable) that are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for persons with disabilities. Such animals are welcome in areas where the public is allowed to go. Under the ADA, service animals must be harnessed, leashed, or tethered, unless these devices interfere with the service animal's work or the individual's disability prevents using these devices. In that case, the individual must maintain control through voice, signal, or other effective controls. All other animals, including comfort animals, emotional support animals and therapy animals are prohibited.
- 2. Drones, Selfie Sticks, pepper spray/mace, hover boards, firearms (concealed or open carry) and laser pointers are not permitted on the premises at any time.
- 3. Knives are to be used for prepping food only and shall be kept in prep area while in use. While not in use, knives should be stored away in secure area and not left out in the open.

- 4. Payment: Entries are not valid until paid in full. The **registration fee is \$150.00 per team**. Payment must be made at the time of registration. Payments can be made online by credit card, by school check, cashier's check or money order. NO PERSONAL CHECKS ACCEPTED. One form of payment per team. There will be a \$35.00 service charge on all returned checks.
- 5. Refunds and Cancellations: No Refunds will be given if a team cancels or is a no show.
- 6. Teams will be allowed an area of approximate size of 10' x 10'.
- 7. Any and all hard copy mailings and e-mails will be sent to the team leader.
- 8. It is the responsibility of the team leader to keep cook area clean, policed and to ensure team members comply with all Vaquero Cook-Off Rules & Regulations.
- 9. ALL TEAM MEMBERS must have a signed and notarized Indemnification and Release Form. Team members under 18 years of age must have their form signed and notarized by their parents for them to participate. All signed forms will be uploaded at time of entry, prior to the Vaquero Cook-Off.

TEAM PLACEMENT

- 10. Requests must be made in the appropriate section at the time of online registration.
- 11. All requests will be based on availability and no guarantees will be made that your request will be fulfilled.

TEAM SPACE GUIDELINES, REGULATIONS AND SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

GENERAL INFORMATION

2024 WHP - Vaquero Cook-Off Committee members and SAN ANTONIO LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION, INC. management and security shall have access to a contestant's space.

- 1. Teams must check in and pick up their team packet. Each Team will receive a laminated space number with their packet. Packets may be picked up on Saturday, February 3, 2024 at 8:00 am at the Team Check In table. (Indicated on map in Team Packet)
- 2. Each team must prominently display their space numbers and Team Name at all times.
- 3. Teams must keep all activities and exhibits within their designated space and must not be in the main walkways for any reason.
- 4. Each team is responsible for tables, water, trash containers, fire retardant canopy, fire retardant ground protectant/covering, extension cords, internal lighting and fire extinguisher.
- 5. Each team is responsible for all food and cooking items needed for their entries. In the event that a Sponsor provides a food pantry donation, teams will be notified in advance.
- 6. Failure to comply with all safety requirements and regulations may result in disqualification and removal from the Cook-Off.

PARKING AND ENTRY

Information for team entry and loading zone pass will be emailed to the team leader/campus representative prior to the event. Wristbands will be issued at check-in.

LOAD-IN AND LOAD-OUT

- 1. Team, personal items and equipment load in begins on Saturday, February 3, 2024 at 8:00 am and ends on Saturday, February 3, 2024 at 10:00 am.
- 2. All permitted loading passes must be visible from the front windshield. There will be a person stationed in the loading areas to direct you to the appropriate load in/out areas.
- 3. Only vehicles with the permitted loading pass will be allowed to load in/out on Saturday, February 3, 2024.
- 4. Load out of equipment and personal items is not permitted until after Junior Vaquero Cook-Off awards are completed, Saturday, February 3, 2024 and must be completed by 10:00 pm. All team areas must be cleaned up and moved off the grounds by 10:00 pm on Saturday, February 3, 2024.
- 5. Team leader accepts all responsibility for the condition the Cook-Off site is left in. Sites will be inspected. Any damages or if the site is left dirty will result in a bill being sent to team leader. In addition, Team Leader is responsible for any and all food and waste disposal and ensuring that all disposal is handled appropriately and placed in the proper location. Sinks in Market Square are NOT a food, grease or waste disposal area.
- 6. Violators may face disqualification from the Vaquero Cook-Off and participation in any future Vaquero Cook-Off.

VEHICLES, TRAILERS & RVs

- 1. No vehicles are allowed in the Cook-off areas.
- 2. No vehicles are permitted to stay in the Load In/Out area longer than necessary to load in/out your equipment etc.
- 3. Vehicles not in compliance in the Load In/Out area will be towed. The cost of towing and/or impoundment fees to retrieve the vehicle will be at the vehicle owner's sole expense.
- 4. No trailers or RVs are allowed in the Cook-Off area. No overnight camping is allowed in the Cook-Off areas or Market Square.
- 5. Golf carts, ATVs, scooters and other motorized vehicles are prohibited except for official use by the 2024 WHP Vaquero Cook-Off Committee and SAN ANTONIO LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION, INC. personnel.
- 6. Bicycles, motorized scooters, skateboards, hoverboards and Segways are also prohibited.

CANOPIES, FLOOR COVERING, SPACE LAYOUT AND DECORATION

- 1. Canopies will be anchored and set up as per manufacturer's instructions, whether done by a company or individual. Certain locations may require alternative methods. No ground stakes are permitted.
- 2. All canopies must be flame retardant.
- 3. All teams are required to provide their own canopy, tables AND flame-retardant floor covering for their Cook-Off site.
- 4. All canopies must be erected with appropriate fittings, fasteners, etc.
- 5. Combustible materials such as hay, heaters, etc. shall not be located inside canopies.
- 6. General setup will take place on Saturday, February 3, 2024.
- 7. Advertisement of Teams and/or Team Sponsors will be limited to your Cook-Off site only.
- 8. Cook-Off areas will be inspected by the 2024 WHP Vaquero Cook-Off Committee Fire and Safety Inspectors.

ELECTRICAL & GENERATORS

- 1. Generators are NOT allowed in the Cook-Off areas.
- 2. There will be a limited amount of electricity available in Cook-Off areas.
- 3. All entries must be cooked using propane burners and stoves. No electrical appliances will be allowed.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

- 1. All teams are required to have a portable identified and readily available fire extinguisher.
- 2. 2024 WHP Vaquero Cook-Off Committee Fire & Safety Team and City of San Antonio Fire Prevention Division will be inspecting cook-off areas throughout the Cook-Off.
 - a. Minimum fire extinguisher requirements:
 - i. One 2A-10 BC fire extinguisher is required.
 - ii. One "K" type extinguisher will be required for any team that will be deep frying or using oils in their cooking. A 2A-10BC fire extinguisher is required in addition to the "K" type extinguisher.
 - iii. All fire extinguishers shall have current (within a year) inspection sticker from licensed extinguisher company or provide proof that the extinguisher is new (store receipt).

OPEN FLAMES, COOKING EQUIPMENT AND HEATERS

- 1. NO ground fires, BBQ pits or open flames will be allowed at this Cook-Off.
- 2. Teams will be required to cook ALL entries with propane burners/cookers/stoves.
- 3. Gas cylinders/propane containers must be properly secured at all times to prevent tipping or falling.
- 4. Umbrella and canopy heaters are not allowed inside of canopies.

VIDEO RECORDING AND CAMERA CREWS

- 1. Film, video, audio or other recording of the event for commercial purposes is not permitted without the prior written consent of San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc.
- 2. All media, video production companies etc. must obtain written permission and media credentials through the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. Marketing Department at least 30 days prior to the event. Please contact the Marketing Department at (210) 225-0612 or marketing@sarodeo.com

CLEAN UP & TRASH DISPOSAL

- 1. Each team is responsible for the cleanup of their area(s) by Saturday, February 3, 2024 at 10:00pm. All equipment and personal items must be moved out of the area(s) and off of the grounds by this time.
- 2. All team spaces must be cleaned and left in the condition in which they were found when teams arrived on the grounds.
- 3. Grey water, grease, food waste and trash shall be placed in the proper containers for disposal. These containers will be located throughout the Cook-Off areas and designated to you by the Junior Vaquero Cook-Off Team Hospitality Coordinators.

ALCOHOL MANAGEMENT & REGULATIONS

Each team must comply with all current laws and ordinances, including, but not limited to, Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code and any additional rules of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc.

INDIVIDUAL RESPONSIBILITY

1. The team leader will be held responsible for the conduct of team members, guests and any persons who are or have been in his/her team space. Any behavior deemed inappropriate by the 2024 WHP - Vaquero Cook-Off Committee may result in immediate expulsion from the event and forfeiture of future participation.

PROHIBITED BEHAVIORS AND ACTIVITIES

- 1. Certain activities related to alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited.
- 2. At no time may a person under the age of 21 be served alcohol of any nature.
- 3. NO outside alcohol is allowed. There will be beer and wine sales available during the event.
- 4. No glass bottles allowed.

CONTEST RULES AND INFORMATION

GENERAL PUBLIC – HEALTH DEPARTMENT REGULATIONS

- 1. The Health Department (San Antonio Metropolitan Health District) will issue temporary permits for teams to be able to serve samples to the general public. Fees for these permits are included in your entry fee. You will receive these permits at Team Check In on Saturday, February 3, 2024.
- 2. Health inspections for the following items will be performed by San Antonio Metropolitan Health District:
 - a. The Health Department suggests a beverage cooler with a spout to wash your hands under and a bucket to catch the water.
 - b. 3 buckets, bleach and liquid soap one for soap and water to wash utensils, one for bleach to rinse utensils and as a wash basin to wash your hands.
 - c. Covering your food Health Department Rules state that your food must be under cover when you are cutting meat or doing any other preparation.
- 3. <u>Sanitary Conditions</u>: Teams are to prepare and cook in as sanitary a manner as is possible including, but not limited to using gloves, washing hands and avoiding cross-contamination. Cooking conditions are subject to inspection by the 2024 WHP- Vaquero Cook-Off Committee. Infractions identified or witnessed will be immediately addressed and the team will be subject to disqualification.

VAQUERO COOK-OFF RULES

- 1. **Eligibility:** To be eligible, contestants must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or homeschool secondary (high school) schools in Texas at time of contest; and be bona fide residents of the State of Texas. Contestants are responsible for knowing and complying with all rules of this contest. Contestants suspended under Texas Education Code 33.081 "No Pass, No Play" are ineligible to participate in any San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo activity, event or competition.
- 2. **Social Security Number Requirement:** Exhibitors/Contestants offered a scholarship must provide their Social Security Number to contest management upon request in order to fully qualify for funding.
- 3. **Scholarships:** Refer to the Junior Competitive Events Scholarship section of the 2024 Competitive Events Premium List.
- 4. ALL cook-off entries must be prepared and cooked on-site (Market Square). NO pre-cooked entries will be allowed. Cook-Off sites can be inspected at any time.
- 5. In the event that a Sponsored food pantry bag will be given, each team will be notified in advance and a list of items will be given. Teams should be prepared to provide all food items, spices, cooking items, and setup materials.
- 6. All cook-off entries must be cooked using a propane burner, cooker or stove.
- 7. All cook-off entries will be turned in the container(s) that will be provided by the WHP- Vaquero Cook-Off Committee. Teams will receive these containers at check-in/registration.
- 8. All entries must be turned in with the ticket attached. Non-compliance or any tickets that have been tampered with will result in disqualification of the entry.

- 9. Turn-in times for judging will be posted at cook-off for all designated entries. Cook-Off entries may be turned in up to 10 minutes prior to the designated time or up to 10 minutes after the designated time.
- 10. The designated place for turn-ins will be noted on the site map.
- 11. Once door to entry turn-in is closed, NO entries will be admitted for judging in that category.
- 12. First, Second, and Third place will be awarded in each category:
 - a. Cook's Choice Any traditional Mexican Food Dish or Postre Mexicano (Mexican Dessert)
 - b. Charro Beans
 - c. Fideo Loco
- 13. All entries will be judged on flavor, texture and appearance.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Inc. (S.A.L.E.) officials are allowed to impose animal health regulations that are more restrictive than those imposed by the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC). Specific TAHC regulations will supersede the S.A.L.E. requirements if there is a dispute between the two in which S.A.L.E. rules are less restrictive than TAHC regulations. The following summary is a condensed version of the Texas Animal Health Commission regulations. Please contact the Texas Animal Health Commission at 1-800-550-8242 or visit their website, at http://www.tahc.texas.gov/regs/entry.html

S.A.L.E. considers itself an **interstate** (accepting entries of livestock and poultry from within Texas and from other states) show for livestock entries. Due to animals from other states being present on the grounds, regulations concerning interstate shows must be followed. Exhibitors with livestock originating outside the State of Texas are encouraged to contact their state Animal Health officials to confirm specific requirements, if any, their state may impose on animals returning from a Texas show.

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (i.e. CVI, Health Certificate, Health Paper) must indicate that the accredited veterinarian found the animals or fowl to be free of symptoms or evidence of communicable disease and that all tests, immunizations or treatments required by the Texas Animal Health Commission were completed. The certificate is required to accompany animals and fowl entering the State of Texas as stated in the following summary of entry requirements. This certificate may include certain required blood tests and identification markers. Please be sure that the veterinarian is comfortable with the requirements required of the TAHC. The S.A.L.E. Show Veterinarian, Dr. Ben Espy, may be contacted at (210) 861-4765 should there be any questions.

Prior Entry Permits are required as noted for specific classes of livestock. Permits may be obtained by calling (800) 550-8242 or (512) 719-0777, 24 hours a day, or by writing the Texas Animal Health Commission, 2105 Kramer Lane, PO Box 12966, Austin, Texas 78711-2966, or by email to permits@tahc.texas.gov.

CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION WILL BE CHECKED AT THE SALADO CREEK PROPERTY STAGING AREA.

Texas Animal Health Requirements are subject to change; the following are requirements posted as of October 1, 2023.

S.A.L.E., along with the Texas Animal Health Commission, is committed to protecting animal health in Texas. Accordingly, S.A.L.E. fosters the animal health requirements set forth by the state of Texas. Due to the nature of regulations set forth by the Texas Animal Health Commission, and unknown requirements after the posting of S.A.L.E.'s Premium List; S.A.L.E. encourages exhibitors to contact their state Animal Health officials to confirm specific requirements as late as January 1, 2023.

BREEDING BEEF AND DAIRY CATTLE

Texas Origin Cattle

UPDATED

- 1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection** issued within the past 30 days.
- 2. Texas origin dairy cattle are not required to test for tuberculosis to participate in a show, fair or exhibition within the state but must be individually identified with OFFICIAL identification.

Out-of-State Origin Cattle

- 1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection** issued within 30 days of entry into Texas and show grounds.
- 2. All sexually intact dairy cattle, two months of age or older, must have a negative TB test within the past 60 days prior to entry or originate from an accredited free herd. Test results or accredited herd number must be recorded on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- All bulls entering Texas for the purpose of participating at fairs, shows, exhibitions and/or rodeos, which are more than 12 months of age may enter the state without testing for trichomoniasis, but shall obtain a permit prior to entry into the state. Bulls permitted for entry into the State of Texas under the provisions of this subsection shall not be commingled with female cattle or used for breeding. Bulls that stay in the state more than 60 days must be tested negative for trichomoniasis with an official Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test. Bulls for show and sale should have trichomoniasis testing prior to entry for the show.

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection <u>not</u> required.

BREEDING GOATS (INCLUDING COMMERCIAL DOES)

Texas Origin Goats & Out of State Origin Goats

- 1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection** issued within 30 days.
- 2. **Scrapie Premise Identification Ear Tag** is required for goats to be exhibited. The registration tattoo may be used in lieu of the eartag if the registration papers accompany the animals along with a scrapie premise ID number.

MARKET GOATS (Terminal Show)

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection <u>not</u> required.

BREEDING SHEEP (INCLUDING COMMERCIAL EWES)

Texas Origin Sheep

- 1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection** issued within 30 days.
- 2. **Scrapie Premise Identification Ear Tag** is required for sheep to be exhibited.

Out-of-State Origin Sheep

- 1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection** issued within 30 days.
- 2. Scrapie Premise Identification Ear Tag is required for sheep to be exhibited.
- 3. Breeding rams of six months of age or older must have a negative ELISA test for the Brucella Ovis within 30 days prior to being entered in a show, fair, or exhibition, or they may come from a Brucella Ovis-free flock. The test results or herd number must be written on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

MARKET LAMBS (Terminal Show)

1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection <u>not</u> required.

BREEDING SWINE (INCLUDING CROSSBRED)

Texas Origin Swine

- 1. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection** issued within 30 days, this certificate must certify that swine have not been fed garbage, not been vaccinated for pseudorabies, have been permanently identified, and have not been exposed to pseudorabies.
- 2. **Leptospirosis vaccination is required** on breeding swine, six months of age or older, within 30 days prior to entry with Leptospirosis vaccine containing the following strains: Canicola, Hardjo, Icterohaemorrhagiae, Grippotyphosa, Pomona.
- 3. <u>Crossbred Gilts ONLY</u>- Brucellosis and Pseudorabies test required for all breeding swine 6 months of age and older within 30 days prior to change of ownership. Swine from certified free herds are exempt from testing.

Out of State Origin Swine

- 1. A certificate of veterinary inspection accompanying swine entering Texas must contain the following statement from the issuing veterinarian, "Swine have not originated from a premises known to be affected by Novel Swine Enteric Coronavirus Disease(s) (SECD) and have not been exposed to SECD within the last 30 days."
- 2. **Certificate of Veterinary Inspection** issued within 30 days, this certificate must certify that swine have not been fed garbage, not been vaccinated for pseudorabies, have been permanently identified, and have not been exposed to pseudorabies.
- 3. **Leptospirosis vaccination is required** on breeding swine, six months of age or older, within 30 days prior to entry with Leptospirosis vaccine containing the following strains: Canicola, Hardjo, Icterohaemorrhagiae, Grippotyphosa, Pomona.

*Open Show Heifers only will be allowed to remain on the Show Grounds through Monday night, February 12, provided they are entered in the Junior Heifer Show. Exhibitors must notify the Beef Cattle Office by Saturday, February 10 at 5 PM of their intention to do so. Absolutely NO bulls will be allowed to stay in the barns for any part of the Junior Show.

- **1. Entry:** Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout. Cattle double entered in the Junior Show must be submitted separately online.
- **2. Health Papers:** Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the past 30 days **is required**. Check the Animal Health Requirements on Page 38 for more detailed information.
- **3. Group Classes:** All Group Class entries can be made upon arrival at the Show with the Superintendent (*Note: Group Classes will not be submitted online*). Group Entry Forms will be provided to the exhibitor for completion. There will be no entry fees or premiums paid for Group Classes. Group Entry Forms should be completed with the "name of group class" (i.e. Get-of-Sire). Name of Sire and/or Dam must be on entry form. All animals must have been entered and shown in individual classes to be eligible for a group class. No owner may place more than two animals or two groups in any one class. However, an exhibitor may enter and show a third animal in only one individual class for the sole purpose of qualifying for the get-of-sire class.
- **4. Ownership/Registration:** Animals must be registered in the Herdbook of their Association in the name of the owner(s). Registration Certificates must be available upon request.

UPDATED

5. Stalling/Tie-Spaces: Open Beef Cattle will be stalled upon arrival. Front and end panels may be covered, but there will be no panels or covering behind the cattle without Superintendent approval. No stalls will be assigned specifically for tack or lounging.

UPDATED

- **6. Bedding:** NO OUTSIDE BEDDING WILL BE ALLOWED. All bedding will be provided by the show. The use of artificial grass mats and carpets are prohibited as bedding in all barns. Cedar fiber, straw and hay bedding is prohibited in beef cattle stalls. Insofar as possible, appropriate types of bedding will be available for sale on the Grounds at the FEED STORE. Discretion as to what constitutes acceptable bedding is held exclusively by Show Management.
- 7. Show Check-in Procedures: Exhibitors must check-in using the QR code or other materials provided by the Competitive Events office. Animal Name, Birthdate, Breed, Sex, Registration Number, Herd Number and Class will be submitted/confirmed at Check-In.
- **8. Premium Schedule:** To be determined for each breed at the conclusion of the show. Premium amounts may vary among breeds.
- 9. Breed Association Rules: Owners must comply with the special rules of the respective breed associations.
- **10. Clippers:** No clippers which require an electric cord are allowed to be used on Open Beef Cattle once they arrive on the grounds. Cordless clippers are allowed.
- 11. General Equipment: Blocking of aisles or doorways (with chairs, showboxes, feed pans, feed, etc.) is strictly prohibited. No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Livestock Barns. Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes.
- 12. Show Equipment: Livestock shows provide an opportunity for the general public to be exposed to agricultural exhibits. Exhibitors should be mindful of the show equipment being used and the manner in which it is being used. Show Management or Livestock Committee Leadership/Ring Stewards reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor. Cable halters and pronged chains are prohibited for all species. Exhibitors will be allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring.
- **13. Fans:** Fans will not be permitted in aisles. No fans are permitted behind the cattle. Only 1 fan per 5 head is permitted. *Portacool or similar fans will not be permitted on Grounds.*

Only one (1) person per animal is permitted in the show arena during exhibition of individual classes, with exceptions made by one of the following: a) A physical or mental disability that prevents the proper handling of the animal without assistance or, b) a handler that has a physical injury (sprained ankle, broken arm, etc.) that requires assistance. Any request for an assistant shall provide the event that an assistant is required and approved, the assistant shall provide the least amount of interference as possible for the handler to properly display the animal and shall not interfere with any other entrant or otherwise block the path or view of the judge.
- 5. All animal tattoos will be checked for legibility and must match the registration papers for that animal. Animals with illegible tattoos or incorrect papers will not be allowed to show.
- 6. Animals entered in group classes must have been shown in an individual class.
- 7. Heifers exhibited at 24 months of age or older must be accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy or be nursing their natural calf at side (under 6 months of age).
- 8. All bulls 12 months and older must be led with a nose lead at all times.
- 9. All bulls 20 months of age or older that are exhibited must have passed a fertility examination given by a licensed veterinarian to be eligible to show. Once a bull has a positive exam, retesting is not required.
- 10. All BBU Registered animals must be shown with their hair coats lying downward and flat against their entire body. Hair trimming is permissible and must be done in those few areas such as the neck and portions of the topline of the animal which may or may not lay flat against the body. Hair may not be trained upwards or forwards and/or pulled upwards or forwards on any part of the animal's body. No animals may have foreign object(s) attached to it in any manner or have its natural color altered in a manner so as to change the conformation or appearance. An exhibitor who fails to abide by this rule will be dismissed from the arena and/or forfeit premiums, awards, and points from the show.
- 11. Each animal must be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical, or other appearance change for cosmetic purposes (such as silicon injections or other injections for cosmetic purposes), save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming, or dehorning.
- 12. Determinations regarding classes and the splitting of classes shall be made in the sole discretion of the show official or coordinator and are not subject to review or protest.
- **13.** The failure of a BBU member to abide by these rules may constitute a cause for exclusion from BBU pursuant to Article 1, section 9 of the Bylaws of BBU. Code of Conduct will be enforced.
- **14.** Any and all protests must be written and filed with a BPG officer or Director no later than 1 hour after the conclusion of the show, accompanied by a \$150 nonrefundable protest fee.
- 15. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in a BPG approved show, each exhibitor hereby releases BPG and their respective officials, sponsors, agents, officers, directors, employees and representatives from any and all claims, liabilities, suits and judgements, arising from or connected with the administration or use of any animal test, rule enforcement and the resulting decision or action based thereon.

ABBA OFFICIAL SHOW CLASS SPECIAL CONDITIONS

- A. All Animals exhibited must be registered with the American Brahman Breeders Association ("ABBA") and be appropriately fire branded as provided by ABBA requirements for registration in the ABBA Official Brahman Herdbook.
- B. All Animals exhibited are subject to the ABBA Color Classification Rules as established from time to time. A copy of the most current ABBA Color Classification Rules may be obtained from the ABBA.
- C. All animals exhibited are subject to the ABBA DNA Verification Rules as established from time to time. A copy of the most current ABBA DNA Verification Rules may be obtained from the ABBA.
- D. All Females exhibited in the Senior Division must either [1] be accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy issued by a licensed veterinarian (within 90 days prior to the date of the Show) certifying the Animal is pregnant and such certificate shall be made available for inspection and verification upon request, [2] be in a lactating stage and have her natural, nursing calf at side, which Calf has not exceeded 240 days old as of the date of the Show, or [3] have weaned her natural calf which Calf is registered in the ABBA Official Brahman Herdbook and the Calf's registration certificate is available for inspection and verification upon request.
- E. All Females exhibited in the Aged Senior Division* must either [1] be in a lactating stage and have her natural, nursing calf at side which Calf has not exceeded 240 days old as of the date of the Show, or [2] have weaned her natural calf which Calf is registered in the ABBA Official Brahman Herdbook and the Calf's registration certificate is available for inspection and verification upon request. *FOR THE SPRING 2024 SHOW SEASON ONLY, FEMALES EXHIBITED IN CLASS 34 LATE AGED SENIOR COWS SHALL BE ALLOWED TO BE EXHIBITED WITHOUT A NATURAL, NURSING CALF AT SIDE PROVIDED THE FEMALE MEETS THE PREGNANCY STATUS REQUIREMENTS OF THE SENIOR DIVISION OF FEMALES.
- F. All Bulls must be exhibited with a permanent or temporary nose ring with an appropriate lead attached.
- G. All Bulls exhibited in the Senior and Aged Senior Divisions must be accompanied by a valid, satisfactory Breeding Soundness Exam (BSE) certification issued by a licensed veterinarian (within one year prior to the date of the Show) and such certification shall be made available for inspection and verification upon request.
- H. All Animals in the Calf and Junior Yearling Divisions which have been previously disqualified from being exhibited at an ABBA Approved Show based on not meeting Weights and Measures Parameters may not be exhibited at another ABBA Approved Show until such time as [1] the Animal re-qualifies by meeting Weights and Measures Parameters at a subsequent ABBA Approved Show where weights and measures are taken, or [2] the Animal is no longer being exhibited in the Calf or Junior Yearling Divisions at ABBA Approved Shows.
- I. All Group Classes will be exhibited at the beginning of the ABBA Approved Show prior to any individual classes being exhibited in such Show. All individual Animals exhibited in Group Classes must be presented by an individual Showman for each participating Animal for the Group to be placed by the Judge(s).
- J. All Animals exhibited in the Get of Sire, Natural Produce of Dam and Embryo Produce of Dam Group Classes at an ABBA Approved Show must be exhibited under the registered color of the represented Sire or Dam; NOT the color of the progeny comprising the Group. The Breeders Genetic Group and Breeder's Herd shall be exhibited under the registered

color of the individual Animals (which all must be registered as the same color) comprising the Group.

K. All Classes which exceed more than fifteen (15) Animals MAY be broken into smaller Classes each no larger than 15 Animals, at the sole discretion of Show Management, by dividing the Classes as evenly as possible without splitting Animals with the same birth date. Additional Classes resulting from splitting Classes shall be treated as new individual Classes (and not as heats of a single Class) for purposes of class placings, competition within Divisions, and ABBA Register of Renown Points awarded.

No ownership requirement for the participating individual Animals in the Group. No single Exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than one entry per Dam. All entries in this Class must be placed by the Judge(s). There will be named a Champion and Reserve Champion of this Group Class.
- **G3. GET OF SIRE -** Four (4) Animals all by the same Sire from at least two different Dams, both sexes must be represented. Each Animal in the Group must also be exhibited in the appropriate individual Class for such Animal. No ownership requirement for the participating individual Animals in the Group. No single Exhibitor shall be permitted to show more than one entry per Sire. All entries in this Class must be placed by the Judge(s). There will be named a Champion and Reserve Champion of this Group Class.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Owner of record on all animals entered in an IBBA National or Regional point show must be active members of the IBBA in good standing.
- 2. Animals must be registered in the International Brangus Breeders Association (IBBA) to be eligible to compete in an IBBA-sponsored show. The registration certificate (or photocopy) for each entry must be available for presentation to the Superintendent or show manager at the time entry is verified prior to judging.
- 3. Animals recorded in the IBBA Appendix, Ultrablack or Ultrared registries are ineligible to show.
- 4. The registration number, permanent animal identification number (brand or tattoo), birth date and sire of each animal entered in an individual class must be listed on the entry form.
- 5. Any Brangus animal recorded in the IBBA registry that has a "Parentage Dispute" listed in its first three-generation pedigree is ineligible for participation in Brangus shows and exhibitions. If the dispute is resolved, the listing will be removed from the pedigree and show eligibility will be restored.
- 6. The IBBA, and its representatives, have the authority to require such tests as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification and pedigree of exhibited Brangus animals. Said authority shall extend to, and cover the enforcement of, all show rules as adopted by the IBBA.
- 7. Prior to check-in, heads of breeding animals must be clipped of all hair (including topknots) and be free of scurs and/or slick spots.
- 8. Any animal found to have scurs and/or slick spots, or evidence of incisions, surgical or otherwise, in the following areas: head, testicles, sheath, navel or dewlap; including scars from caesarean sections, will be disqualified from showing. Animals with illegal white (white in front of the navel) or any indication of brindling (a color pattern characterized by red streaks mingled with black) are ineligible for show. Any animal upon check in which does not have a legible tattoo or brand corresponding to its registration certificate is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to incorrect or illegible tattoo/brand, animals cannot be re-tattooed and rechecked at show. The brand/tattoo can be corrected and rechecked at the next available show.
- 9. In IBBA sanctioned shows, no animal may be shown that has been artificially filled with any amount of liquid at any time once the animal enters the grounds of a show. The fitter or ranch entity involved with an animal being artificially filled will be banned from the show ring for one year and the animal will be disqualified from exhibition at that particular show. The official show veterinarian may administer liquids orally, if so needed without disqualifying animal(s) from exhibition.
- 10. No animal may be shown that has had any foreign objects glued to or otherwise attached in a manner so as to alter its conformation or change its appearance. Animals unethically fitted to alter the conformation or appearance of the animal will be disqualified. Tail ties and hair nets used on the tail and switch are the only exceptions.
- 11. Paint or coloring agents of any kind are not to be used on any animal exhibited at IBBA sponsored shows. The use of aerosol products of any kind will not be permitted in the line-up area for the show. Animals will be toweled in the line-up area prior to entering the show ring. Animals found in violation of these policies will be disqualified from showing.

- 12. All Brangus bulls 15 months of age or older that are exhibited at IBBA sponsored shows must have passed a fertility examination given by a licensed veterinarian to be eligible to show. The results of the examination must be available at check-in. Once a bull has a positive examination, retesting is not required.
- 13. All bulls (shown as an individual entry) must be shown with a nose ring or nose restraint with lead attached.
- 14. Weights and scrotal measurements will be taken at check-in at all four of the IBBA National Shows. Any bull can be weighed before they enter the show ring and cannot have more than a 7.5% gain. Anyone may protest a bull's gain and cause them to be weighed by submitting a written protest to the ethics committee prior to the start of the bull show.
- 15. All females 20 months of age or older exhibited at IBBA sanctioned shows, must have available at the time of check-in, a certificate of pregnancy issued by an accredited, non-owner veterinarian, or blood test results certificate. If the female is open due to being in an embryo transfer program, this fact must be verified in a written statement by a non-owner embryologist. If verification cannot be produced, the female may be allowed to participate if the exhibitor can produce a qualified veterinarian to examine the female at the show site and verify pregnancy.
- **16.** All calves exhibited at the side of a Brangus female must be registered with the IBBA and meet all rules required for show eligibility and inspections of exhibits.
- 17. Animals eligible to be shown in group classes must be entered and shown in respective individual classes. Cows exhibited in the cow/calf classes are not eligible for the group classes.
- 18. Entries that have not complied with all of the above rules will not be eligible to show, to receive premium monies, or earn points in the IBBA's Show Sire of the Year, Show Dam of the Year, Show Bull of the Year, and Show Heifer of the Year awards.
- 19. All IBBA and IJBBA members will abide by the show rules as adopted. In addition, any show, fair, event or display in which Brangus cattle participate should follow these rules as adopted by IBBA. All Brangus entries are subject to the provision of a rule of the IBBA entitled "Inspection of Exhibits".

INSPECTION OF EXHIBITS

- 1. The IBBA and its representative have the authority to require such tests as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification and pedigree of exhibited Brangus animals. Said authority shall extend to and cover the enforcement of all show rules as adopted by IBBA.
- 2. Each exhibitor shall submit his or her registered Brangus cattle to such tests and examinations as requested and/or required by the IBBA, its authorized representatives, or those of the relevant show.
- 3. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any Brangus function each exhibitor hereby releases the Association, its officers, directors, and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits, and judgments past, present, or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision there from.
- 4. Dental Inspection: All entries may be classified for judging on an age basis and should be entered in class according to age. Teeth may be inspected by a veterinarian designated by the I.B.B.A. in order to determine whether dental development is within allowable limits for the class so entered. If the veterinarian determines that in his opinion dental development exceeds maximum allowable limits, the animal shall be moved to an older class as determined by the veterinarian and shall remain in that class until determined otherwise by subsequent mouthing or favorable appeal to the Executive Committee. If it is not possible to move an animal, the animal may not be exhibited in such show.
- 5. Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any such test, exam, or show rule enforcement, as applied to his animals, shall do so in accordance with procedures established by the rules of the IBBA.
- 6. Appeal: An appeal from the decision of the veterinarian or designated association representatives designated by the I.B.B.A. under sections 2 and 6 of the Inspection of Exhibits may be made to the Executive Committee of the IBBA if the following requirements are satisfied: 1) the appeal is in writing and is signed by the appealing party; and 2) the appealing party files the written appeal with the IBBA Executive Committee as soon as possible after the veterinarian's or designated association representative's decision is rendered and in any event within six (6) hours of the time the veterinarian's or designated association representative's decision was made. If an appeal satisfying the foregoing requirements is filed with the IBBA Executive Committee, the Executive Committee shall hold a hearing at which the appealing party and the veterinarian or designated association representatives whose decision is being appealed shall present statements and other evidence that are relevant to the matter, following which the Executive Committee shall render a decision which shall be final and conclusive.

RULES VIOLATION POLICY

1. A show rules violation to be a valid complaint must be accompanied by a written statement describing the violation, the perpetrator of the violation, and signed by an active member of the IBBA. This written complaint will be presented to an Ethics Committee consisting of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Executive Committee Liaison, and an appointed member. All four people will be current members of the show committee. A minimum of two of these members must be present at the Show where the rule violation occurs. The Chairman shall appoint other members of the Show Committee to ensure a minimum of two on this committee at each IBBA approved show.

- The Committee shall rule on the validity of the rule violation. The committee shall visit with the perpetrator, present the written complaint, and make a ruling on the complaint if valid.
- The perpetrator is entitled to appeal any decision made by the Ethics Show Committee to the Executive Committee of the IBBA but the Executive Committee has the right to disqualify the perpetrator from the IBBA approved show after hearing an appeal. The Executive Committee's decision will be final.
- Without the Executive Committee's decision, the perpetrator cannot be disqualified from this particular IBBA approved show. However, the animal can be disqualified by the Ethics Committee if the rule violation is deemed valid.
- For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any Brangus function, each exhibitor hereby releases the Association, its officers, directors, and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits, and judgments past, present, or future, arising from or connected with this policy and the resulting decision there from.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Eligibility for Entry:
 - a. To be eligible to exhibit, youth must be three (3) years of age, but not nineteen (19) on January 1 of show year.
 - **b.** Exhibitors must be current active members of the Miniature Hereford Breeders Association. Siblings may share family membership, but all heifers and steers shall be in the individual name of Exhibitor and shown according to Exhibitor's age in the proper class.

- c. Steers and heifers must be registered in the AHA and meet height requirements in order to participate. No steer certificates allowed.
- **d.** Steers and heifers that are over the height restriction will be disqualified.

UPDATED

- **e.** All entries must be weighed and measured at the show in order to be eligible to show.
- 2. Rules and Regulations: Rules and regulations of individual shows apply to this division as well as those listed.

3. Ownership:

- a. Ownership of prospect steers must be established no less than thirty days prior to the opening day of the 2024 General Livestock Show.
- **b.** Ownership of Market steers must be established by August 1, 2023.
- c. Ownership of heifers must be established no less than thirty days prior to the opening day of the 2024 General Livestock Show.
- **d.** Animals must be in the name of the exhibitor.

4. Possession, Care and Feeding:

- **a.** Animals entered must be in the possession of the exhibitor no later than the above dates. The exhibitor is responsible for the general custody, care and feeding of their animal when possible, or to help when it is not possible to care for the animal unassisted. Family members and fellow participants may help with these tasks.
- **b.** All animals in this division MUST be completely broke to lead for the safety of exhibitor and others in the show Ring. Animals not deemed fit will be removed from the show ring and disqualified from the competition.

5. Fitting of the Animal:

- a. All animals will be presented in a proper condition for a beef show. Exhibitors are encouraged to help in any way that is safe and possible for them to do so, but not endanger either themselves, their animals, or others in the process.
- **b.** Alteration of conformation and structure by prohibited substance or unethical fitting is prohibited. Any violation of this rule will result in immediate disqualification without recourse.
- c. The injection, use, or administration of any drug that is prohibited by Federal, State, or Local Law or any drug that is used in manner prohibited by Federal, State, or Local Law will result in immediate disqualification without recourse.
- d. Any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conductive to the continued health or marketability of beef carcasses or for deception will result in immediate disqualification without recourse.
- e. Every participant in consideration of their entry being accepted by the show, specifically represents that no animal entered is misrepresented in any way except trimming of feet and blocking of hair.
- **f.** This is a blow & go show. No adhesives are allowed.
- 6. Official weight and height: The weight and height recorded at check-in will be the official weight and height. Market steer height must be 48 inches or less at the hip at the time of Check-In.
- Check weight and height: The MHBA reserves the right, at its discretion, to check the weight, height, and tattoo of any animal.

8. Showing of animals:

- **a.** Exhibitors in this division under the age of 5 will be required to have parental, sibling, or other participant accompaniment in the show ring, except in showmanship classes.
- b. All exhibitors may have parental, sibling, or other participant accompaniment in the show ring, except in showmanship classes.
- c. Exhibitors are to handle the majority of the showing, and the use of the show stick. Assistants may help in the control of the animal. It is not the intent of MHBA for a Youth to walk around the arena while the helper shows for that exhibitor.
- Show harness: All Youth exhibitors will be required to wear a show number harness for each animal shown in a class. These harnesses hold the number in place in plain sight.
- 10. Safety: The purpose for the Youth steer classes is to offer the opportunity to young cattlemen and women to participate in shows despite their lack of age required to show in a Junior Show. Although the rules and regulations have been set, safety is the most important factor in this event.
- 11. Youth female classes may be divided into heats by age and/or number of entries in a class by Show Management.

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12. Youth Prospect steers less than 12 months of age, Market steers 12 months of age and older as of the opening day of the 2024 General Livestock Show. Prospect and Market steer classes will be divided by weight (and/or number of entries) into classes of Light, Medium, and Heavy by Show Management.

SPECIAL RULES

- All exhibits of Santa Gertrudis breeding cattle must be registered meeting the requirements for registration as outlined in the Santa Gertrudis Rules and Regulations for Registration, and shall be governed by the last revised version of the Rules and Regulations for Approved Santa Gertrudis Open and Junior Shows as approved by the board of Santa Gertrudis Breeders International; P.O. Box 1257; Kingsville, TX 78364. A copy may be obtained by contacting the association or viewed at www.santagertrudis.com.
- 2. Each owner must be a member in good standing with SGBI. No outstanding balances on an active or junior member's account.
- 3. ALL animals accepted for exhibition in an SGBI sanctioned show are subject to inspection at each show between arrival on grounds and prior to entering the show ring. The inspection will be conducted by a committee comprised of two (2) members of the Shows and Exhibits Committee and one (1) from the Breed Standards Committee.

4. Heifers twenty-four (24) months of age or older must be safe in calf as verified by a graduate veterinarian or have produced a live, Santa Gertrudis sired calf with that calf at side meeting the Standard of Excellence and the calf must be registered by thirty (30) days of age. All bulls twenty-four (24) months of age or older must provide a passing BSE test per show season.

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- 5. All bulls eleven (11) months of age and older must be exhibited with a permanent nose ring.
- **6.** All animals must be registered or recorded and PERMANENTLY identified before the show with a brand ID or an ear tattoo.
- 7. FITTING
 - a. Purebred fitting All purebred animals must be exhibited with the hair brushed down on the entire body, legs and tail with no foreign objects attached to the animal in a manner as to alter the animal's conformation or changes its appearance. Hair may not be trained upwards or forwards and/or pulled upwards or forwards on any part of the animal's body. Exhibitors failing to abide by this rule will not be allowed to show.

Specifically, all hair must be brushed down slick; head clipped smooth; underline clipped blending sides; udder and teats clipped with no long hair to emphasize udder; ears clipped as to environmental and local standards; neck and brisket clipped; body clipped using common sense as to season; leg hair clipped and do not leave long from hock or knee to hoof; tail head clipped; pull switch or brush out (no ball, etc.) trim tail to personal preference.

- **b.** Star Five Fitting Star 5 exhibits are not subject to purebred clipping rules. Entries are to be fitted as blow and go. Hair may be brushed according to preference with no paint or adhesives on any part of the body.
- 8. Each animal exhibited must be exhibited with the correct age and shown in the class corresponding with their correct age.
- 9. Entries in each class will be placed 1, 2, 3, etc. Animals are to be presented in descending order according to age.
- 10. Polled classes will be entered at the same time as class entries are required by each show. Animals will be lined up according to age for the judge. To be eligible to show in Best of Polled, animals must be slick polled with no scurs, no scars, no dehorning and with no evidence of horny tissue.
- 11. Classes with over thirty (30) entries should be divided into sections and section winners return for final placing.
- **12.** The judge should be an SGBI approved judge.
- **13.** Dress for exhibitors participating in SGBI sanctioned Open and Junior shows shall be of neat and clean clothing of collared shirts with sleeves, belts, no midriffs showing and appropriate footwear no tennis shoes. Exhibitors may wear hats or go bareheaded no caps.
- 14. Each animal shall be presented in the show ring in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical, or other appearance change, save only branding, tattooing, foot trimming or dehorning. Additionally, no pumping or filling of an animal with a liquid, air, or any other substance is allowed. ALL animals and exhibitors found to be in violation of this rule will be banned for life from showing at SGBI approved shows.
- 15. Every exhibitor, in consideration of his/her entry being accepted, agrees to submit any animal so entered by him/her to inspection and agrees to have such animal submitted to any test as may be designated and requested by the Shows and Exhibits Committee, or the authorized representatives of the relevant show or fair, and agrees that the conclusions reached by the committee/representative as the whether such animal is unethically fitted or over age, shall be final, without recourse, against SGBI and designated personnel. Any false representation, interference or unprofessional conduct on the part of any exhibitor will be dealt with by the Shows and Exhibits Committee according to the equities of the case.
- 16. For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in any SGBI approved show, each exhibitor hereby releases SGBI, its officers, directors and representatives from negligence, any and all claims, suits and judgments, either past, present, or future, arising from or connected with the administration or use of such test or examination and the resulting decision therefrom.
- 17. Any exhibitor desiring to dispute or challenge the results of any test, exam, or show rule enforcement, as applied to his/her animals, shall do so in accordance with procedures established by the rules of the association. This refers to, but is not limited to, the procedures to file protest and appeals process.

18. Appeals:

- a. The Chairman of the Shows and Exhibits Committee and the Vice President of Youth Activities in conjunction with the person(s) responsible for coordinating the individual shows will continue to be primarily vested with authority to determine whether animals entered shows meet the standards formally approved by the Breed Standards Committee.
- b. In the event the Vice President of Youth Activities or individual show coordinating official disqualifies an animal form participating in a youth show and the exhibitor wants to appeal the disqualification, the appeal process outlined below must be followed.
- c. In the even the Chairman of Shows and Exhibits or individual show coordinating official disqualifies an animal from participating in a sanctioned show, and the exhibitor wants to appeal the disqualification, the appeal process outlined below must be followed.
- d. Additionally, any exhibitor participating in an individual youth show or other SGBI sanctioned show that wants to appeal a breed standards disqualification decision by either the Vice President for Youth Activities/youth show coordinating official or the Chairman of Shows and Exhibits/show coordinating official must follow the appeals process outlined below.

Appeals Committee

The appeals committee will be comprised by the following three (3) members- the Vice President of Breed Improvement, the Vice President of Marketing and Promotions, and the Executive Director of SGBI. All three (3) members must be present to constitute a quorum. All decisions rendered by the Appeals Committee will be binding and final for all appeals submitted to the committee.

Appeals Procedure

- a. All qualifications/disqualification appeals and appropriate supporting documentation submitted by exhibitors must be submitted in writing to the Executive Director of SGBI. The written appeal must be accompanied by a \$200 process fee. No waivers will be granted to the requirements for written appeals and the upfront \$200 fee.
- b. Exhibitors must file written appeals postmarked or via email within five (5) business days following the date of the show governing the qualification/disqualification decision by the primary officials (Vice President of Youth Activities/show coordinating official or Chairman of Shows and Exhibits/event coordinating official).

- c. The Executive Director will be responsible for coordinating meetings of the Appeals Committee and forwarding copies of the appeal and supporting documentation to the other committee members.
- **d.** The Appeals Committee will render a final decision within five (5) business days following receipt of the written appeal, appropriate supporting documentation and the \$200 fee.
- e. In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee approves the exhibitor's appeal, the animal covered by the appeal will be qualified to participate in all future SGBI sanctioned events.
- **f.** In the event an exhibitor appeals a disqualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee disapproves the exhibitor's appeal, the animal covered by the appeal will be disqualified from participating in future SGBI sanctioned events. Additionally, any points or awards previously given to the owner of the animal will be forfeited.
- **g.** In the event an exhibitor appeals a qualification decision by the primary official and the Appeals Committee rules that the animal covered by the appeal does not meet breed standards, the covered animal will be disqualified from participating in future shows and the owner of the animal will forfeit any points and awards previously granted.

19. Procedures to File Protest:

- **a.** File protest with the show that infraction occurred. Follow their protest rules.
- **b.** File the same protest with the Shows and Exhibits Committee. Contact the chairman.
- **c.** Three (3) exhibitors in good standing must sign the protest.
- d. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$100.00, cash or certified check, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Shows and Exhibits Committee within twenty-four (24) hours after the occasion for such protests.
- **e.** Order of hearing a protest:
 - i. Chairman of Shows and Exhibits Committee
 - ii. Action by Shows and Exhibits Committee
 - iii. Final action by Board of Directors
 - iv. Follow appeal procedure as outlined in Rules and Regulations
- **f.** All rules and regulations that have been properly protested to the Shows and Exhibits Committee shall be subject to the following penalties:
 - i. Loss of Premium Money
 - ii. Loss of Awards
 - iii. Suspension from showing that animal as deemed necessary. Penalty may be for one, two, or three shows or as long as deemed necessary for the offense.
 - iv. Suspension of the exhibitor being the same as other SGBI Rules and penalties.
- **20.** Failure to adhere to each shows specific rules shall also be subject to these penalties. Proper protest procedures must be adhered to according to that particular show's rules. SGBI will follow each show's rules and any action taken by a show will be upheld by SGBI in relation to its bearing on our point show system.
- 21. Disqualifications: An exhibitor who has been disqualified from competition in any livestock show or has had a premium withheld or withdrawn on the grounds of rule violation(s) will not be allowed to compete in other shows. This shall include, but not limited to, disqualification for fraud, misrepresentation, unethical fitting or deception. Judging procedures will NOT be interrupted for protest investigation. Depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No complaint or appeal regarding a judge's decision or method of selection will be considered. Show officials may excuse an exhibitor from the ring and exclude them from further competition if an exhibitor, in any way, whether in person or by their representative interferes or shows disrespect to a judge or show official. In the event that an exhibitor or animal is disqualified after they have been awarded premiums or awards, the exhibitor or animal placing immediately below them may be moved up to fill the vacated position at the discretion of the Shows and Exhibits Committee.

22. Rules for High Point Awards

- **a.** For each point show, first place class winner will receive 2 points; second place class winner receives 1 point; Division Champion receives 3 points; Reserve Division Champion receives 2 points; Grand Champion receives 5 points and Reserve Grand Champion receives 4 points; Best of Polled receives 1 point but does not count toward overall points.
- a. Get of Sire and Produce of Dam points go toward Exhibitor/Breeder of the Year Awards.
- **b.** Points will stay with animal if sold.
- c. The Sire and Dam of the Year should have points from at least two (2) different offspring.
- **d.** All points earned at the National Open Show are to be doubled.
- **25. DNA Testing** SGBI and its representatives have the authority to require such tests as they deem necessary to verify the accuracy of the classification, pedigree of exhibited animals, and parentage verification of Star 5, including calves exhibited at the side of any female. "Said authority shall extend to and cover the enforcement of all show rules as adopted by SGBI."



- 1. Entry Fees: Breed Associations may require additional entry fees. Please read association guidelines.
- 2. Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout.
- 3. Number Shown: Each owner may enter a maximum of one heifer.
- **4. Double Entry:** Heifers may be double entered in the Open Show if they are eligible under Department Open Beef. Junior Heifers may be double-entered in the Open Breeding Beef Show, but must have been submitted as a separate entry via the online entry system.

UPDATED

- 5. Validation: To be eligible, heifers must be validated with the Texas 4-H and FFA Breeding Heifer Validation Program administered by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and the Texas Education Agency. DNA Samples will be collected on Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion heifers as well as any other heifer designated by Show Management. In the event the DNA analysis reveals there is not a positive match, the animal will be disqualified. The deadline for heifer validation is November 1, 2023, but exhibitors need to check with their local County Extension Agent or Agriculture Science Teacher for local/county deadlines. *Original* Registration Certificates must be available upon request and should be on your person while showing in class.
- 6. Ownership/Registration: Animals must be registered in the Herdbook of their Association in only the name of the Junior owner on or before November 1, the year preceding the show. Purchase, delivery, possession, transfer, and registration must all take place on or before November 1, the year preceding the show. Registration Certificates must be available upon request.

UPDATED

7. Stalling/Tie-Spaces: Junior Breeding Heifers will be stalled upon arrival. FFA Chapters and/or 4-H Clubs wishing to be stalled together must arrive together at the Salado Creek Property. Front and end panels may be covered, but there will be no panels or covering behind the cattle without Superintendent approval. No stalls will be assigned specifically for tack or lounging.

- 8. Bedding: NO OUTSIDE BEDDING WILL BE ALLOWED. All bedding will be provided by the show. The use of artificial grass mats and carpets are prohibited as bedding in all barns. Cedar fiber, straw and hay bedding is prohibited in beef cattle stalls. Insofar as possible, appropriate types of bedding will be available for sale on the Grounds at the FEED STORE. Discretion as to what constitutes acceptable bedding is held exclusively by Show Management.
- 9. Check-In: Exhibitors must check-in using materials provided by the Competitive Events office.
- **10. Animal Substitution:** Substitutions are to be made prior to or during check-in. Substitutions will not be permitted once Check-in is complete. Substitution Forms must be filled out completely. Substitution of owners is not permitted. Substitution Forms are located on the website at www.sarodeo.com.

Substitutions postmarked prior to January 16, 2024 (No fee). Substitutions on or after January 16, 2024 or received at check-in will be charged \$100.

- 11. **Judging:** Junior Heifers will be shown by breed within 3 divisions:
 - a. American (ARB, Beefmaster, Brangus, Grey Brahman, Red Brahman, Red Brangus, Santa Gertrudis, Simbrah)
 - **b.** British (Angus, Hereford, Polled Hereford, Red Angus, Shorthorn)
 - c. Continental (Charolais, Chianina, Limousin, Maine-Anjou, ORB, Simmental).

After all of the breeds have been judged, all Breed Champions and Reserve Breed Champions will compete within their respective division for Division Champion & Reserve Division Champion. There will be <u>no</u> Supreme Heifer Drive.

- 12. **Premium Schedule:** To be determined for each breed at the conclusion of the show. Premium amounts may vary among breeds.
- 13. Medication: Administration of any medication to animals that is not approved by the FDA is a violation of Federal law. Please refer to Rule #29 in the General Rules. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs and varies from animal to animal.
- 14. Fitting: This is a "Blow and Go" Show. Grooming or fitting with foreign material that includes (but not limited to) painting, powdering, oiling, artificial coloring, or adhesives is prohibited. The exhibitor is expected to feed, care for, fit, and exhibit their animal/project while at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or other 4-H or FFA members. Any project fed or cared for by a custom fitter is not eligible. A custom fitter is considered anyone who is not a family member, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or another 4-H or FFA member. Violators of this rule may be barred from future participation.
- 15. Fans: Fans will not be permitted in aisles. No fans are permitted behind the cattle. Only 1 fan per 5 head is permitted. Portacool or similar fans will not be permitted on Grounds.
- 16. Trim Chutes: No trim chutes are permitted on the grounds during the Junior Heifer Show.
- 17. Clippers: No clippers which require an electrical cord are allowed to be used on Junior Heifers once they arrive on the grounds. Cordless clippers are allowed.
- 18. General Equipment: Blocking of aisles or doorways (with chairs, showboxes, feed pans, feed, etc.) is strictly prohibited. No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Cattle Barn. Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes.
- 19. Show Equipment: Livestock shows provide an opportunity for the general public to be exposed to agricultural exhibits. Exhibitors should be mindful of the show equipment being used and the manner in which it is being used. Show Management or Livestock Committee Leadership/Ring Stewards reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor. Cable halters and pronged chains are prohibited for all species.

The American Angus Association®; 3201 Frederick Avenue; St. Joseph, Mo., will participate in premiums offered in individual classes for junior Angus heifers, bred and owned heifers, bred and owned bulls, cow/calf pairs and registered Angus steers as included in its standard show classifications, according to the premium schedule based on the number of head shown. The premium assistance provided by the American Angus Association for participation in this show is in addition to the premiums offered by the show itself. The premium assistance should not be used to offset show expense and shall be included in the premium payments distributed by the show to the exhibitors.
- 2. A minimum of fifteen (15) head must be shown in the junior Angus heifer classes to receive American Angus Association premium participation. The show is not required to have all classes to be eligible for premiums. Separate classes for bred and owned heifers may be held if the size of the show merits a separate class.
- **3.** To be eligible for Association premiums the entries must be recorded in the sole name of the junior exhibitor and the issue date on the registration certificate must conform to the individual show's requirements regarding ownership. The Association's contribution is included in the total premiums listed in each class.
- 4. Premiums from the Association are paid only to registered Angus cattle and only if the registration number is a part of the show report provided to the Association. Therefore, all cattle should be registered at the time of entry to make certain they receive the Association's portion of premiums. The Association does not pay a percentage on premiums offered in championship classes. An animal may only be counted one time toward the total count for premium participation by the Association.
- 5. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate issued by the American Angus Association available for inspection at the show for each animal or another current proof of ownership issued by the American Angus Association pedigree look up. Any animal, upon check-in, which does not have a legible permanent identification mark (ear tattoo marks, freeze-branded marks or hot-branded marks) corresponding to the permanent identification mark on the registration certificate, is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible permanent identification mark, animals cannot be re-identified (tattooed/branded) and rechecked at the show.
- **6.** Any female shown with a calf at side: the calf must be the cow's most recent natural calf, and the calf must be registered by show day and have proof of registration at check in.
- 7. Only one person at a time shall lead an animal into the show ring.
- 8. Exhibitors who participate in shows that accept premium monies contributed by the American Angus Association are subject to the Association Rules as found in the Breeders Reference Guide of the Association. These rules are found in Part 2; Association Rules. The rules relating directly with the exhibition of Angus cattle are Part 2: Association Rules; Rule 800 Series; including Rule 800 810. These rules can be found at www.angus.org.
- 9. Altering the conformation and/or appearance of an animal for exhibition is prohibited. This includes the covering of white skin, false tail heads (or use of any false hair), with the exception of false tail switches. The use of graphite, powders, hemp or other similar substances used externally are also prohibited. Other prohibited products include those used internally such as steroids, illegal or unlicensed pharmaceuticals or artificial filling. Any animal found to be in violation will be barred from showing.

- 10. At any show for which the American Angus Association appropriates funds toward the payment of premiums, no exhibitors, individuals assisting exhibitors or member owners at such show shall be allowed to use any coloring agents, on any animal exhibited. The Association may adopt and implement various tests designed to monitor this prohibition, including but not limited to a "white towel" or "white glove" test. No aerosol cans or other pressurized containers will be allowed in designated line up areas.
- 11. All animals exhibited are subject to DNA marker or blood type test to verify accuracy of parentage as covered under the Association Rules and for other testing as required by the individual show.
- 12. Authorized representatives of the Association have the authority to enforce the rules set forth herein as well as in the Association Rules, including the barring of a registered animal from a livestock show at which it is to be shown, if there are reasonable grounds to believe a violation has occurred.

At selected shows and fairs, blood samples will be taken from all division champions and reserve division champions for the purpose of verifying parentage and DNA/blood type. 



16. Blocking/Trimming Tables: Blocking/Trimming tables will be allowed in the barn for registered Angora/Boer goats and Baby Doll Southdown/Rambouillet Sheep and may be required to be placed in locations designated by the Superintendents.

UPDATED

- **17. Head-Stanchions/Fitting Mats:** Free standing head-stanchions and fitting mats must be inside a pen and not block alleys and/or pedestrian traffic. (Also see Rule 7 Pens).
- 18. General Equipment: Blocking of aisles or doorways (with chairs, showboxes, feed pans, feed, etc.) is strictly prohibited. No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Livestock Barns. Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes.

- 21. Show Weights: Exhibitors will turn in an official show weight for their ewes. Weight changes will not be allowed at any time after Checked-In.
- **22. Re-Weigh:** Sheep will be weighed at the time of judging. Upon re-weigh, sheep weighing more than 5 lbs. heavier than the official turn-in weight will be disqualified.

Champion Re-weigh: Prior to selection of the Champion, all Class 1st/2nd Place animals may be re-weighed with a 5 lb maximum weigh-back. Should a Class 1st Place or 2nd Place weigh out, she would retain her status but would be ineligible to compete for the Champion or Reserve Champion. Should a Class 1st Place weigh out, the respective Class 2nd Place would be eligible for Champion or Reserve Champion. No other animals will move up.

- 23. Heelers/Assistants: The use of heelers (assistants in the show ring) is prohibited.
- **24. Scholarships**: Refer to the Junior Livestock Show Scholarship section of the 2024 Competitive Events Premium List.





Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout. The Junior Crossbred Gilt Show is intended to be an exhibition of gilts suited for market barrow production. Gilts are not required to be registered. All breed types will show together within weight divisions. Junior Crossbred Gilts may not double enter in the Junior Purebred Breeding Gilt Show.
- 2. Number of Entries: Each owner may enter a maximum of one (1) head in the Junior Crossbred Gilt Show.
- **3.** Validation: To be eligible to exhibit in the Junior Crossbred Gilt Show, all gilts must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Swine Validation Program as a Commercial Gilt. Failure to comply with the rules and regulations of the Texas Validation Program in any manner will result in immediate disqualification.
- **4. Health Papers:** Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within the past 30 days **is required**. Check the Animal Health Requirements on Page 39 for more detailed information.
- **5. Show Check-in Procedures:** Exhibitors must check-in using materials provided by the Competitive Events office.

- **6. Penning:** Junior Crossbred Gilts will be stalled on a first come-first serve basis upon arrival. The show reserves the right to pen two gilts per pen regardless of ownership. FFA Chapters and/or 4-H Clubs wishing to be penned together must arrive together at the SCP Staging Area. Only crossbred gilts entered in the Crossbred Gilt Show may arrive on grounds. Exhibitors are encouraged to bring pen dividers.

All gilts with weights turned in below the minimum (200 lbs.) or above the maximum (350 lbs.) will be sifted. Weight changes will not be allowed at any time after Checked-In.
- **13. Re-Weigh:** All gilts penned for placing consideration will be re-weighed. Upon re-weigh, gilts weighing more than 15 pounds heavier than the official turn-in weight will be disqualified.
- 14. Ear Tags: All ear tags, with the exception of Texas Validation Tag and USDA Official Premises Identification Number (PIN) tags, must be removed before showing. The Texas Validation Tag number will be used for animal identification. No tag alterations will be allowed Any change in size, shape, form or color will void the tag.
- **15. Ear Notches:** All animals must be properly ear notched within seven (7) days of birth with a litter notch in the right ear and individual notch in the left ear to be eligible for the Texas 4-H and FFA Swine Validation Program. Animals not properly notched in both ears will be subject to disqualification.
- 16. Medication: Administration of any medication to animals that is not approved by the FDA is a violation of Federal law. Please refer to rule #29 of the General Rules. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs and varies from animal to animal.
- 17. Fitting: Foreign material including (but not limited to) painting, powdering, oiling, artificial coloring, or adhesives is prohibited. No clippers which require an electrical cord are allowed to be used on Junior Crossbred Gilts once they arrive on the grounds. Cordless clippers are allowed, however, restraining the animal for clipping purposes is prohibited. Failure to comply with this rule will result in disqualification. The exhibitor is expected to feed, care for, fit, and exhibit their animal/project while at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or other 4-H or FFA members. Violators of this rule will be disqualified and may be barred from future participation.

A Sale Preview will be held at 9 AM on Feb. 8 in the Morris Center.
- **26. Selection:** All class winning (1st place), Division Champion and Division Reserve Champion gilts in the Crossbred Gilt Show will automatically qualify for the Crossbred Gilt Sale and be required to sell. Remaining sale lots will be selected by the judge. The judge is not required to select an equal number of gilts from each weight class or division. **All gilts selected to the Crossbred Gilt Sale must sell, no exceptions.**
- 27. Sale Order: Sale order will be determined by Show Management.
- **28. Animal Care:** Each exhibitor will be responsible for the care of their gilt throughout the duration of the show & sale, including walking the animal through the sale arena.

- **10. Bedding:** <u>NO OUTSIDE BEDDING WILL BE ALLOWED.</u> All bedding will be provided by the show. The use of artificial grass mats and carpets are prohibited as bedding in all barns. Insofar as possible, appropriate types of bedding will be available for sale on the Grounds at the FEED STORE. Discretion as to what constitutes acceptable bedding is held exclusively by Show Management.



11. Scales: Scales will be provided in areas throughout the barn; such scales are unofficial and are provided for exhibitors' convenience only. Official scales will be used by Superintendents to determine official weights. No other scales will be allowed.



12. Show Weights: Weight limits are: minimum 200 lbs. and maximum 350 lbs. inclusive. Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight for their gilts. All gilts with weights turned in below the minimum (200 lbs.) or above the maximum (350 lbs.) will be sifted. Weight changes will not be allowed at any time after Checked-In.



- **13. Re-Weigh:** All gilts penned for placing consideration will be re-weighed. Upon re-weigh, gilts weighing more than 15 pounds heavier than the official turn-in weight will be disqualified.
- 14. Medication: Administration of any medication to animals that is not approved by the FDA is a violation of Federal law. Please refer to rule #29 of the General Rules. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs and varies from animal to animal.
- 15. Fitting: Foreign material including (but not limited to) painting, powdering, oiling, artificial coloring, or adhesives is prohibited. No clippers which require an electrical current are allowed to be used on Junior Purebred Gilts once they arrive on the grounds. Cordless clippers are allowed, however, restraining the animal for clipping purposes is prohibited. Failure to comply with this rule will result in disqualification. The exhibitor is expected to feed, care for, fit, and exhibit their animal/project while at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or other 4-H or FFA members. Violators of this rule will be disqualified and may be barred from future participation.
- 16. General Equipment: Blocking of aisles or doorways (with chairs, showboxes, feed pans, feed, etc.) is strictly prohibited. No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Livestock Barns. Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes.

- **4. Double Entry:** Junior Registered Boer Goats may be double-entered in the Open Registered Boer Goat Show but must have been submitted as a separate entry via online entry system. Junior Registered Boer Goats may <u>not</u> double enter in the Junior Commercial Doe Show.
- 5. Ownership/Registration: Registered Boer goats must be registered with the American Boer Goat Association (ABGA) in the name of the Junior owner(s). Breeding Angora goats must be registered in the Herdbook of their Association only in the name of the Junior owner. Partnership animals are ineligible for the Junior Angora Show. Registration Certificates must be available upon request.

Purchase, delivery, possession and registration must all take place on or before:

- a. Boer Goats: October 1, the year preceding the show.
- **b.** Angora Goats: November 1, the year preceding the show.
- 6. Validation: To be eligible to exhibit in the Junior Breeding Boer Show (Percentage and Fullblood), all goats must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Breeding Goat Validation Program as a Registered Breeding Boer Goat on or before October 31, 2023. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or other 4-H or FFA members. Violators of this rule will be disqualified and may be barred from future participation.



Aging Live Sheep



OBJECTIVE

Highlight the commercial cattle industry and provide 4-H and FFA members a learning experience emphasizing selection, record keeping, feeding, animal health, industry standards, public speaking and technical knowledge.

This show is subject to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo General Rules, the Junior Livestock Show Rules and Special Rules listed in this section.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Eligibility: The Junior Commercial Steer Show is only open to <u>steers</u>.
- **2. Entry:** Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout.
- **3.** Number Shown: Each junior exhibitor may enter a maximum of one pen of two (2) steers. One steer may constitute a pen; however, it will result in an immediate deduction of 20 points. Replacement steers will NOT be accepted.

UPDATED

4. Ownership: Steers of any beef breed are eligible to be entered. Exhibitors in this division must have owned their steers on or before **September 1, 2023**, and the steers must have been fed and cared for by the exhibitor from the date of acquisition through the Junior Commercial Steer Show. Steers should be designated as "A" and "B" at the time of purchase. This designation should be utilized throughout the feeding period for record keeping purposes and during final judging at the Junior Commercial Steer Show.

- **5. Stalling:** Steers will be pre-stalled according to the order posted in Auction Barn. Stalls must remain clean and neat at all times. Failure to comply will result in point deductions at the Superintendents' discretion.
- **6. Eartags:** All eartags will be removed during weigh-in. Animals will be tagged with an official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo eartag at that time.
- 7. Substitute Exhibitors: Substitute Exhibitors are not allowed.
- **8. Mandatory Attendance:** Exhibitors must attend all orientations, seminars and activities related to their project. Failure to comply will result in point deductions (see point breakdown).
- **9. Feeding:** Steers are to be fed in a separate feed pen from other livestock when placed on full feed. The beef industry recommends that cattle be on feed 150 days for optimal performance.
- 10. Weighing: Weights will be calculated as follows:

(BOTH STEERS MUST BE WEIGHED ON THE SAME DAY)

UPDATED

a. <u>Initial Weight:</u> Steers must be individually weighed between **August 26 – September 1, 2023**, on a certified livestock scale by a certified weigh master. This weight will be the "initial weight" for the feeding records. The official scale ticket should include: weigh date, individual animal weight, animal identification (i.e.: eartag, brand), breeder of the animal, buyer of the animal, signature of the certified weigh master. The official scale ticket should be retained and submitted with the Record Book to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.

UPDATED

- b. <u>Record Weight:</u> Steers must be officially weighed, individually, on a certified livestock scale by a certified weigh master between January 26 February 1, 2024, with a three percent (3%) pencil shrink. This weight will be the "record weight" for the feeding records. The official scale ticket should include: weigh date, individual animal weight, animal identification (i.e. eartag, brand), and signature of the certified weigh master. The official scale ticket should be retained and submitted with the Record Book to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. NOTE: Final Record Books must be postmarked by February 3, 2024.
- c. <u>Check-in / Sale Weight:</u> Steers will be officially weighed, individually, on a certified livestock scale by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Special Sales Sub-Committee. Steers must be presented for weighing and an ultrasound according to order posted in Auction Barn. Steers not presented at the scales promptly will be disqualified. Each steer must weigh-in between 1,000 and 1,599 lbs. inclusive. Failure to comply will result in point deductions (see point breakdown). There will be NO reweighs. Cattle will be sold on the "check-in/sale weight."
- **d. Days on Feed:** Days on Feed will be calculated as follows:
 - i. Day 1 = Initial Weigh Date
 - ii. Ending Day = Record Weigh Date

11. Record Books: Exhibitors must maintain an Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Commercial Steer Record Book including feeding, animal health, income and expense records regarding their Commercial Steer project. All receipts and related records must be recorded. All calculations are to be rounded to the hundredth decimal point from the beginning of the project. The record book must be submitted in a 1-1/2" binder. An Official Commercial Steer Record Book may be found online at www.sarodeo.com. The Official Commercial Steer Record Book must be completed and mailed by UPS or FedEx by February 3, 2024. Mail books to:

- 12. Live Ultrasound Evaluation: An ultrasound technician will collect data and grade the Junior Commercial Steers based on the USDA standard quality and yield grades for slaughter steers. Steers must be presented for Live Ultrasound Evaluation according to order posted in Auction Barn.
- 13. Live Visual Evaluation: A committee of judges will grade the Junior Commercial Steers based on the USDA quality and yield grades for slaughter steers. Steers must be presented for Live Visual Evaluation according to order posted in Auction Barn.

14. Quality and Yield Point Schedule: The following point schedule will apply to both Live Ultrasound Evaluation and Live Visual Evaluation:

Public Speaking/Questions: Each exhibitor must recite a memorized speech lasting a minimum of two (2) minutes and a maximum of four (4) minutes regarding their project, what they learned, and how it relates to the industry. There will be a point deduction of 1/4 point per 15 seconds the exhibitor is shorter or longer than the allotted speech limit. Exhibitors will present their speech during the Live Visual Evaluation of their cattle. Each exhibitor will be required to answer verbal questions regarding their project following delivery of their speech.

- **15. Beef Science Test:** Exhibitors will be administered a written Beef Science Test. Only exhibitors may enter the test area. Study Guide links will be available here. The Beef Science Test will be composed of questions derived from this Study Guide and any other sources listed.
- **16. Horns:** Steers must have horns tipped with no more than three inches of horn growth beyond the base of the head.
- 17. Medication: Please refer to General Rule #29.
- **18. Blow Dryers:** No blow dryers will be allowed.

- **19. Fans:** Cordless fans will be allowed.
- **20. Terminal Show:** This show is terminal; all steers entered in competition will be marketed as determined by Show Management.
- **21. Premiums and Awards:** Exhibitors will be placed according to their cumulative point total. All placing exhibitors are eligible for Premium Awards. The following Premium Schedule will apply:

Insofar as possible, a Pasture to Packer Contest will be conducted in which case all commercial steers will be processed for information.

Minimum Standards

- 1. Minimum and maximum for hot carcass weight, 600 to 1,050 pounds, respectively.
- 2. Minimum fat thickness, .25 inches.
- 3. Minimum ribeye area, 11.0 square inches.
- 4. Maximum USDA Yield Grade, 3.99.
- 5. Maximum USDA maturity, A100.
- 6. Minimum USDA marbling requirement, Slight 00 and minimum USDA Quality grade, Select 00.
- 7. "Dark-Cutters", if severe enough will be disqualified. Severe dark-cutting is defined as that sufficient to result in at least one full-grade reduction in the USDA quality grade.
- 8. Disqualification will result if carcasses had excessive bruises and evidence of tampering or questionable injection(s).

Each carcass achieving the above standards will be placed on the scoring system below. The scores for the two carcasses within each pen of commercial steer carcasses will be added together to determine the total score. Ties will be broken on the basis of judge's visual appraisal of the carcasses and overall appraisal of the uniformity of the data.

1. Eligibility: The Junior Market Barrow Show is only open to <u>barrows</u> and is a TERMINAL SHOW.

- **2. Entry:** Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout.
- **3. Number Shown:** Each owner is limited to a maximum of one (1) barrow.
- **4. Validation:** To be eligible to exhibit in the Junior Market Barrow Show, all barrows must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Swine Validation Program. Failure to comply with the rules and regulations of the Texas Swine Validation Program in any manner will result in immediate disqualification.

UPDATED

5. Show Check-in Procedures: Exhibitors must check-in using materials provided by the Competitive Events office. Check-In must be completed by 3 PM the day of Check-In during Wave 1 and 1 PM the day of Check-In during Wave 2 or be subject to disqualification.

UPDATED

6. Penning: Junior Market Barrows will be penned on a first come-first serve basis upon arrival. The show reserves the right to pen two barrows per pen regardless of ownership. FFA Chapters and/or 4-H Clubs wishing to be stalled together must arrive together at the SCP Staging Area. Only barrows entered in the Market Barrow Show may arrive on grounds. Exhibitors are encouraged to bring pen dividers.

UPDATED

- 7. Pens: Pens will not be taken apart or altered in any way without Superintendent approval. No lights are to be strung on the pens. Pens may be lined on 3 sides at panel height only. Nothing may cover the gate or over the pen.
- **8. Bedding:** <u>NO OUTSIDE BEDDING WILL BE ALLOWED.</u> All bedding will be provided by the show. The use of artificial grass mats and carpets are prohibited as bedding in all barns. Insofar as possible, appropriate types of bedding will be available for sale on the Grounds at the FEED STORE. Discretion as to what constitutes acceptable bedding is held exclusively by Show Management.
- 9. Show Weights: Official turn-in weight limits are: minimum 250 lbs. and maximum 300 lbs. inclusive. Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight for their barrow. All barrows with weights turned in below the minimum (250 lbs.) or above the maximum (300 lbs.) will be sifted.
- **10. Re-Weigh:** Show Management reserves the right to weigh any barrow after the completion of Check-In. Upon re-weigh, *all barrows weighing less than 240 pounds* or more than 10 pounds heavier than the official turn-in weight will be disqualified.
 - *Barrows that meet the minimum weight of 240 lbs. but are weighing more than 10 lbs. less than the official turnin Show Weight will not be disqualified, but will be sold on the re-weigh weight. (i.e. Turn-in Show Weight = 260 lbs.; Re-weigh weight = 245 lbs.; Barrow will be sold at 245 lbs.)

Breed/Division Champion Re-weigh: Prior to selection of the Breed/Division Champion, all Class 1st/2nd or Division Champions and Reserve Champions may be re-weighed. Barrows weighing more than 10 lbs heavier than the official turn-in Show Weight will be disqualified. Should a Class 1st Place or 2nd Place, Division Champion or Reserve Champion weigh out, he would retain his status but would be ineligible to compete for the respective Breed or Division Champion or Reserve. Should a Class 1st Place or Division Champion weigh out, the respective Class 2nd Place or Division Reserve Champion would be eligible for Breed Champion. No other animals will move up.

Grand Champion Re-weigh: Prior to selection of the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion, all Breed Champions and Reserve Breed Champions may be re-weighed. Should a Champion or Reserve weigh-out, he would retain his status as Breed Champion or Reserve Breed Champion but be ineligible to compete for Grand or Reserve Grand Champion.

Wave #1 Barrows (Berkshire, Duroc, Dark Crossbred, Hampshire, Poland China, Spot) weighing more than 23 pounds heavier than the official turn-in Show Weight will be disqualified.

Wave #2 Barrows (Chester White, Landrace, Yorkshire, Crossbred) weighing more than 15 pounds heavier than the official turn-in Show Weight will be disqualified.

- 11. Classification: Breed must be declared upon Check-In. Breed changes by the exhibitor will not be allowed at any time after. Barrows will be subject to reclassification by a three-member committee. The decision of the three-member classifying committee will be final. See *Barrow Classification Standards*.
 - Any barrows reclassified in Wave #1 will be placed in the Dark Crossbred breed. Any barrows in Wave #1 not meeting at least the classification standards for the Dark Crossbred breed will be sifted.
 - Any barrows reclassified in Wave #2 will be placed in the Crossbred breed.

- Dark Crossbred (Wave 1) and Crossbred (Wave 2) class options may be entered at the time of Check-In.
- 12. Ear Tags: All ear tags, with the exception of Texas Validation Tag and USDA Official Premises Identification Number (PIN) tags, must be removed before showing. The Texas Validation Tag number will be used for animal identification. No tag alterations Any change in size, shape, form, or color will void the tag.
- 13. Ear Notches: All animals must be properly ear notched within seven (7) days of birth with a litter notch in the right ear and individual notch in the left ear to be eligible for the Texas 4-H and FFA Swine Validation Program. Animals not properly notched in both ears will be subject to disqualification.
- 14. Medication: Administration of any medication to market animals that is not approved by the FDA is a violation of Federal law. Please refer to rule #29 of the General Rules. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs and varies from animal to animal.

UPDATED

- 15. Fitting: Foreign material including (but not limited to) painting, powdering, oiling, artificial coloring, or adhesives is prohibited upon arrival on Grounds. No clippers, which require an electrical current, are allowed to be used on Market Barrows once they arrive on the grounds. Cordless clippers are allowed, however, restraining the animal for clipping purposes is prohibited. Failure to comply with this rule will result in disqualification. The exhibitor is expected to feed, care for, fit, and exhibit their animal/project while at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or other 4-H or FFA members. Violators of this rule will be disqualified and may be barred from future participation.
- **16.** Equipment: Blocking of aisles or doorways (with chairs, showboxes, feed pans, etc.) is strictly prohibited. All equipment must be stored safely above pens. *No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Livestock Barns. Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes.*
- 17. Scales: Scales will be provided in areas throughout the barn; such scales are unofficial and are provided for exhibitors' convenience only. Official scales will be used by Superintendents to determine official weights. No other scales will be allowed.

- 18. Animals Outside of Barns: Barrows must remain inside the Morris Activity Center, Swine Barn, Cattle Barn #2 or the designated exercise area on the North side of barns at all times. Any animal found outside of this area will be subject to disqualification.
- 19. Additional Premiums:
 - **Certified Texas Bred Class Champions:** The Texas Pork Producers Association, Inc. may award premium money to top placing Certified Texas Bred barrows. A Certified Texas Bred Registry certificate from the breeder must be presented at the show to qualify.
- **20. Classes:** Superintendents will break classes following completion of Check-In. There will be no pre-set weight breaks. Exhibitors missing their class are ineligible to compete in a different weight division and will be sifted. In the event of a large number of barrows with the same weight and the same breed, the show may break them into multiple classes using another method other than weight. To more effectively break classes, weights may be grouped by a maximum of 4 lb. increments and classes then broken using another method other than weight.

Insofar as possible, a Quality Pork Contest will be conducted. A minimum of 34 barrows, including the Breed Champions, Reserve Breed Champions, Weight Division Winners, and Weight Division Runner-Ups, will be processed for information.

Minimum Standards

- 1. Minimum and maximum for hot carcass weight, 165 to 230 pounds, respectively.
- 2. Carcass muscle score is to be equal to or better than the Intermediate (2.0) pictured in the 2000 "Composition and Quality Assessment Procedures," National Pork Board.
- 3. Carcass meat quality will be subjectively evaluated for the following using the 2000 "Composition and Quality Assessment Procedures," National Pork Board.
 - a. Loin muscle color score greater than 1 and less than 6
 - b. Loin muscle marbling score greater than 1
 - c. Loin muscle firmness and wetness score greater than 1
 - d. Belly at least slightly thick with a minimum of 0.6 inches of thickness at any point
 - e. Abnormalities (Soft, oily fat; steatosis)

Carcasses failing to meet two or more of the minimum quality standards as outlined will be disqualified.

4. Percentage Fat Free Lean will be predicted by the following equation ("Composition and Quality Assessment Procedures," National Pork Board):

Equation for pounds of fat-free lean (FFL)

8.588 – 21.896 x 10th rib fat depth, inches + 3.005 x 10th rib loin muscle area, square inches + 0.465 x warm carcass weight, pounds

To convert to % fat-free lean, divide by warm carcass weight and multiply by 100

- 5. Other disqualifications:
 - a. Cryptorchids
 - b. Carcass that requires more than 1% trim due to "old" bruises or infected at injection site, abnormalities, cysts, abscesses, diseased joints, etc.

The carcass judge will select and place the top 10 carcasses on overall carcass merits from among the 15 carcasses with the highest percent fat free lean(FFL). The following awards will be given for 1st through 5th place.

- **3. Broiler Orders:** All broiler chicks must be ordered by September 29, 2023, through Texas A&M University's Poultry Science Department in accordance with the "Rules and Ordering Procedures" document found on the website at posc.tamu.edu. For clarification of any part of the Rules and Ordering Procedures, please contact Texas A&M AgriLife Poultry Science Extension Office at 979-845-4319.
- 4. Sift: A Sifter will be appointed by the Show. The sift process officially begins at time of exhibitor/birds entry into the arena. Birds must be free of external parasites and disease. Each entry must have the original wing band intact and securely fastened to the bird. Any bird which has lost its wing band for any reason, will be sifted.
- 5. Wing Bands: The sifter and judge will disregard any wing damage caused by the required wing band.
- **6. Handlers:** Must meet the eligibility requirements outlined in Rule 1 of the Junior Show Rules. Additionally, handlers must have at least one (1) entry within any department in the current Junior Livestock Show.
- 7. **Supplies:** Each exhibitor is required to bring two containers (each 16oz. or smaller, example one pound coffee can) per entry. Exhibitors will be permitted to bring their own poultry feed onto the grounds.

- **8.** Fans/Heaters: ONLY cordless fans will be permitted in the Cattle Barn during the Poultry Show. *Portacool or similar fans will not be permitted on Grounds unless provided by the show.* Heaters will not be permitted in the Cattle Barn during the Poultry Show.

The showing of any poultry that has been administered any quantity of diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication, or that has NOT been properly withdrawn from approved drugs is prohibited. Unapproved is deemed to mean NOT approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals. As a condition for participation in the Show, every exhibitor must agree to submit any poultry entered by exhibitor to inspection by a veterinarian appointed by the management and agrees to have such poultry submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the veterinarian. The Show specifically reserves the right to have tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any poultry entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian, as to whether such animal has been administered a diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved drugs, or has not been properly withdrawn from approved drugs shall be final, without recourse against the Show or any of its officers. An exhibitor of poultry producing an analysis with a quantity of diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or any other unapproved drugs will forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock including poultry in the future at the Show.
- 11. **Beta-agonists:** S.A.L.E. will not tolerate the presence of ractopamine hydrochloride (TopmaxTM) in Market Poultry, specifically all turkeys and broilers. S.A.L.E. will not tolerate the presence of zilpaterol hydrochloride (Zilmax®) in any market species or breeding animal.

6. **Penning:** Junior Market Goats will be stalled on a first come-first serve basis upon arrival. The show reserves the right to pen a minimum of three (3) head per pen. FFA Chapters and/or 4-H Clubs wishing to be penned together must arrive together at the SCP Staging Area. Only market goats entered in the Junior Market Goat Show may arrive on Grounds.

UPDATED

- 7. Pens: Pens will not be taken apart or altered in any way without Superintendent approval. Any approved alterations, must be back in original place before departure. No lights of any kind may be hung/strung on the pens. Pens may be lined on 3 sides at panel height only. Nothing may cover the gate or over the pen. Failure to comply with any part of this rule may result in penalties to violators including but not limited to fines, inability for individual/club/chapter to order Premium Pass(es), withholding of floor checks, etc.
- 8. Show Weights: Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight for their goat. Official turn-in weigh limits are: minimum 60 lbs. and maximum 120 lbs. inclusive. All goats with weights turned in below the minimum (60 lbs.) or above the maximum (120 lbs.) will be sifted.
- **9. Re-Weigh:** Show Management reserves the right to weigh any goat after the completion of Check-In. All goats weighing less than 56 lbs. or more than 4 lbs. heavier than the official turn-in weight will be disqualified. Goats weighing more than 4 lbs. lighter than the official turn-in weight will not be disqualified (with the exception of those not meeting the 56 lbs. weight) but will be sold on the re-weigh weight.

Division Champion Re-weigh: Prior to selection of the Division Champion, all Class 1st/2nd Place animals may be re-weighed with a 4 lb maximum weigh-back. Should a Class 1st Place or 2nd Place weigh out, he would retain his status but would be ineligible to compete for the respective Division Champion or Reserve. Should a Class 1st Place weigh out, the respective Class 2nd Place would be eligible for Division Champion or Reserve Champion. No other animals will move up.

Grand Champion Re-weigh: Prior to selection of the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion, all Division Champions and Reserve Champions may be re-weighed with a 4 lb maximum weigh-back. Should a Division Champion or Reserve Champion weigh out, he would retain his status as Division Champion or Reserve Champion but be ineligible to compete for Grand or Reserve Grand Champion. Should a Division Champion weigh out, the respective Division Reserve Champion would be eligible for Grand or Reserve Grand Champion consideration.

UPDATED

- 10. Ear Tags: All ear tags except the Texas Validation Tag and Texas Goat Breeders Association (TGBA) tag must be removed before showing. The Texas Validation tag number will be used for animal identification. No tag alterations. Any change in size, shape, form or color will void the tag. All USDA Scrapie Eradication Program tags removed by show officials will be matched to the Texas Validation Tag.
- 11. **Medication:** Administration of any medication to market animals that is not approved by the FDA is a violation of Federal law. Please refer to Rule #29 in the General Rules. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear the system **is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time** for most drugs and varies from animal to animal.
- 12. Shearing: Goats must be shorn slick, with no indication of blocking, to the skin above the knee and hock joints to include the head, excluding the tail switch, before arrival on the grounds. Refer to Rule 13 Fitting: Significant clipping/shearing on the body is NOT considered touch-up clipping and the goat is subject to disqualification.
- 13. Fitting: Foreign material including (but not limited to) painting, powdering, oiling, artificial coloring, or adhesives is prohibited. No clippers which require an electrical cord are allowed to be used on Market Goats once they arrive on grounds. Touch-up clipping below the knees and hocks or end of tail with cordless clippers, scissors, or hand shears will be allowed. Significant clipping/shearing on the body is NOT considered touch-up clipping and the goat is subject to disqualification. The exhibitor is expected to feed, care for, fit, and exhibit their animal/project while at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or other 4-H or FFA members. Violators of this rule will be disqualified and may be barred from future participation.
- **14. Horns:** Exhibitors will be required to have horns tipped blunt on all goats before arrival on the grounds. Removal of horns on grounds is not permitted.



- **15.** Blocking/Trimming Tables/Head-Stanchions/Fitting Mats: No Blocking/Trim Tables will be permitted on the grounds. Free standing head-stanchions and fitting mats must be inside a pen and not block alleys and/or pedestrian traffic. (Also see Rule 7 Pens).
- **16.** Blow Dryers: No blow dryers will be allowed.
- 17. Equipment: Blocking of aisles or doorways (with chairs, showboxes, feed pans, etc.) is strictly prohibited. All equipment must be stored safely above pens. No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Livestock Barns. Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes.
- **18. Scales:** Scales will be provided in areas throughout the barn; such scales are unofficial and are provided for exhibitors' convenience only. Official scales will be used by Superintendents to determine official weights. No other scales will be allowed.

UPDATED

- 19. Animals Outside of Barns: Goats must remain inside the Morris Activity Center, Swine Barn, Cattle Barn #2 or the designated exercise area on the North side of barns at all times. Any animal found outside of this area will be subject to disqualification.
- **20. Bedding:** <u>NO OUTSIDE BEDDING WILL BE ALLOWED.</u> All bedding will be provided by the show. The use of artificial grass mats and carpets are prohibited as bedding in all barns. Straw/hay bedding is prohibited in beef cattle stalls. Insofar as possible, appropriate types of bedding will be available for sale on the Grounds at the FEED STORE. Discretion as to what constitutes acceptable bedding is held exclusively by Show Management.

- 21. Show Equipment: Livestock shows provide an opportunity for the general public to be exposed to agricultural exhibits. Exhibitors should be mindful of the show equipment being used and the manner in which it is being used. Show Management or Livestock Committee Leadership/Ring Stewards reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor. Cable halters and pronged chains are prohibited for all species. Exhibitors will be allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring.
- 22. Classes: Superintendents will break classes following the completion of Check-In. There will be no pre-set weight breaks. - 23. Parasites: No external parasites will be allowed. Any goat with external parasites may be disqualified at the discretion of Show Management.
- 24. Selection of Champions: All Division Champion and Reserve Division Champion goats are required to compete in the Grand Champion Drive. Only one parent, legal guardian, AST or CEA may accompany the exhibitor in the holding ring before the Grand Champion Drive.

- 25. Placing Goats: All placing goats must sell in the Junior Market Goat Auction. All animals qualifying for the Junior Livestock Auction are required to have their photograph taken.

Minimum Standards

- 1. Minimum and maximum for carcass weight, 35 to 70 pounds.
- 2. Minimum and maximum adjusted fat thickness at the 12th rib, .05 inches to .25 inches, respectively.
- 3. Estimated percent boneless closely trimmed retail cuts (%BCTRC) from the leg, loin, rack and shoulder is considered in ranking.

- 4. Carcass must be youthful appearing.
- **5.** Carcass shall be free of serious bruises ("old" not recent), free of injection sites on the more valuable carcass parts: leg, loin, rack and shoulder (neck excluded) and free of any evidence of surgical altering of the live goat.

Goats achieving the above standards will be evaluated and placed by the official carcass judge.

Upon reweigh, lambs weighing less than 95 lbs. or more than 5 lbs. heavier than the official turn-in weight will be disqualified. Lambs weighing more than 5 lbs. lighter than the official turn-in weight will not be disqualified (with the exception of those not meeting the 95 lbs. weight) but will be sold on the re-weigh weight.

CLASSIFICATION STANDARDS

CLASSIFICATION TERMS:

Acceptable: Characteristics that represent the breed.

Discriminatory: Characteristics that are not reason for absolute disqualification but in combination with other discriminatory visual characteristics could lead to removal from a breed division.

Absolute Disqualifications: Unfavorable visual characteristics resulting in removal from a breed division.

Scur: Horn growth that is not completely attached to the skull.

Birthmark: Dark pigmented skin with dark fiber present with the margins of the pigmentation.

SOUTHDOWN BREED CHARACTERISTICS

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- Hair color on muzzle should be mouse-colored, gray to brown and match color on legs and pasterns.
- Nostril pigmentation may be black to purplish-gray.
- Head and muzzle should be broad and proportional to body.
- Head of moderate length and in proportion to body.
- Ears of moderate length, in proportion to body and covered with short hair or wool.
- Black hooves.
- Slight chalk around eyes.
- Slight chalk around muzzle.
- Spots or speckles in the skin only when shorn.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- Solid white color or dark chocolate color on muzzle.
- Coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- Predominately pink nose with few black spots.
- Long, narrow muzzle.
- Excessive black pigmentation on ears.
- Excessive ear length not in proportion to head.
- No hair or wool on ears.
- Scurs.
- Absence of wool between scur areas.
- Striped hooves.
- Reddish, rust colored hair above hoof to pastern.
- Black fibers in wool outside of birthmark.
- Birthmarks.

- Speckled face, ears or legs.
- Horns.
- White hooves.
- Intentional alteration of hair color or skin pigmentation.
- Total pink pigmentation of nostrils.
- Black lambs.
- Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge.

FINEWOOL BREED CHARACTERISTICS

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- Rambouillet, Delaine, Debouillet or a cross between these breeds.
- Silky, white face.
- Silky ears, medium to moderate in length.
- Soft pelt.
- Yellow to white hooves (neutral).
- Black pads on hooves and black dew claws.
- Minimal amount of black streaking in the hooves. Less than 1/8 of cumulative hoof surface.
- Nose should be neutral to pink in color.
- May be polled or horned. Horns must be indicative of acceptable Finewool breeds.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- Moderate amounts of brown or black spots in the skin and/or wool.
- Moderate freckling or pigmented skin (brown or black) on the ears, eyes, nose and lips.
- Black eyelashes.
- Excessive black streaking in hooves more than 1/8 cumulative of hoof surface.
- Birthmarks.

Absolute Disqualifications

- Excessively coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- Excessive coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, in the flanks and/or down the front and/or rear legs.
- Excessive brown or black spots in the skin and/or wool.
- Excessive freckling or pigmented skin (brown or black) on the ears, eyes, nose and lips.
- Brown or black spots in hairline above the hooves to the dew claw.
- Solid black hooves.
- Black lambs.
- Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.
- Head, ear and/or horn shape non-typical to the Finewool breeds (Rambouillet, Delaine, Debouillet, or a cross between these breeds).

FINEWOOL CROSS BREED CHARACTERISTICS

Acceptable Breed Characteristics

- Must be a cross with evidence of at least 50% Finewool breeding and the remaining percentage exhibiting predominance of ONLY Hampshire and/or Suffolk breeding.
- Soft pelt which is characteristic of ½ blood wool (60's-62's spinning count).
- Face and ears should be soft and silky.
- Spotting and/or brown face and ears.
- Moderate spotting and/or brown legs not extending above the rear flank and fore flank.
- Wool must be present below the hocks on the rear legs; wool below the knees on the front legs is not necessary.
- Reddish, rust colored legs are acceptable.
- White-faced or ring-eyed crosses are acceptable if pelt is acceptable as long as no discriminatory characteristics are present.
- Birthmarks.
- Scurs and/or horns are acceptable. Horns must be indicative of acceptable Finewool breeds.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics

- Excessive black spotting in the skin above the knees and hocks.
- Moderate black or chocolate brown color on face, ears and legs (including wool).
- Moderately coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- Moderately coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, in the flanks and/or down the front and/or rear legs.

Absolute Disqualifications

- Excessive black or dark chocolate brown color on face, ears and legs (including wool).
- Excessively coarse britch and/or harsh pelt.
- Excessive coarse, chalky, white hair on the face, in the flanks and/or down the front and/or rear legs.
- Total absence of wool on rear legs.
- Black lambs.
- Evidence of other breeds including, but not limited to Dorset and Southdown breed types (head and ear shape of Dorset and/or Southdown).
- Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.

DORPER BREED CHARACTERISTICS

Acceptable breed characteristics

- Must be a Dorper or White Dorper.
- Conformation: long, deep, wide body with well sprung ribs and excellent muscling.
- Color: Dorper white sheep with black limited to head, neck and forequarters not below the knee or behind the heart girth; White Dorper white sheep.
- Must have at least 1/3 hair primarily on belly, forearm and britch.
- 100% hair below the knees and hocks.
- 100% hair forward of poll.
- Moderate size ear with no wool covering.
- Head should be strong, bold with a deep jaw.
- Polled or small horns or scurs.
- Spots or speckled pigment in the skin only when shorn.
- Black spots above the hoof line and below the dewclaw.

Discriminatory breed characteristics

- Tall, leggy, shallow and/or narrow-bodied lambs.
- A limited amount of dark fibered spots on body and underline behind heart girth not to exceed a cumulative total of the size of a softball.
- A white sheep with brown or red colored speckles in the covering, confined to the head and neck.
- Tri-colored sheep
- Excessive wool covering more than 2/3 of body (belly, forearm and britch).
- Wool forward of poll.
- Heavy horns.
- Long, pendulous ears.
- Long, narrow muzzle.

Absolute disqualifications

- All wool or very little evidence of hair on belly, forearm or britch.
- Wool below the knees or hocks.
- Wool on the ears.
- Excessive amount of dark fibered spots on body and underline behind heart girth exceeding a cumulative total of the size of a softball.
- Solid brown, red, rust colored head.
- Speckling or spots from knee to dewclaw or from hock to dewclaw.
- Strong breed characteristics of breeds other than Dorper or White Dorper.
- Surgical alterations other than re-docking.
- Steep hip or tendency to show callipyge gene.
- Evidence of color alterations.

MEDIUM WOOL BREED CHARACTERISTICS

This class generally includes the Suffolk and Hampshire breeds, plus all lambs that do not fit into the Finewool, Finewool Cross, Southdown or Dorper breed classes.

QUALITY LAMB CONTEST

SPECIAL RULES

Insofar as possible, a Quality Lamb Contest will be conducted. A minimum of 31 wether lambs, including the Breed Champions, Reserve Breed Champions and all remaining first place lambs in each class of each breed, will be processed for information.

Minimum Standards

- 1. Minimum and maximum for carcass weight, 45 to 100 pounds, respectively.
- 2. Minimum and maximum adjusted fat thickness at the 12th rib, .10 inches to .30 inches, respectively.
- 3. Maximum USDA Yield Grade, 3.4. The USDA Yield Grade will be determined according to USDA (1994) grading standards. USDA Yield Grade = 0.4 + (10 x adjusted fat thickness, inches)
- 4. Estimated percent boneless closely trimmed retail cuts (%BCTRC) from the leg, loin, rack and shoulder is used in ranking.

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% BCTRC = 49.936 - (0.0848 X Warm Carcass Wt., lb.)

- (4.376 X Adj. Fat Thickness,12<sup>th</sup> rib, in.)

- (3.530 X Body Wall Thickness, in.)

+ (2.456 X Ribeye Area, square in.)
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- 5. Carcass must be of "Lamb Maturity."
- 6. Minimum USDA Quality Grade must be Choice-minus.
- 7. Carcass shall be free of serious bruises ("old" not recent), free of injection sites on the more valuable carcass parts: leg, loin, rack and shoulder (neck excluded) and free of any evidence of surgical altering of the live wether lamb.

Lambs achieving the above standards will be evaluated and placed by the official carcass judge.

This show is subject to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo General Rules, the Junior Livestock Show Rules and Special Rules listed in this section.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Eligibility: The Junior Market Steer Show is only open to steers.
- 2. Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout.
- **3.** Number Shown: Each exhibitor may enter a maximum of one (1) steer.
- 4. Judging Contest: The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo reserves the right to use any cattle for Livestock Judging Contest(s) and/or organized practices.
- **5. Validation:** To be eligible to exhibit in the Junior Market Steer Show, all steers must be validated in the Texas 4-H and FFA Steer Validation Program. Failure to comply with the rules and regulations of the Texas Steer Validation Program in any manner will result in immediate disqualification.
- **6. Show Check-in Procedures:** Exhibitors must check-in using materials provided by the Competitive Events office. Check-In must be completed by 4 PM the day of Check-In or be subject to disqualification.

UPDATED

- 7. Stalling/Tie-Spaces: Junior Market Steers will be stalled on a first come-first serve basis upon arrival. FFA Chapters and/or 4-H Clubs wishing to be stalled together must arrive together at the SCP Staging Area. Only market steers entered in the Junior Market Steer Show may arrive on Grounds. All cattle that arrive at the SCP Staging Area MUST be unloaded and stalled in the Cattle Barn. Those trying to take cattle off grounds on arrival day are subject to disqualification of all animals that arrived on said trailer. Front and end panels may be covered, but there will be no panels or covering behind the cattle without Superintendent approval. No stalls will be assigned specifically for tack or lounging.
- 8. Show Weights: Official turn-in show weight limits are: minimum 1000 lbs. and maximum 1500 lbs. inclusive. Exhibitors will turn in the official show weight of their steer. All steers with weights turned in below the minimum (1000 lbs.) or above the maximum (1500 lbs.) will be sifted.
- 9. **Re-Weigh:** Show Management reserves the right to weigh any steer after the completion of Check-In. Upon, reweigh, steers weighing less than 950 lbs. or more than 5% heavier than their official turn-in weight will be disqualified. Steers weighing more than 5% lighter than the official turn-in weight will not be disqualified (with the exception of those not meeting the 950 lbs. weight) but will be sold on the re-weigh weight.

Grand Champion Re-weigh: Prior to the selection of the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion, all Breed Champions and Reserve Breed Champions may be re-weighed. Breed Champions or Reserve Breed Champions weighing more than 5% heavier than the official turn-in weight would be ineligible to compete for Grand or Reserve Grand Champion honors. They would retain their status as Breed or Reserve Breed Champion.

10. Classification: Breed must be declared upon Check-In. Breed changes by the exhibitor will not be allowed at any time. Steers will be subject to reclassification by a three-member committee. The decision of the three-member classifying committee will be final. See *Steer Classification Standards*.

At Check-In, exhibitors will designate which breed to enter (including ABC, Red Cross, Black Cross and Other Cross). Each exhibitor must designate an Alternative Breed Option (Red Cross, Black Cross or Other Cross ONLY) that they wish to be assigned should their steer classify out of the original breed entered. Exhibitors are not allowed to designate any other breed as an Alternative Breed Option other than Red Cross, Black Cross or Other Cross. Should an exhibitor fail to designate an Alternative Breed Option and be classified out of their original breed entered, they will automatically be placed in the Other Cross breed.

- All steers classified out of the Brahman, Brangus, Santa Gertrudis and Simbrah breed will be required to return for classification during the ABC breed.
- All steers classified out of the ABC breed will be required to return for classification of the Alternative Breed
 Option designated by the exhibitor. If an Alternative Breed Option was not designated, they will
 automatically be placed in the Other Cross breed.
- All steers classified out of the Angus, Charolais, Hereford, Limousin, Maine-Anjou, Polled Hereford, Red Angus, Shorthorn, and Simmental will be required to return for classification of the Alternative Breed Option designated by the exhibitor. If an Alternative Breed Option was not designated, they will automatically be placed in the Other Cross breed.

All steers classified out of the Red Cross and Black Cross breed will be placed in the Other Cross breed classes according to weight. No classification will occur for the Other Cross breed.

- 11. Ear Tags: All ear tags except the Texas Validation Tag must be removed before steers enter the classifying area. The Texas Validation Tag number will be used for animal identification. No tag alterations Any change to size, shape, form, or color will void the tag.
- **12. Horns**: Steers must be dehorned, polled, or scurred. Scurs/horn growth must not exceed three inches from the base of the head.
- 13. Medication: Administration of any medication to market animals that is not approved by the FDA is a violation of Federal law. Please refer to Rule #29 in the General Rules. In instances where an animal has been administered a drug that is FDA approved for its species, the exhibitor must be aware that the time it takes for all drug residue to completely clear the system is generally longer than the labeled withdrawal time for most drugs and varies from animal to animal.
- 14. Fitting: Foreign material including (but not limited to) painting, powdering, oiling, artificial coloring, or adhesives is prohibited. No clippers which require an electrical cord are allowed to be used on Market Steers once they arrive on Grounds. Touch-up clipping with cordless clippers or scissors will be allowed. The decision of the Superintendents will be final and cannot be protested. The exhibitor is expected to feed, care for, fit, and exhibit their animal/project while at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, Local County/Chapter Adult Volunteer or other 4-H or FFA members. Violators of this rule will be disqualified and may be barred from future participation.
- **15. Blow Dryers:** No blow dryers will be allowed.
- 16. Equipment: Blocking of aisles or doorways (with chairs, showboxes, feed pans, etc.) is strictly prohibited. All equipment must be stored safely. *No tables will be permitted to be set up in the Cattle Barn. Nothing will be allowed to be set up in designated Fire Lanes.*

UPDATED

17. **Bedding:** NO OUTSIDE BEDDING WILL BE ALLOWED. All bedding will be provided by the show. The use of artificial grass mats and carpets are prohibited as bedding in all barns. Cedar fiber, straw and hay bedding is prohibited in beef cattle stalls. Insofar as possible, appropriate types of bedding will be available for sale on the Grounds at the FEED STORE. Discretion as to what constitutes acceptable bedding is held exclusively by Show Management.

- **18. Hair:** Steers must be shorn to no more than ½" on any location of the body, excluding the tail switch (the tail switch being no more than 12 inches above the end of the cartilage of the tail. See figure 2 for visual reference.). Touch up clipping with cordless clippers is allowed. Steers will be checked at time of show for ½" length; violation of ½" uniform length over the entire body will result in immediate disqualification. Steers not shorn upon arrival at SCP will be subject to disqualification. The decision of the Superintendents will be final. The decision cannot be protested.
- **19. Fans**: Fans will not be permitted in aisles. No fans are permitted behind the cattle. Only 1 fan per 5 head is permitted. *Portacool or similar fans will not be permitted on Grounds*.
- **20. Scales**: Exhibitors will not be allowed to bring portable scales in the Cattle Barn. Scales will be provided by the show but are unofficial and provided for exhibitor's convenience only.
- 21. Substitute Exhibitors: Must follow all details addressed under Rule #14 of Junior Rules section. Additionally, an exhibitor of a Market Steer may <u>not</u> serve as a substitute exhibitor in the class immediately prior to or following their own class.
- **22. Judging Arena:** Only the exhibitor (or approved substitute) may lead their steer into the staging area (holding area) or judging arena. No other persons will be permitted into those areas unless authorized by a Superintendent.
- 23. Age: Steers are not required to have both temporary central incisors in place.
- 24. Sift: Any steer not eligible for the class he is entered in due to weight, hair, soundness, health, etc. will be sifted.
- **25. Unruly Steers:** Show Management may remove any unruly steer from the show. The decision of the Superintendents will be final. The decision cannot be protested.
- **26. Show Equipment:** Livestock shows provide an opportunity for the general public to be exposed to agricultural exhibits. Exhibitors should be mindful of the show equipment being used and the manner in which it is being used. Show Management or Livestock Committee Leadership/Ring Stewards reserve the right to decide what constitutes acceptable show equipment and how the equipment is being used by the exhibitor. <u>Cable halters and pronged chains are prohibited for all species.</u>
- 27. Breed Champion Selections: After the completion of each class all 1st & 2nd place steers will be held in a designated holding area until the selection of the Breed Champion and Reserve Breed Champion. There will be no feed or water allowed in this holding area.
- **28. Selection of Grand Champion:** Only parent, legal guardian, CEA or AST may accompany exhibitor to the AT&T Center for the selection of the champion steer. All Breed Champion Steers are required to compete for Grand Champion Steer. Those wishing to attend the selection of the Grand Champion Steer must pre-purchase Rodeo Tickets for Friday night, February 23, 2024.

UPDATED

- 29. Placing Steers: All placing steers must sell in the Junior Market Steer Auction. All animals qualifying for the Junior Livestock Auction are required to have their photograph taken. Exhibitors of Champion and Reserve Champion steers selling through the Auction will report to the designated CB aisle at 9 AM Saturday, February 24, 2024. All other exhibitors will report to the back of the Auction Barn.

UPDATED STEER CLASSIFICATION STANDARDS UPDATED

CLASSIFICATION TERMS:

Ideal Characteristics: Characteristics in combination that most accurately represent the breed.

Acceptable Breed Characteristics: Characteristics that represent the breed.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics: Characteristics that are not reason for absolute disqualification, but in combination with other discriminatory visual characteristics could lead to disqualification.

Absolute Disqualifications: Unfavorable visual characteristics resulting in removal from a breed division.

ABC:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Any color (or color pattern).
- Progression of importance to include Bos indicus influenced head (longer from eye-to-nose than from eye-to-poll), eye (e.g., almond shaped), ear of adequate length (slightly drooping, slightly tapering at the end, and opening down and forward), showing Bos indicus-influenced sheath.
- Crest (or evidence of hump).
- With adequate Bos indicus head, eye, and ear characteristics (sheath score is of less importance).

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Bos taurus head.
- Bos taurus short ear.
- Bos taurus eye.
- Sheath score of 1.
- Slick neck (lack of crest or evidence of hump).

Absolute Disqualifications:

- A combination of a Bos taurus head, eye, and ear.

Angus:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred Angus.

- Solid black.
- Polled (i.e., born without horns).
- Needs to have a sheath that is round and perpendicular to the ground.
- Angus-type ear set, small to moderate ear size sitting high on the head and tying horizontally into the poll.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Continental breed type structure (being coarse about his joints, not to be confused with big-boned cattle) and head.
- Bumps or a ridge where horns would be on a horned animal.
- Birthmarks or white hair in the switch should be reviewed for the skin color (black skin color is acceptable; white or pink skin is a disqualification).
- Non-Angus-type ear set (ear set and excessive ear size as in Continental breeds).
- Large navels and angular sheaths.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- White skin resulting in white hair above the underline or in the front of the navel (white on the navel is acceptable).
- White skin resulting in white hair on the leg, foot, or tail.
- Horns or scurs.
- Brindle.
- Diluter color pattern.
- Dehorning scars.
- Double muscling.
- A defined ridge/bump running vertically from the center of the skull into the poll (i.e., TH Bump).

Brahman:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a 50 percent Brahman.
- A prominent hump beginning at the shoulder and going forward but must angle back down to the neck to create a hump—the width of the hump base should wrap around the neck or shoulder and not be a crest.
- Any color (or color pattern).
- With adequate Bos indicus head, eye, ear sheath/navel should represent Brahman characteristics.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

Sheath and navel score of 2 or less.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- A crest with an inadequate hump (or lack of hump).
- Inadequate Bos indicus head, eye, and/or ear.

Brangus:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred black Brangus.
- Solid black with no white above the underline or in front of the navel.
- Polled (scurs and slick spots acceptable).
- Progression of importance to include Bos indicus-influence head, eye, and ear of moderate length, slightly pointed, drooping, and opening down and forward.
- With adequate Bos indicus head, eye, and ear characteristics (sheath score is less important).
- Shows some evidence of a crest.

- Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:
- Inadequate Bos indicus-influence head, eye, and ear characteristics.
- Brown dilution over ribs, fore flank, twist, and muzzle.
- Sheath score of 1.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Horns.
- Dehorning scars.
- White above the underline or in front of the navel.
- White on the legs, feet, or tail.
- Any brindle.

Charolais:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a 50 percent purebred Charolais.
- White, yellow, gray, or silver.
- Expression of diluter gene.
- Minimal painting or spotting (less than 20 percent).
- Skunk tail, line back, or baldy.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Painting or spotting (more than 20 percent).
- Double muscling.
- Frail bone work and frail general appearance.
- Light red color or orange.
- Short, stubby head.
- Overly refined, narrow head.
- Moderate black pigmentation (e.g., skin around eyes, nose, ears, or anus).

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Black, red, or dark smuts.
- Showing no diluter gene (unless solid white).
- Excessive painting or spotting.
- Brindles/brindling, roans.
- Excessive dappling.
- Excessive black pigmentation (e.g., skin around eyes, nose, ears, or anus).

Hereford:

Ideal Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred Hereford.
- Some white on the back of both ears.
- Red body with white face, white underline, some white on lower 1/3 of leg.
- Traditional feather on neck.
- Horned Herefords must show evidence of being dehorned.

<u>Acceptable Breed Characteristics</u> (These characteristics are not necessarily desirable and in combination may be discriminating)

- Dark red color.
- Red neck.
- Eye pigment.
- Solid red ear(s).
- Black hair in tail (or ear of animal).
- Freckling on the nose/face.
- White above switch in tail.

- White across rump above the twist.
- White on legs.
- White above the underline.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Solid white ear(s).
- Larger ear size.
- Straight-line white markings on legs or tail above the switch.
- White above the hocks (on the outside and back side of rear legs).
- Excess pigment or color around the eyes.
- Red neck in combination with excess white on legs.
- Excessive line back.
- Coarse joints.
- Head:
 - o Dish head
 - o Excessive long head
 - Roman nose
 - o Extreme muscle definition.

Absolute Disqualifiers:

- Solid black nose.
- Diluter color pattern.
- Streaking of white from the feather off the shoulder.
- Brindles.
- Double muscling.
- Any color pattern other than red or white (birthmarks excluded).
- Excessive black hair on legs.

Limousin:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a Limousin:
- Head character
 - o Eye(s) Deeper socket, prominent brow, light pigment around eye on reds.
 - o Poll Typically have a wider poll.
 - o Ear(s) Tends to be smaller and set lower on head.
 - o Muzzle Tends to be short.
 - o Sheath Tends to have a forward angle.
- Legs/foot
 - o Tends to be smooth-jointed.
 - o Tends to be flat-boned.
 - o Tends to be smooth-shouldered.
- Acceptable color: Solid black, red/orange, light red, charcoal black, chocolate black, orange, bald-face, or brockle-face.
- Brindle color pattern will be allowed—providing it does not extend below the mid-rib of the body.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Head character issues (i.e., roman nose), coarse joints/skeleton.
- Coarse open shoulders.
- Pointed poll.
- Bigger and more elongated ears/high ear set.
- Pencil sheath (e.g., hanging straight down).
- Excessive crest.

- Yellow color.
- Red cattle with black nose.
- Diluter gene.
- Excessive dappling.

<u> Absolute Disqualifications:</u>

- Stocking leg(s) with white extending above the dew claw.
- Brindle below the mid-rib.
- Spotting above the underline.
- Roans, gray, silver, or white.
- Monkey/parrot mouth.
- Shows an excessive influence of another breed other than Limousin.

Maine-Anjou:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Solid red.
- Solid black.
- Red and white.
- Black and white.
- Heavy skeletal structure.
- Cattle may have black hair on the tail, muzzle, face, neck, and legs.




Figure 1. Maine Anjou brindling guidelines

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Slight brindling on topline and down toward the loin edge (Fig. 3).
- Signs of feathering on the neck.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Brindle (down past the topline, extending onto the rib and down).
- Roans.
- Diluter color pattern (e.g., yellow, orange, gray).
- Appears to be more than 50 percent of any other breed.

Polled Hereford:

Ideal Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred Polled Hereford.
- Some white on the back of both ears.
- Red body with white face, white underline, and some white on lower 1/3 of leg.
- Traditional feather on neck.
- Must be polled or have loose scurs.

<u>Acceptable Breed Characteristics:</u> (These characteristics are not necessarily desirable and in combination may be discriminating)

- Dark red color.
- Red neck.
- Eye pigment.
- Solid red ear(s).
- Black hair in tail (or ear of animal).
- Freckling on the nose/face.
- White above switch in tail.
- White across rump above the twist.
- White on legs.
- White above the underline.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Solid white ear(s).
- Larger ear size.
- Straight-line white markings on legs or tail above the switch.
- White above the hocks, on the outside and back side of rear legs.
- Excess pigment or color around the eyes.
- Red neck in combination with excess white on legs.
- Excessive line back.
- Coarse joints.
- Head:
 - o Dish head
 - o Excessive long head
 - o Roman nose
 - o Extreme muscle definition.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Horn attachment to the skull.
- Evidence of tampering with horns (or dehorning scars).
- Solid black nose.
- Diluter color pattern.
- Streaking of white from the feather off the shoulder.
- Brindles.
- Double muscling.
- Any color pattern other than red or white (birthmarks excluded).
- Excessive black hair on legs.

Red Angus:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a Red Angus.
- Solid red (shades may vary).
- Polled.
- A blond, light red (or mixed switch).
- Cattle may have black hair on the tail, muzzle, face, neck, and legs.
- Needs to have a sheath that is round and perpendicular to the ground.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Coarse joints (not to be confused with big-boned cattle).
- Solid white switch.
- Smut/gray nose pigmentation.

- Horns or scurs breaking through the skin.
- White skin resulting in white hair above the underline or in front of the navel (white on navel is acceptable).
- White skin resulting in white hair on the leg or tail/switch.
- Black pigmentation of the skin (not to be confused with freckling on the nose or anus).
- Roaning.
- Dehorning scars or evidence of dehorning.
- Black skin on the nose.
- A defined ridge/bump running vertically from the center of the skull into the poll (i.e., TH Bump).

Santa Gertrudis:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a 50 percent purebred Santa Gertrudis with adequate Bos indicus head, eye, and ear characteristics.
- Any color pattern of black, red, yellow, or orange.
- Moderate crest (no definite hump).
- Moderate dewlap development.
- Moderate length of ear (slightly drooping) and opening forward.
- Sheath score of 2 to 5.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Straight, pendulous sheath.
- Sheath score of 1.
- Brindle coloring.
- Excessive white.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Absence of any visible Santa Gertrudis characteristics.
- Absence of Bos indicus-influenced head, eye, ear, or sheath.
- Smokes, silvers, grays.

Shorthorn:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred Shorthorn.
- Red with white hair in tail switch.
- White with red hair or red pigment on ear, muzzle, anus, or tail.
- Any combination of red and white, with the red and white color pattern bleeding together.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Orange or light red color.
- Black nose pigment.
- Coarse head.
- Coarse joints/structure.
- Solid red with red tail switch.
- Round muscle pattern.

- Diluter color pattern (e.g., yellow or yellow roan).
- Blacks, blue roans, or grays.
- Brindle.
- Solid white with no red pigment on the ears, tail, or anus.
- Motley-face or brockle-face.
- Black hair (any location).

Simbrah:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- A sheath score of 2 or greater.
- With Bos indicus head, eye, and ear characteristics (sheath score is less important).
- Stocking legs.
- Bald, blaze, or streak-face or mottled-face.
- Solid black, solid red, or solid dun/tan combination with white (or any of the previously listed colors).
- Brindle color pattern with white markings.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- A sheath score of 1.
- A Bos taurus head.
- A Bos taurus ear.
- A Bos taurus eye.
- Brindle color pattern with no white.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- A combination of a *Bos taurus* head, ear, eye, and sheath.
- Roans.
- Grays.
- Smut.
- Silver.
- Solid yellow.

Simmental:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must physically exhibit breed characteristics of a purebred Simmental:
- Typically, longer head and larger ears.
- Lower ear set.
- Heavy skeletal structure.
- Acceptable colors and patterns:
- Solid black or red.
- Red and white, black and white, or yellow and white.
- Bald, blaze, or streak-face.
- Some painting above the underline (no bleeding of colors) (i.e., spotting).

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Excessive spotting.
- Excessive white above the underline.
- Motley, brockle, star, or diamond-shaped white in the head.
- Excessive white on the tail above the switch.
- Refined skeletal makeup.

- Shows excessive influence of another breed type other than Simmental.
- Silver, smoke, white, smut, gray, or any combination of these.
- Solid yellow or orange.
- Brindle.
- Roans.
- Skunk tail.

Black Cross:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must have a black body cavity—defined as the area behind the top of the shoulder blade down to the point of the shoulder and above the belly line.
- White in the body cavity is only acceptable in the following instances:
 - o White is a continuation of the feathering.
 - o White is at the fore and/or rear flanks (similar to Hereford color pattern).
 - O White spotting not collectively larger than 9 inches (e.g., basketball size) in diameter per side—cannot be all on the same side.
- Skunk tail cattle are permitted, provided the white above the rectum does not exceed the amount of white spotting allowed (e.g., basketball size).
- Absent of diluter gene.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Slight brindling is allowed, provided it does not extend below the fore and rear flanks.

- Roans.
- Excessive white in the body cavity collectively larger than 9 inches (e.g., basketball size) in diameter per side—cannot be all on the same side.




Figure 2. Black cross cattle (and other cross examples).

Red Cross:

Acceptable Breed Characteristics:

- Must have a red body cavity—defined as the area behind the top of the shoulder blade down to the point of the shoulder and above the belly line.
- White in the body cavity is only acceptable in the following instances:
 - o White is a continuation of the feathering.
 - O White is at the fore and/or rear flanks (similar to Hereford color pattern).
 - O White spotting not collectively larger than 9 inches (e.g., basketball size) in diameter per side—cannot be all on the same side.
- Skunk tail cattle are permitted, provided the white above the rectum does not exceed the amount of white spotting allowed (e.g., basketball size).
- Absent of diluter gene.
- Black hair outside the body cavity and below the anus is permittable.

Discriminatory Breed Characteristics:

- Slight brindling is allowed, provided it does not extend below the fore and rear flanks.

Absolute Disqualifications:

- Roans.
- Excessive white in the body cavity collectively larger than 9 inches (e.g., basketball size) in diameter per side—cannot be all on the same side.




Figure 3. Red cross cattle (and other cross examples).




Figure 5. Visual representation of the maximum hair length allowed on tail switch.

QUALITY BEEF CONTEST

SPECIAL RULES:

Insofar as possible, a Quality Beef Contest will be conducted. A minimum of 52 steers, including the Breed Champions, Reserve Breed Champions and all remaining first place animals in each class of each breed, will be processed for information.

Minimum Standards:

- 1. 600 lb. minimum and 1000 lb. maximum for hot carcass weight.
- 2. Minimum fat thickness, .25 inches.
- 3. Minimum ribeye area, 11.0 square inches.
- 4. Maximum USDA Yield Grade, 3.5.
- 5. Maximum USDA maturity, A100.
- 6. Minimum USDA marbling requirement, Slight 00 and minimum USDA Quality grade, Select 00.
- 7. "Dark-Cutters", if severe enough will be disqualified. Severe dark-cutting is defined as that sufficient to result in at least one full-grade reduction in the USDA quality grade.
- 8. Disqualification will result if carcasses had excessive bruises and evidence of tampering or questionable injection(s).

Steers achieving the above standards will be evaluated and placed by the official carcass judge.

SPECIAL RULES

1. Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout.

UPDATED

- 2. Number Shown: Each owner is limited to a maximum of one turkey hen and one turkey tom entry. Additional birds will become property of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. NOTE: An Exhibitor who has previously won Grand Champion Hen or Tom is ineligible to enter that same Division. For the purpose of eligibility, Turkey Hens and Turkey Toms are considered different Divisions.
- 3. Turkey Orders: All turkey poults must have been ordered by August 18, 2023, through Texas A&M University's Poultry Science Department in accordance with "The Rules and Procedures" found on the website at posc.tamu.edu. For clarification of any part of the Rules and Ordering Procedures, please contact Texas A&M AgriLife Poultry Science Extension Office at 979-845-4319.
- **4. Sift:** A Sifter will be appointed by the Show. The sift process officially begins at time of exhibitor/birds entry into the arena. Birds must be free of external parasites and disease. Each entry must have the original wing band intact and securely fastened to the bird. Any bird, which has lost its wing band for any reason, will be sifted.
- 5. Wing Bands: The sifter and judge will disregard any wing damage caused by the required wing band.
- **6. Handlers:** Must meet the eligibility requirements outlined in Rule 1 of the Junior Show Rules. Additionally, handlers must have at least one (1) entry within any department in the current Junior Livestock Show.
- 7. **Supplies:** Each exhibitor is required to bring two containers (each 16 oz. or smaller, example one pound coffee can) per entry. Exhibitors will be permitted to bring their own poultry feed onto the grounds.

UPDATED

8. Fans/Heaters: ONLY cordless fans will be permitted in the Cattle Barn during the Poultry Show. *Portacool or similar fans will not be permitted on Grounds unless provided by the show.* Heaters will not be permitted in the Cattle Barn during the Poultry Show.

UPDATED

- 9. Placing Birds: The top 35 placing Turkey Hens and top 15 placing Turkey Toms will be sold in the Junior Market Poultry Auction. All animals qualifying for the Junior Livestock Auction are required to have their photograph taken.
- 10. Medication: Refer to General Rule #29. The showing of any poultry that has been administered any quantity of diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved medication, or that has NOT been properly withdrawn from approved drugs is prohibited. Unapproved is deemed to mean NOT approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and/or the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for slaughter animals. As a condition for participation in the Show, every exhibitor must agree to submit any poultry entered by exhibitor to inspection by a veterinarian appointed by the management, and agrees to have such poultry submitted to any tests as may be designated and requested by the veterinarian. The Show specifically reserves the right to have tissue, blood or urine laboratory analysis made on any poultry entered for competition. The conclusions reached by the veterinarian, as to whether such animal has been administered a diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or other unapproved drugs, or has not been properly withdrawn from approved drugs shall be final, without recourse against the Show or any of its officers. An exhibitor of poultry producing an analysis with a quantity of diuretic, unapproved growth stimulant or any other unapproved drugs will forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit livestock including poultry in the future at the Show.
- 11. **Beta-agonists:** S.A.L.E. will not tolerate the presence of ractopamine hydrochloride (TopmaxTM) in Market Poultry, specifically all turkeys and broilers. S.A.L.E. will not tolerate the presence of zilpaterol hydrochloride (Zilmax®) in any market species or breeding animal.
- **12. Junior Turkey Hens:** Turkey Hens will be placed for the Junior Market Poultry Auction according to the following schedule:

This show is subject to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo General Rules and to the Special Rules of this section.

- 1. College Eligibility: Junior colleges in the U.S. with Agriculture departments are eligible to enter the Junior contest. Senior colleges in the U.S., which offer a degree in Animal Science, are eligible to enter the Senior contest. The entry application must be signed officially by the team coach, certifying that all team members are eligible for entry in this contest. Each college will be permitted to enter only one team per division.
- 2. Entry: An entry fee of \$150 will be charged for each team entering this contest made payable to S.A.L.E. Junior and Senior colleges will be allowed to enter additional individual contestants for a fee of \$30 per individual. Complete one Judging Contest Entry Form listing the number of teams and individuals from the College or University. Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed.
- 3. Coaches Meeting: Coaches will designate their team members at the Coaches Meeting. Coaches who do not attend the Coaches Meeting must notify the Competitive Events Department by 6:30 p.m. Friday, February 23, 2024 of their intentions to either enter or withdraw from the contest. Failure to do so may result in disqualification. The Coaches meeting will take place at 6:30 p.m. Friday, February 23, 2024 in the SALE Committeemen's Room located in the Frontier Club.
- 4. Junior College Contestant Eligibility/Team Makeup: Each Junior team will consist of six members. The five highest scores will count for the team total. Each team member is eligible for individual awards. Contestants must be regularly enrolled in a Junior College (2-year program) and may not have credit for more than 66 semester hours or the equivalent. Contestants must have attended full time the previous semester at the school for which they are competing, or not attended any Junior College the previous semester, in order to be eligible to compete. Students must be eligible according to the rules set forth by the Junior College Coaches Association. Junior colleges may enter (1) team in this division. Contestants entered in this division must not have competed in the junior college professional division in past years and may be eligible to enter the senior college division in future contests.
- 5. Senior College Contestant Eligibility/Team Makeup: Each Senior team will consist of six members. The five highest scores will count for the team total. Each team member is eligible for individual awards. Senior college individual participants not designated as members of a team will be eligible for individual overall awards. Contestants must be regularly enrolled in a Senior College, which offers a degree in agriculture. Students who have participated as contestants in Senior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contests of interstate or international character previous to January 1, 2024, are not eligible to enter this contest. Contestants must have been regularly enrolled in their respective colleges the previous semester and must not have served any time as an animal science instructor at any secondary school or college. Students must be eligible according the rules set forth by the Senior College Coaches Association.
- 6. Future Contests: Contestants entering this contest will not be eligible to enter future Junior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contest held at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo but may be eligible to enter the Senior Intercollegiate Livestock Judging Contest if they transfer to a Senior College.

- 7. Barn Entry: No contestant or coach will be permitted to enter the Show barns 24 hours prior to the contest.
- **8. Arena Seating:** Coaches and alternates will not be permitted in the seats of the arena while the contest is in progress. Coaches and alternates may be permitted to see the classes after the judging is completed.
- 9. Classes: Each class will consist of four animals. Animals within a class will be designated by numbers 1, 2, 3 and 4. The following classes will be judged: three classes of sheep; three classes of swine; four classes of cattle; and
- 10. Time Limits: On each class of livestock, 12 minutes will be allowed for the contestants to make their observations, record their placings, and take such notes as will assist them in remembering the class when they appear before the judge to present their oral reasons. Contestants will be notified two minutes before the time is up. When final time is called, the contestants will immediately hand their score cards to the group leader.
- **11. Class Change:** Each group of contestants will change to another class as directed by the Superintendent and/or group leader.
- 12. Oral Reasons: After placing all classes in the contest, the contestants will each appear before judges to give oral reasons substantiating their placings of the classes. Each contestant will be allowed two minutes to give his/her reasons on each class.
- 13. Dress Code: No contestant or team members will wear any clothing (uniform, pins, belt buckle, etc.) to blatantly signify to the judge his/her identity or the identity of the college represented.
- 14. **Disqualification:** While the contest and oral reasons are in progress, no use of electronic devices (cell phones, etc.), talking or unethical communication between contestants or with coaches is allowed. Violation of this rule may result in individual and/or team disqualification. If there is the appearance of a violation a verbal warning may be issued. If there is a second occurrence, the individual will receive a zero for that class or set of reasons.
- **15. Rule Violations:** Any coach or contestant who violates any of the rules of this contest may be barred from competing in future contests and their team will be disqualified for any awards.
- 16. Ties: Ties will be broken using species reasons scores, overall reasons scores and overall score when breaking ties within species. Ties within reasons will be broken by placing score, with the winner of the tie being awarded to the contestant with the worse placing score. Ties within overall score will be broken by overall reasons. Scores tied after application of these tie breakers will be broken by a method determined by contest officials. No duplicate awards will be given.
- 17. Scoring: Scan sheets used for scoring are provided by San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Standard rules that apply to optical scanning should be followed (blacken only one bubble per class, completely blacken the bubble, avoid stray marks, do not fold or bend). Each contestant must bring a #2 pencil and may bring a clipboard for use during the contest. Forms that are bent or abused will not be scored. Team number and contestant number are assigned at registration.
- **18.** Judging Workout: Insofar as possible a select group of classes (2 4 classes) will be made available to teams for practice following the completion of the Junior Market Steer Show on Thursday, February 22nd in the Cattle Barn Arena. Teams are invited to the grounds to observe the show but will not be allowed to "pull" classes from the stalls or holding areas that are not intended for the designated steer workout. It is the responsibility of those "pulling" classes to return the cattle to the proper location.

- 1. College/Contestant Eligibility: Colleges and universities may enter one or more teams. Three or four members will constitute a team. The three high scores will determine the team score. Collegiate contestants must be regularly enrolled in a Junior or Senior College, which offers a degree in Animal Science. Collegiate contestants entering this contest will not be eligible to enter future Wool Judging Contests at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.
- 2. Entry: An entry fee of \$100.00 per collegiate team or \$25.00 for individuals made payable to S.A.L.E. will be charged for this event. Complete one Judging Contest Entry Form listing the number of teams and individuals from the College or University. Official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed.
- **3. Materials:** Each contestant is required to bring two #2 pencils and one clipboard. Scantrons (Collegiate Wool Sheet) will be provided for this contest
- **4. Classes:** This contest will consist of six (6) wool classes, fifteen (15) grading fleeces, and three (3) sets of reasons on designated classes.
- 5. Time Limits: Contestants will be allowed fifteen (15) minutes on each class of fleeces to make their observations and to mark their placing and reasons. Contestants will be given forty-five (45) minutes on each of the grading divisions of the wool.
- **6. Divisions:** All entrants will compete in one division.
- 7. **Disqualification:** While the contest and oral reasons are in progress, no use of electronic devices (cell phones, etc.), talking or unethical communication between contestants or with coaches is allowed. Violation of this rule may result in individual and/or team disqualification.
- **8.** Scoring: The contest will be graded, and the scores will be totaled by contest officials.
- **9.** Ties: All ties among any placing teams or individuals will be broken.

*****NEW WELDING SKILLS DEMONSTRATION*****

- A skills portion will be added this year during check-in for the following:
- DIVISIONS 3, 8, 9, 10 AND 11
- The skill will be a welding demonstration that will be held at the Salado lot.
- The skills portion will START at 7:00 AM and will END at 3:00 PM.
- The AST/CEA will choose one student to represent each project to complete the welding skills demonstration.
- The student MUST be on the official entry card as a participant in the building of the project.
- Each chosen student may only represent ONE project, regardless of the number of projects on which he/she is entered.
- THE STUDENT WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR BRINGING THEIR OWN PPE. NO PPE WILL BE PROVIDED BY THE STOCK SHOW.
- The stock show will provide the coupons to be welded.
- The student will be randomly assigned a basic weld to complete. They will be allowed two attempts to complete the assigned weld.
- The students will be welding on a Millermatic 252 or industry equivalent.

- The coupons will be displayed with the projects on Saturday during judging.
- Every project from the afore-mentioned divisions MUST HAVE A PARTICIPANT IN THE WELDING DEMONSTRATION-NO EXCEPTIONS.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Entry Fee: The entry fee for each project is \$50.00. Entries must be submitted online and all official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo entry forms must be completed. Exhibitor names and social security numbers are required on the entry form. Because exhibitor cards are computer generated from entry data, it is imperative that Exhibitor Names and Project Descriptions be correct.
 - Exhibitors' names should be spelled correctly with first letter of names capitalized.
 - Information on naming and proper classification of projects can be found in the *Naming, Describing and Classification of Projects (NDC)* document.

UPDATED

- The Classification Committee has the right to reclassify any project. Any project that does NOT easily fit within a class will be disqualified. The decisions of the classifying committee will be final. All projects that are disqualified will NOT be allowed in the show barn. There will be NO discussion or debate concerning the committee's final decision. Further argument could lead to other or future disqualifications. Concerns with project fit should be addressed with the superintendents prior to entry submission.
- 2. Eligible Entries: Contestants must meet all San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Junior Show Rule Requirements.

UPDATED

- 3. Projects: Projects must have been constructed by FFA or 4-H members either as a part of their agricultural mechanics instruction in agricultural science or as part of their supervised work experience program. Projects must be designed and constructed under the direct supervision and guidance of the AST/CEA. Project dimensions length, width and height to the nearest foot are to be provided when entering. This information will help define the space needed for the project. Gates and Panels will require only length and height. For space needed measurement, trailer length should include tongue.
- 4. Individual/Group Entries: Projects may be individually or group constructed. Entries must be made in the name of the FFA Chapter or 4-H Club. Entries must include only the name(s) and social security number(s) of those who participated in the planning and construction of the project. Group entries are comprised of two (2) or a maximum of six (6) students.
- **5. Number of Entries:** No exhibitor may be involved in the construction of more than three projects, whether group or individual. This does not limit the number of projects a chapter or club may enter.
- **6. Exhibit Space:** Insofar as possible projects will be displayed by class. Placement of the projects will be at the discretion of show officials. Some projects will be displayed outside.
- 7. Judging Procedures: Only exhibitors of the project may present the project to the judges.
- **8. Construction Date:** A project may be exhibited only one time at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo and must have been completed within one calendar year of the exhibition date.
- 9. Project Substitutions: Same as Project/Animal Substitution outlined in General Rule #12.
- 10. Exhibitor Substitutions: Substitution may be made under one of the conditions outlined in Junior Rule #14.
- 11. Adding/Removing Exhibitor(s) from a Group Entry: Group projects cannot be comprised of more than six (6) exhibitors. AST or CEA may add/remove an exhibitor from a project by submitting an *Add/Remove Exhibitor Form* to the Livestock Office by mail or email to livestock@sarodeo.com or completing the form during Check-In at the Salado Creek Property. Exhibitor additions may be submitted by January 15, 2024, for no charge. Additions submitted from January 16 until the end of Check-In will be subject to an additional entry fee (\$50). Exhibitors may be removed from a project by submitting an *Add/Remove Exhibitor Form* by the end of Check-In for no charge.

UPDATED

12. Types of Projects: Only those projects that fit into the stated classes will be accepted. Final project classification will be at the discretion of the Classification Committee. Any project that does NOT easily fit within a class will be disqualified. The decisions of the classifying committee will be final. There will be NO discussion of disqualifications. Concerns with project fit should be addressed with the superintendents prior to entry submission.

Leather goods, spurs, knives, canoes, teepees, fishing rods, boats, glass top display tables, vehicles that have been converted to cookers, pickup beds converted into picnic tables/cooking devices, bars, etc., camp trailers, benches with pickup tailgates, tiny houses, gun safes are not approved projects. Projects made of all wood are not allowed. (This is <u>not</u> a complete list) Projects made largely of wood will require at least 25% of a skill other than carpentry to be used in construction. The addition of metal ornaments or bands attached to a wood project will not be considered a part of the 25%. No repurposed structures or remodeled projects are allowed. Please read the Naming, Describing and Classification of Projects R24 (NDC) for additional description of classification and approved projects. JAM allows only projects that require the skills and knowledge identified in the Agricultural Mechanics Curriculum – TEKS 130.2 (14) that fit into divisions and classes referenced in the Naming, Describing & Classification (NDC) document. Those projects that are not acceptable will not be allowed in the East Gate to be placed in barn.

UPDATED

- 13. Vehicles: Projects will not be allowed to be displayed on trucks, tractors, trailers, or other vehicles that are not entered to be exhibited and will not be allowed in the exhibit area. If a vehicle needs to be a part of a display Superintendents must grant permission before the submission of entry.
- **14. Project Completeness:** All projects must be complete including finish. Any item necessary for use of the project must be a part of the project (example: hinges and latches on gates and panels). Documentation (all 4 components) is considered part of the project. Refer to Special Rule 18 Documentation & Research.
- **15. Project Presentation:** Criteria to be considered for Showmanship:
 - a. Neatness of project Clean and free of dust and debris.
 - b. Neatness of surroundings Includes floor under and around the project.
 - c. **Documentation** Presented in a manner that judges and the public can view. Awards, exhibitor cards, ribbons, or other materials from other or previous project shows should not be included in the documentation or display.
 - **d. Signs** All projects are to be identified with the official exhibitor card. Other signs, banners, etc. are subject to approval by Superintendent. "For Sale" signs are <u>not</u> permitted.

UPDATED

- e. Exhibitor Card It is recommended that the exhibitor card be placed in a clear plastic sleeve and affixed neatly to the front center of the project. Exhibitor Cards must be on projects after arrival at show grounds. After set-up completion, the exhibitor card must be fixed to the project or the project will be subject to disqualification.
- **f.** Sponsors Sponsors of a project may be identified with approval of Superintendent
- g. Logos Do not use company logos on projects unless provided a limited use agreement.
- h. Inappropriate Silhouettes Inappropriate silhouettes or cutouts should not be used on projects.
- i. Safety All safety procedures must be adhered to when displaying projects. Oxygen and fuel cylinders, acetylene or propane are not allowed.
- j. Clutter Exhibitors should confine paraphernalia, chairs, show boxes, cleaning supplies, brooms, and wiping rags to their assigned display area.
- **k. Painting/Scratches** Paint is not allowed in the display area. Judges will be instructed to make allowances for scratches or damage due to transportation or off-loading.
- **16. Exhibitor Presentation:** Criteria to be considered for Showmanship:
 - a. Attire Exhibitors should be dressed appropriately and be with their project when it is judged.
 - **b. Sportsmanship** Exhibitors should be courteous and helpful to those viewing their project, including those exhibiting next to them. Exhibitors should not interfere with or shield those who are exhibiting next to them.
 - **c. Knowledge** Exhibitors should be available to answer questions when their project is being judged. Knowledge of the project will be evaluated at this time. Knowledge is part of Presentation on Judging Criteria. Exhibitors should be well informed of the project they are representing.
 - **d.** Exhibit Aids Exhibitors should provide any equipment that may be necessary to judge their project (flashlights, mat or creeper for judging projects where judge needs to get under project such as trailers). Exhibitors may be requested to hold measuring tape and assist the judge in taking measurements of project.
 - e. Naming Project Proper project name and classification will be reflected on the Exhibitor Card. See Naming, Describing & Classification of Projects (NDC).

Note: At least one chapter/club exhibitor should be available to answer questions from the public or show officials, including showmanship and documentation judges at all times.

17. **Documentation & Research:** Documentation is considered a research portfolio and should not be constructed as a scrapbook. Documents should be easy to read and arranged neatly in a tabbed notebook with Table of Contents and numbered pages. Additional explanation for Documentation is found in *Documentation Check Sheet*. Documentation for Tractor Restoration is explained below, Rule 27c.

<u>Documentation & Research Package must include the following four components: (Documentation & Research Package Template is available on website).</u>

- a. Working Drawing: Must include an original (exhibitor-drawn) multi-view orthographic projection drawn to a given scale with proper lettering and dimensioning. The scale must be identified on the drawing. The dimensions shown on drawing should be specific and complete enough for it to be apparent that drawing was used to plan and construct project. Judges will spot check dimensions on projects to see if they comply with drawings. Drawing may be pencil or CAD (Computer Aided Design). Pictorials, isometric, oblique or perspective may be included.
- b. Bill of Materials (BOM): Must include a list or a description of material, including columns 1) Date, 2) Description, 3) Size, 4) Quantity, 5) Unit, 6) Cost per item, 7) Extended or Total Costs. Other information such as, OC (Opportunity Cost) to identify items that were donated but have value, PE (Professional Expenses) to identify work done by others, sum of all (Total Costs) cost including OC and PE should be shown in BOM. Vendor's name and/or Purchase Order Number, etc. may be included. Invoices or Sales Receipts are recommended to be included with the BOM, but do not replace the BOM. BOM may be developed using a computer spread sheet program.
- c. Photographs: Show work in progress and should illustrate proper safety procedures including clothing, eye and face shields, etc. Photographs should be sequenced in the order of constructing the project. Exhibitor(s) should be in pictures. CEA/AST should be in some of the pictures. Pictures must be of good quality with labels identifying activity and exhibitor(s) in the picture. No more than 40 pictures may be included, with the exception of Tractor Restoration, and Reconditioning Classes. Two, but no more than four pictures per page is recommended. Pictures should be labeled identifying the person(s) in them and skill. Additional photographs may be displayed in a separate notebook for public viewing or may be displayed using computer display if electricity is available. Videos may also show construction, but computer displays and videos do not substitute for the photos required in the documentation notebook.

d. Research - Papers to be included:

- i. All projects attaching to tractors and/or PTO must include the latest appropriate ASABE Standards Special Rule 21. Instructions for accessing the ASABE standards are found at www.jamshow.org.
- **ii.** All Projects pulled on public highways must include relevant DOT codes including Federal Lighting Table, Special Rule 20 Federal Lighting Equipment Location Requirements can be downloaded from the website.
- iii. Product Information (PI) bulletins and/or Safety Data Sheets (SDS) or (MSDS) must be germane to the project and should include paints and chemical supplies, etc. Manufacturer's specifications or PIs for trailer and equipment components such as axles, springs, wheels, jacks, break-aways, and hydraulic cylinders should be included.

Projects having no documentation are not complete and will be disqualified.

18. Project Safety:

- **a. Display:** Appropriate and safe display stands must be provided for gates, panels, and other projects requiring support. Sharp edges and points, such as found on roofs of self-feeders, bale movers, etc.; must be padded and/or protected where necessary to prevent possible injury to spectators and exhibitors.
- **b. General Safety:** Flammable and/or combustible liquids shall not be stored or sprayed in buildings, or on the show grounds. This shall include, but not limited to enamel paints, thinners, reducers, or gasoline. No cylinders (oxygen, acetylene, or propane) are allowed. Electric extension cords must not cross aisles used as exit ways.
- **c. Projects with Engines:** No more than 2 inches of fuel depth is allowed in any fuel tank. The fuel tank cap must be in place. A fuel cap does not need to be taped. All batteries, except tractors must be disconnected. See Tractor Safety below.

UPDATED

- **19. Transportation Statutes:** All trailers <u>and other equipment</u> that will be operated and/or transported on public roads must be equipped with safety equipment specified in Codes of Federal Regulations, Title 49 Transportation, parts 300 to 399. No Agriculture Exemptions except farm tags are allowed. See the website for *JAM Trailer Rules and Codes*. All trailers and tongue equipment pulled on highways will be pre-inspected at the Salado Creek Property.
 - a. Trailer wiring, lights and brakes will be tested. Colors of conductors in the wiring harness should meet industry standards. See *Trailer Construction Guide*. The trailer must be grounded to vehicle with grounding wire in harness. (Trailer grounding only through hitch is not acceptable.)
 - **b.** All trailers must have a Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) or Serial Number (SN) or Trailer Identification Number (TIN) placed on tongue. SN, VIN or TIN will not be used to check registration. All trailers that are pulled to the show must have a license plate. May use Farm Tag.
 - c. All tongue equipment that are pulled on a public highway for example: trailers, squeeze chutes, hydraulic log splitters, mowers, tillage tools, sprayers, etc. will be DOT inspected at Salado Creek Property for approved (1) safety chains, (2) tongue jacks, (3) lights and reflectors.
 - **d.** All trailers rated at 4500 pounds GWR or greater must have approved brakes, safety chains and break-away equipment. This includes bumper pull as well as gooseneck trailers. See *Trailer Check Sheets and Construction Guide*.
 - e. All trailers must be equipped with lift jacks for hitching and unhitching including goosenecks and tongue.
 - f. Tie down attachments (D Rings) (minimum of 4) are recommended on all utility trailers.
 - g. Fender Wheel Clearance Judges will abide by specifications provided in PI documents. General specifications are: (a) Four-inch fender clearance above tire is required with exceptions of (b) torsion axle 3 inches and (c) single axle trailers 3 inches. Fenders must be wider than tire tread, so edge of fender does not cut tire.
 - h. Any trailer that is over width (102 inches) must have a signed **Texas** over-width permit. **No Out-of-State** over-width permits will be accepted. Current over-width permit must be presented at the time of DOT inspection. Trailer widths will be measured at the widest point on the trailer, metal to metal. Permit dates must include days in transportation to and from JAM show. Review *Trailer Construction Guide* for major codes and rules. It is the exhibitors' responsibility to review and understand all TxDOT and Federal Codes.

Any trailer that is over 102 inches in width without a permit will be discounted 10 points. Over wide without a permit does not designate disqualification for the show.

- 20. ASABE Standards: All three-point hitch and/or PTO operated equipment must meet the latest ASABE (The Society for Engineering in Agricultural, Food, and Biological Systems) standards. Both standards have been revised in the past six years. Must have the ASABE approved code and monthly password to access and print documents from the ASABE Technical Library. Codes are available through December. Standards should be downloaded in time for use in planning and construction of a project. Instructions to access ASABE Standards along with monthly codes as well as other important links to helpful information can be found on the website. If you have questions or need additional help, please contact one of the superintendents Charles Prause charles.prause@icevonline.com; Barry Randolph stabar05@centex.net; Dr. Ryan Anderson radadatastate.edu.
 - **a. Power take-off equipment** must meet ASABE standard, *Agriculture Tractors* Rear —mounted power take-off types 1, 2, 3 and 4 Part 3: Main PTO dimensions and spline dimensions, locations of PTO. This Standard was revised 2019. When searching ASABE to find and download a PDF file enter Document number ASABE/ISO 500 or title of Standard.
 - b. 3 Point linkage must meet ASABE standard, Agricultural wheeled tractors Rear Mounted three-point linkage-Categories 1N, 1, 2N, 2, 3N, 3, 4N, and 4. To find and download the PDF enter AD730 for document number or name of title of Standard. This document was revised March 2015.
 - c. Copies of the most recent ASABE standards must be included in the Research Section of documentation for those projects that apply. There are additional related standards – these related standards are optional for including in research documentation.
- 21. Loss or Damage: Every precaution will be taken to protect projects, however, neither the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo nor the show officials will be responsible for any loss or damage to projects including tractors and unloading and loading them.
- 22. Projects Needing Off-loading Assistance: Projects that must be hoisted from the topside are to be fitted with lifting eyes at balance points that will accommodate one-inch shackles. Trailers that are transporting both tractors and other projects should be arranged so tractor can be off loaded separate from other projects. Projects that Show Officials conclude cannot be safely off-loaded with equipment available may be shown on the trailer at an

alternate site.

TRACTOR SHOW (All Tractor Classes)

24. Tractor Restoration and Reconditioning Classes (instructions below include Skid Steers and Yard & Garden tractors)

- a. Tractor Serial Numbers must be included with the Description on Entry Form and Exhibitor Card
- b. Tractor Exhibitor Cards must be on tractors when they are off-loaded on Friday morning at show grounds.
- c. Unloading and loading will be under the direction of show officials. See Special Rule 27d below.
- d. Tractor may be started and driven only at the request of show officials.
- e. All steel lugged wheel tractors must be fitted with road bands.
- f. All steel crawler tractors must be fitted with rubber lugs or exhibitors must provide rubber mats or belts. (Used rubber conveyor belts can be used.) Plywood sheets may be provided to get tractors into barn without damaging asphalt or concrete surfaces.
- g. Tractor Documentation and Research package must be turned in when off-loading Friday. No changes to package after they are submitted.
- h. Original Work Sheets completed by judges when inspecting tractors will be given to the exhibitor. It is exhibitors' responsibility to place these worksheets unaltered in the front of their Documentation (3 ring notebooks) when documentation is returned to them. Note: Worksheets are Generic to all tractor classes with slight modifications.
- i. Exhibitors must provide for each tractor, tools including flashlight necessary to check fluid levels. Also, cloth or paper wipes and step ladder for large tractors to allow judges to check fuel and fluid levels. Tires pressure will be checked.
- j. Fuel tanks must not have more than 3 inches of fuel in the tank.
- k. Fuel shut off valves under tanks must be functional and valves closed when exhibiting tractor.
- 1. A fully approved ABC fire extinguisher with minimum of 5 lb. capacity must be provided next to tractor.
- m. Display area: Table or bench size should not exceed 3 ft by 6 ft. (Should not be so large to block access to tractors.) If toolbox is used it must be sized to fit under table. Toolbox may serve as table.

- n. Electrical outlets are not guaranteed.
- o. Caution tape is not necessary and should not be used. Signs may be used to request the public to keep off tractor.
- p. Drip pans under tractors should **not** be used when exhibiting tractor. Any fluid drops to the floor must be wiped up. Pans should be used at night.

1501 Tractors – 1961 to present. (Restoration) Requires that all components of tractor be restored to as new a condition as possible. <u>Uses Restoration Judging Criteria.</u>

1502 Tractors and Skid Steers - 1961 to present. (Repair & Reconditioning) Class includes both Tractors and Skid Steers. <u>Uses Repair & Reconditioning Judging Criteria.</u>

1503 Yard and Garden Tractors – 1961 to present. (Repair and Reconditioning). <u>Uses Repair & Reconditioning Judging Criteria.</u>

- Maximum Power 30 Engine HP
- Maximum Diameter of metal rims for wheels 16 inches
- Zero Turn mowers are allowed in this class.
- No ATV's, UTV's or racing pulling mowers or other home-built tractors are allowed.
- Tractor should be near original function and include its mower deck.
- Tractors with rear-mounted power take-off (PTO) attachments are optional.
- Worn or old components should be repaired or replaced including belts, hoses, tires, wiring harnesses and electrical terminals including starting motors if equipped, switches and lights.
- All safety devices sensors, safety switches, labels, ROPS and seat belts that were included on the new tractor – are required.
- All guards, including mower blades must be functional and in place.
- Any Optional equipment/components attached to tractor must be in good repair. For example, tractor may be equipped with front end loader, operators' canopy, optional lighting, and etc.
- All maintenance should be performed and noted. Replacing fluids, adjusting belt tensions and tire
 pressures. Engine components such as oil and air filters, lubrication, spark plugs and points, air gaps
 on magnetos are examples of maintenance items.
- Authenticity is not required. Parts may be replaced including engine with aftermarket components –
 Keeping them approximately the same size and power as original. If a replacement engine is used, criteria for the engine selection should be included in documentation.
- OEM Components may be replaced with improved, more up-to-date after-market parts.
- Aesthetics is considered but may not require complete body work and repainting. Painting schemes and colors that are used should be near original. Improved Resale Value should dictate the degree of Aesthetics. Sheet metal should be repaired including rust removal, welding, and painting to prevent rust. Fiberglass parts should be repaired, and these repairs should be painted. Tractors should be washed and clean. Waxing of original finish is recommended to prepare tractor for exhibition.
- Diagnosis is an important judging criterion see Division 15 Reconditioning & Repair Judging Criteria
- The more complex diagnostics and repairs should be documented, or time lapses videoed and made available to judges along with pictures as required in documentation.
- ASABE standards <u>are not required</u>. Other appropriate standards such as SAE, API and others should be included.

EXPLANATIONS OF BOTH, RESTORATION, AND REPAIR & RECONDITIONING JUDGING CRITERIA

NOTE: In explanations below the term "Tractor" may include Skid Steers and Yard & Garden Tractors.

a. Mechanical

- i. All tractor classes.
 - As part of the mechanical evaluations exhibitors will be asked to start and drive tractor, demonstrating all gears along with systems, hydraulics, lights, brakes, PTO, etc. Driving and some mechanical evaluation will be conducted outside after off-loading on Friday. Most of the safety criteria will also be evaluated at this time. Exhibitors may be asked to move tractors back outside Saturday for additional evaluation.
 - Refer to Driving, Mechanical & Knowledge Reference Sheet 1-for more specific information.
 - NOTE: Sandblasting is discouraged except on large castings such as weights, wheels and rims and components that have no moving parts. Engine blocks and heads, transmissions, clutch housings, differential and axle housing should not be sandblasted. Sandblasting can warp or distort sheet metal parts and impact aesthetics. Sand remaining from sandblasting can result in major damage to tractors. Evidence of sand will result in deducting points in Mechanical.
- ii. Restoration Classes 1401, 1402, & 1501
 - To include the mechanical restoration of all systems including Engine, Transmission and Final Drive.
 - Including components fuel (carburetor or diesel pump), cooling, ignition, exhaust, clutch, brakes, steering, starting, lighting, charging, hydraulics, 3 point and PTO. Some tractors may not have all of these.
- iii. Reconditioning Classes 1502 (includes Skid Steers) & 1503
 - Will include only those systems or components that need major repairing or reconditioning. (Those systems that were repaired or maintained should be identified in the Table of Contents see below.) Exchanging parts, for example removing a diesel pump and putting on pump stand must include proof of diagnosis in determining pump malfunction to be awarded diagnostic points. Mechanical is worth 30 points in classes 1502 & 1503. Diagnostic points are awarded in its own Category (Criterion). Maintenance is considered in these classes and is included in the Mechanical criterion. Maintenance may be an extensive list such as maintenance required for warranty. Examples of maintenance could include cooling, fluids, hoses, belts, clutch adjustments, air conditioning and tappet adjustments. Some maintenance items may require checking codes on tractor display which could require computer to help diagnose error codes could be considered in diagnosis criterion.

b. Knowledge & Presentation: (All tractor classes)

- Knowledge is an important criterion in meeting JAM educational goals.
- Judges will ask technical questions to determine the exhibitor(s) knowledge of and involvement in restoration/reconditioning. Judges may present precision tools, tractor, or skid steer components for exhibitors to identify, describe and discuss.
- Presentation includes showmanship (see showmanship score card) and encompasses the following: meeting public, making eye contact, introducing self, being confident, articulate, exhibiting enthusiasm and excitement when describing tractor. Display area including area around and under the tractor or skid steer is considered. Display items may include Owners & Technical Manuals, video equipment including computer display and worn, or broken parts replaced in restoration or reconditioning.

c. Documentation and Research: (All Tractor Classes)

• Documentation is a research portfolio and should not be considered a scrapbook. Documentation must be typed (recommend word processor and spreadsheet using computer)

- Many Exhibitors use Documentation to exhibit their knowledge and understanding of Tractors Skid Steers and the skills necessary to Restore and Recondition them. In the photo sections, most exhibitors expand on what they are doing using two or three paragraphs in their descriptions of each system (photo section) transmission, engine, clutch, etc. All pictures should be labeled.
- Judges rely on the Documentation Section in addition to questioning to ascertain the knowledge and understanding exhibitors have of the different systems and components and the procedures they used. Many of the knowledge points are determined when judges are inspecting the documents, pictures and asking questions over materials they are reviewing.
- Review *Tractor Restoration Documentation Template (PDF)* on the website. This template was prepared in 2016 and requires slight modifications, for example, skid steers should be included along with up to date documentation requirements.
- The *Documentation, Knowledge & Presentation Reference Sheet 2* on the website has more specific information. This document also needs modified slightly. Judges critique sheets are on the website.
- Documentation should be arranged in a three-ring binder, using sequenced labeled dividers with a
 corresponding table of contents. The suggested Table of Contents shown below will differ slightly
 between Restoration and Reconditioning classes.
- Tractor documentation will be submitted to a judge at unloading. Documentation may not be altered after it is returned to exhibitor.

Table of Contents - Documentation for all Classes should include Table of Contents similar to one shown below with page numbers - Refer to Template on website (Tractor could include Skid Steer)

I.	Tractor, skid steer or Yard & Garden Tractor History – Previous Owners – where obtained, etc. (Max 1 page) Could include Picture of tractor as you found it. Restoration or Reconditioning – Mechanics Summary Report including Complexity. Factors – CF (Max 1 page) Could include Picture of Completed Tractor.
	Thetoro of (Main I page) doubt metade Flectire of completed Flactor.
III.	 Expense Reports – show in spreadsheet format. Similar to BOM in project show. a. Parts – Costs of all parts and supplies – invoices included with dates. Show Total Expense including Sub Totals of OC and PE. Consumable items – for example, gasket sealer – parts cleaning solution could be considered as supplies. b. Opportunity Cost – OC (identified in Expense Report with OC next to dollar value) These are items which were given/donated to you – identify their value in dollars, same as if you purchased them. Show sub-total for all OC. c. Professional Expenses – PE (Identified in Expense Report with PE notation) These are expenses incurred from taking part to professional technicians. For example, taking a diesel pump to a Diesel Shop so they can put it on pump stand – diagnose and repair it. You are encouraged to be present when the technician is evaluating and/or repairing part so you can learn from this. Have picture taken of you with Professional mechanic to be included in your photos. Professionals should be identified in pictures. PE expenses should be presented in a report by itself with Title: <i>Professional Expenses</i>. Should have a sub-total for this category.

IV.	Photos – (order of presentation - disassembly – evaluation – repair) All Photos should have a title (label) or description identifying names of exhibitors performing task in picture. Teacher (AST) or CEA and others helping exhibitor should be in a few of the pictures and identified. Most pictures should be technical skills illustrating for example using precision tools – micrometers, torque wrenches, small hole and telescoping gauges, adjusting tappets or clutch, timing engine, diagnosing hydraulic system with pressure gauges, etc. Exhibitors should use two or three paragraphs to explain what they are doing in the pictures in different sections. See example <i>Template</i> .
	a. No more than 120 pictures with 2 pictures per page. Plastic cover sheets are not required for picture
	pages. b. Photos of high quality – could be on photo paper – excellent contrast and brightness. Judges will
	also evaluate safety issues in the pictures – gloves, face shields, spray painting, etc. c. Photos shown by sections. The sequence may be different from that depicted below. (Recondition Class will only have pictures in sections of components they diagnosed and repaired.) i. Engine ii. Clutch
	 iii. Transmission iv. Final Drive Train – Transmission & Final Drive could be combined in a Power Train Section v. Ancillary & External components could include steering, operator comfort, controls, fuel, air filter, turbo, electrical, cooling hydraulics, brakes, etc. vi. Sheet Metal and finishing – Reconditioning class should include Aesthetic items here also. For example, was a cab kit installed?

V.	General Specifications – Examples, Tractor Fluid Capacity chart, Tractor Horsepower, Hitch Category, Torque chart for fasteners, Valve Tappet adjustments, tractor operator controls, safety items and symbols.
VI.	Recondition Class only – Equipment Check-in Sheet and Service Preliminary Sheet. These sheets are forms tractor dealers use when tractor or machine is brought to them by farmers for repair. It is suggested that you use the local dealers' forms/sheets.
	a. Equipment Check-In sheet. Customers help the dealer fill this form out when customer brings in equipment or tractor to be repaired. It includes all the information regarding the customer, such as name, address, phone, email etc. It also identifies the machine(s) and or tractor(s) brought in. An important part of this form is asking the farmer to identify or describe the problem (issue) – why the machine was brought in.
	b. Service Preliminary Form. The technician fills out this form after he has inspected the machine and list all items that are needed to repair or fix problem. Form is presented to customer for him to sign authorizing necessary parts and repairs prior to repair.
VII.	Research SDS and/or PI. ASABE standards including PTO and Hitch Category. See Special rule 21. All relevant Judges Check & Reference sheets. Letters, correspondence with those who advised or helped you with tractor. Owner's Manual and Parts manuals along with IT manuals are usually too large to show here. They may be books themselves, but you could reference those displayed. You may also want to identify those items or parts that you have on display.

- **d. Safety:** Safety is measured in several ways. See *Aesthetics, Authenticity & Safety Reference 3* on the website. All equipment that was original to the tractor should be in place (including all shields and decals) Tractors must be in a safe operating condition and the following safety procedures must be followed.
 - i. Judges will inspect photos to see if the tractor was repaired in a safe environment including painting facilities, exhibitors wearing safety glasses and or face shields, gloves, proper and safe clothing. Proper use of hoist and lifting devices, combustible materials stored properly, etc.
 - ii. Safe procedures must be followed in unloading and loading tractors skid steers or yard & garden tractors. Special rules and regulations related to unloading, driving, and loading equipment is posted on the website. These will be strictly adhered to, and safety points deducted for infractions.

- 1) Basic rules for driving, unloading, and loading tractors, (skid steers and yard & garden tractors included) Tractors are unloaded and loaded only under the direction of show officials. No tractor will be offloaded without supervision of show official. Throttle setting is important in unloading, loading, and moving vehicles to and from lot and barn. Speed and or throttle setting are critical safety considerations in all power vehicles tractors, skid steers and yard & garden. Show officials will supervise when moving a tractor, skid steer or yard & garden tractor. In most cases operator will be instructed to have throttle in idle position especially in skid steers.
- 2) Tractor (all powered vehicles) driver must have experience in driving and loading tractor on trailer hauling it to show. Operator must have the approval of the AST or CEA. Leader certifies that operator meets these criteria. Diver unloading and loading the tractor may or may not be the exhibitor, but safety point deductions will be attributed to that tractor based on the procedures used in offloading and loading.
- 3) Tire pressure and tire coating will be inspected along with controls, including brakes, throttle, and clutch prior to off-loading. Tires should not have more than the recommended tire pressure.
- 4) All ramps must be fastened to trailers and designed with proper surface to provide traction. This is especially important in wet weather. The trailer must be equipped with a middle ramp if hauling tricycle tractor. Yard & Garden Tractors may be transported in the beds of Pick-up Trucks. Proper ramps to unload must be used attached to the truck wide and long enough to not cause safety concern in unloading and loading.
- 5) It is the responsibility of the operator to make sure that at least 10 ft. of area around the trailer is clear. Only approved personnel may be in this area.
- 6) Truck driver must off-load any projects that on the back of the trailer hauling the tractor prior to off-loading tractor.. Forklifts and other machinery will not come into the tractor unloading area unless directed by show official.
- **e. Aesthetics:** Overall appearance of tractor including workmanship and finish. Aesthetics will be evaluated for all tractor classes. Items to be considered include but are not limited to the following.
 - i. Sheet Metal and Fiber Glass body parts preparation prior to painting or waxing.
 - **ii.** Painting tractor, skid steer or yard & garden in the Reconditioning class is optional. Detailing is required even they are not painted.
 - iii. Reconditioned tractors, skid steers and yard & garden tractors that are not painted must have been pressure washed including engine compartment. Those that are not painted may be waxed.
 - iv. Painting and finish in Restored Classes. Clear coating is not recommended. The paint color should be same as original. See *Aesthetics, Authenticity & Safety Reference 3* on the website.
 - v. Detail and completeness of components cabs, steering wheels, seats, controls, and gages, wiring harness, hoses and belts, are considered.
- **f. Authenticity:** (Restoration Tractor classes only). Must be as original as possible. See *Aesthetics, Authenticity & Safety Reference 3* on website. Authenticity is **not** considered in Repair and Reconditioning Classes 1502 and 1503. Items considered in Authenticity:
 - i. Paint color, should be same as original. Some items may remain not painted aluminum parts such as magnetos, injector pumps. Other unpainted components belts, hoses, wiring harnesses (see instructions in *Aesthetics, Authenticity & Safety Reference 3 R18*
 - **ii.** Mechanical systems fuel, electrical, engine, transmission, final drive, PTO and 3 Point hitch, cooling, etc. should be restored to their original condition.
 - iii. Original Serial plates in place with unaltered serial numbers.
 - Note: Authenticity does not prevent updating or improving the efficiency and performance of a tractor for field work using manufactures upgrades. This applies especially for the later model tractors. Examples would be replacing the refrigerant R12 and equipment with 134A. Other examples include improved mechanical parts such as hardened valve seats, improved cylinders, rings, pistons, seals, and bearings. Alternators and other external parts should **not** replace generators, etc., on older tractors shown as antiques. Six-volt systems should **not** be converted to twelve volts.
- g. Diagnosis: (Recondition Classes 1502 and 1503) Diagnosis should be documented in Documentation & Research book especially when explaining the systems components in Photos. *Dealer Forms* identified in Documentation above require diagnosis. In later model tractors and skid steers error codes are generated on tractors instrument display. Teacher and/or Exhibitor may request the dealer's technician to help with this diagnosis in that school may not have the necessary diagnostic equipment or shop manuals.

h. Dealer Assistance A Tractor Advisory Council has been formed to help teachers contemplating entering projects in Reconditioning classes to locate a tractor dealer to cooperate with them. It is suggested that Advisory Council VP Jeff Spake (ispake@rdoequipment.com) 512-230–4413 or VP Michael Billings (mbilings@fisd.us) 210-912-6675 be contacted prior to visiting with a dealer. Either VP can help you contact a Tractor Corporate Representative who will assist you in communicating with an interested tractor dealer to work with you and your students in preparing and exhibiting a tractor, skid steer or yard & garden tractor. Teachers will want to use link to Advisory Councils Folder to access additional materials including TDCA Teacher - Dealer Cooperative Agreement for working with dealers.

It is hoped that this will help develop a connection with the dealer and eventually turn into an internship or employment for the student.

Dealers may perform warranty maintenance items on later model tractor in addition to repair. Some of these maintenance items are technical and require knowledge and skills to perform. Maintenance will help meet some of the Mechanical requirements to justify entering a tractor or skid steer in a Reconditioning Class.

- i. Complexity Factor: Up to 15 points may be added to reward exhibitor(s) for difficulty or sophistication of work conducted on tractor. Examples could be tractors that have AC units and Cabs, sophisticated transmissions, hydraulic, electrical systems. Work and research shown rebuilding or repairing original parts beyond the normal repair instead of purchasing new ones. Welding cast iron parts where preheating and post heating was necessary, building up a shaft and turning down on lath or hard surfacing or building up teeth on a gear are all examples. Evaluating tractor on a PTO dynamometer could be considered a Complexity Factor and is also a diagnostic function.
- 27. Additional Resources: In addition to working with Dealers and other professional mechanics, exhibitors and leaders are encouraged to get on the website and using a monthly code to access the ASABE technical library to download the Tractor and PTO standards. Although these standards apply to the later model tractors, they are relevant to early model tractors and machinery, for example hitch categories and PTO sizes and number of splines. Standards identify specifications that make different machines compatible with tractors, including early model tractors. It is important for the exhibitor to learn how to search technical libraries such as ASABE, print them out and interpret them. Service men working with the later model more sophisticated tractors and machines must rely on technical documents to diagnose and repair them. JAM website provides additional technical materials to help in our educational objective. Many of these have been identified in other Sections regarding tractors.

Skid Steers and most Yard & Garden tractors do not have three-point hitches and PTO shafts. Skid Steer specification regarding Quick Hitches (newer tractors also use Quick Hitch systems for front end loader attachments) and other specifications regarding skid steers are published in the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) literature. The Standard, SAE J2513 applies to Quick Hitch specifications similar to what ASABE does in 3-point hitch standards. The horsepower of Yard & Garden tractors is usually measured from the engine's flywheel and HP is designated Engine HP. Different manufacturers use various methods to measure engine HP on small engines. All engine HP ratings may not be equal.

SPECIAL RULES

Written Exam:

- 1. Entry Fee: The entry fee for each project is \$100.00. Entries must be submitted online and all official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo entry forms must be completed.
- 2. Eligible Entries: The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to CEAs, ASTs and CTE/STEM Directors in charge of 4-H Clubs, FFA programs or CTE/STEM programs the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Ag Mechanics Marketplace subject to these rules. Entries in the Ag Mechanics Marketplace Competition must be submitted in the name of the county 4-H club, FFA chapter or CTE/STEM program by the respective CEA or AST or CTE teacher. Contestants must be bona fide members of a Texas 4-H Club, Texas FFA Chapter or a student of a Texas high school. They must be enrolled in and attending public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at the time of the event.
- **3.** Number of Entries: Each club/chapter/CTE program may enter a maximum of one (1) project and may not be submitted by the same supervising individual for multiple clubs or programs.
- 4. Projects: Projects must have been constructed by FFA, 4-H or CTE members or students either as a part of their agricultural mechanics instruction in agricultural science, part of their supervised work experience program, or as part of CTE curriculum in a Texas high school. Projects must be designed and constructed under the direct supervision and guidance of the CEA/AST/CTE teacher. Projects made largely of wood will require at least 25% of a skill other than carpentry (example: metal fabrication with supplemental skills such as electrical, plumbing, hydraulics, etc) to be used in construction. The addition of metal ornaments or bands attached to wood project will not be considered a part of the 25%. All projects must be designed for outdoors no all wood projects or indoor furniture allowed).
- **5. Construction Date:** A project may be exhibited only one time at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo and must have been completed within one calendar year of the exhibition date.

- 6. Teams: The club/chapter/school members who design and construct the project may be different individuals than who represents the club/chapter/school in the Ag Mechanics Marketplace Competition. Other than the construction of the project, all team members must compete in all phases of the contest (Written Exam, Sales Presentation). Teams are comprised of two (2) or a maximum of four (4) students.
- 7. Market Value: All projects are required to sell (project ownership is transferred to the buyer) if the market value is met by a buyer through the Virtual Silent Auction or the Live Auction. The market value set by each team for a respective project may not be greater than \$6,000. If the market value is not met in the Virtual Silent Auction or the Live Auction, the project will be retained by the club/chapter/school and will follow appropriate check-out procedures. It is important to determine a reasonable market value. No matter what type of product sold, the price charged to customers or clients will have a direct effect on the success of the business. Though pricing strategies can be complex, the basic rules of pricing are straightforward:
 - All prices must cover costs and profits.
 - Assure price for product reflects the dynamics of cost, market demand, response to the competition, and profit objectives.
 - Prices must be established to assure sales.
- **8. Auction:** Twenty (20) teams will be selected to offer their project to sell in the Live Auction on Sunday afternoon. Auction proceeds will be paid directly to the club/chapter/school.
- **9. Exhibit Space:** Projects will be displayed at the discretion of show officials. Display space under shelter is not guaranteed.
- **10. Vehicles:** Trucks, tractors, trailers or other vehicles that are not entered to be exhibited are allowed in the exhibit area as part of the display with permission of the <u>Superintendent only</u>.
- 11. Loss or Damage: Every precaution will be taken to protect projects, however, neither the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo nor the show officials will be responsible for any loss or damage to projects.
- **12. Scholarship:** Refer to the Junior Ag Mechanics Show Scholarship section in the 2024 Competitive Events Premium List.

PROJECT - 50%

- 1. **Projects:** Projects should be marketable to a wide variety of customers including general rodeo patrons. Projects that are specialized for a limited number of uses may be challenging to market to the clientele base. Teams are encouraged to be innovative but maintain the marketability of the project.
- 2. **Project Divisions:** The following types of projects may be exhibited in the respective Project Divisions:
 - a. Livestock and Farm Equipment:

Includes items such as hay handling equipment (ex. hay spears, single/double bale hay trailers, bale pickup equipment, etc.), squeeze chutes, restraining equipment and crowding or working pens, and universal fit truck and ag equipment accessories (i.e.: tool box, storage, ATV rack, receiver hitch carrier, hitch & towing accessories, quick attach skid steer attachments). Some degree of metal fabrication is required. It is encouraged that items have the ability to be utilized on a wide variety of operations regardless of size or type. No all wood projects.

b. Trailers:

Incudes items such as utility bumper pull trailers (must be 16 ft. and under) **and towable** (wheels with lug bolts) **cooking equipment** (i.e.: BBQ pits, smokers and grills). Small trailers for hauling basic equipment such as lawnmowers, and material are encouraged. No all wood projects.

c. Wildlife:

Incudes items such as equipment used in managing wildlife and exotic game (i.e.: equipment used in the management, raising and caring for animals such as deer, turkeys, quail, fish, etc.). Items meeting the basic uses of a hunter or fisherman are encouraged. No all wood projects.

- d. Home Recreation and Conveniences:
 - Includes items such as non-towable (small) cooking devices (i.e.: BBQ pits, grills, fire pits, and fish fryers. Pits made from metal drums not allowed) and outdoor yard and garden equipment (i.e.: outdoor tables [cannot be all wood], swings, planters, green houses, potting sheds and other buildings. Projects made of wood must include, in addition to carpentry, significant metal or other technical skill such as plumbing, masonry and/or electrical. All projects must be designed for outdoors no all wood projects or indoor furniture allowed).
- 3. Project Quality and Classification: Show management reserves the right to remove any project from participating if the quality, safety, or design of the project does not meet the standards set for this competition. A general evaluation of each project will be conducted prior to the start of competition. Projects which fail to be evaluated prior to the start of competition will be subject to disqualification. Show management reserves the right to classify a project into the appropriate Project Division at their discretion.
- **4. Project Completeness:** All projects must be complete including finish. Any item necessary for use of the project must be a part of the project (example: hinges and latches on gates and panels).

Note: At least one team member is highly encouraged to be available to answer questions from the public or show officials including judges at all times. As well, teams are highly encouraged to have proper materials to market their project to any patrons or show officials at all times.

5. Project Safety:

- **a. Display:** Appropriate and safe display stands must be provided for gates, panels, and other projects requiring support. Sharp edges and points must be padded and/or protected where necessary to prevent possible injury to spectators and exhibitors.
- **b.** General Safety: Flammable and/or combustible liquids shall not be stored or sprayed in buildings, or on the show grounds. This shall include, but not limited to enamel paints, thinners, reducers, or gasoline. All compressed gas cylinders must be properly secured. Protective caps installed. NO regulators or hoses are to be installed. Electric extension cords must not cross aisles used as exit ways.
- **c. Projects with Engines:** No more than two gallons of fuel in any fuel tank is allowed. The fuel tank cap must be in place. All batteries must be disconnected.

- 6. Transportation Statutes: All trailers and other equipment that will be operated and/or transported on public roads must be equipped with safety equipment specified in Title 7, Vehicles and Traffic Transportation Code of the Texas Statues. Such projects should be outfitted with VIN number to allow the exchange of ownership to the respective buyer. No Agriculture Exemptions except farm tags are allowed. See www.sarodeo.com for JAM Trailer Rules and Codes. All trailers and tongue equipment pulled on highways will be pre-inspected at the Salado Creek Staging Area.
 - **a.** Trailer wiring, lights and brakes will be tested. Colors of conductors in the wiring harness should meet industry standards. See *Trailer Construction Guide* at www.sarodeo.com. Trailer must be grounded to vehicle with grounding wire in harness. (Trailer grounding only through hitch is not acceptable.)
 - **b.** All trailers that are pulled to the show must have a license plate and be ready to exchange ownership to the respective buyer. May use Farm Tag.
 - **c.** All tongue equipment that is pulled on a public highway (i.e.: trailers, etc. will be inspected at Salado Creek Staging Area for approved <u>safety chains</u>, <u>lights</u> and <u>reflectors</u>).
 - **d.** All trailers rated 4500 pounds GWR or greater must have approved brakes, safety chains and brake-away equipment. See *Trailer Check Sheets and Construction Guide*.
 - e. All trailers must be equipped with lift jacks for hitching and unhitching including goosenecks and tongue.
 - f. Four inch fender clearance above tire of 4 inches is required with exceptions for single axle trailers.
 - g. Any trailer that is over wide (102 inches) must have a signed permit. Permit to include dates week prior to and week after show. Trailer widths will be measured at the widest point on the trailer. Review *Trailer Statutes* document and the *Trailer Construction Guide* at www.sarodeo.com for major codes and rules. It is the exhibitors' responsibility to have reviewed and understand all TxDOT and Federal Codes.
- 7. ASABE Standards: All three-point hitch and/or PTO operated equipment must meet the latest ASABE (The Society for Engineering in Agricultural, Food, and Biological Systems) standards. Both standards have been revised in the past three years. Must have the ASABE approved code and monthly password to access and print documents from the ASABE Technical Library. Instructions to access ASABE Standards along with monthly codes can be found at www.sarodeo.com. Power take-off equipment must meet ASABE standard, Rear mounted power take-off types 1,2 and 3 -Narrow-track tractors, dimensions for master shield and clearance zone. This Standard was revised in 2011. When searching the ASABE to find and download a PDF file enter in Document number 500.
- **8. Projects Needing Offloading Assistance:** Projects that must be hoisted from the top-side are to be fitted with lifting eyes at balance points that will accommodate one inch shackles. Projects that show officials conclude cannot be safely off-loaded with equipment available may be not be allowed to participate.

TEAM SALES PRESENTATION – 25%

- 1. The Product Summary and Marketing Materials will be used in the team sales presentation to "sell" the project entered by each team to a panel of judges.
- 2. The judges will act as a real customer which may include not buying the project. Participants will have to establish rapport with the judge and ask probing questions to ensure they meet the judges' needs.
- 3. The judges will utilize the Product Summary to prepare for the presentation conversation.
- 4. Teams may only use the following items during the team sales presentation: the team, the project, Product Summary and Marketing Flyer. No slide shows, electronic presentations, videos, computer demonstrations, etc. may be used during the team sales presentation, these items may be part of the display in the Marketplace, but cannot be used, and will not be considered, during the team sales presentation.
- **5.** Teams will have seven (7) minutes to interact with the judge. All members of the team must be present and all must participate.
- **6.** Teams should present themselves with a professional appearance.
- 7. Teamwork and involvement of team members will be judged during this event.
- **8.** Teams should plan to accomplish the following tasks during the sales presentation:
 - **a.** Introduce themselves to the customer in the opening of the presentation.
 - **b.** Introduce the product to the customer.
 - **c.** Point out the features of the product.
 - d. Explain how the product would benefit the customer. Ask for the customers' reaction to the product.
 - **e.** The customer will object to some element of the sales presentation. Teams should try to overcome the objection (price, size, color, etc.) with a positive solution to the customers' objections.
 - **f.** The customers will also give the teams a chance to close the sale during the presentation. Ask for the business and be prepared to finalize the order.
- **9.** Teams should include the following in their presentation:

Indicator	Skills
First Impression	Team identifies themselves with a good first impression, creates customer attention.
Sales Approach	Team asks questions and utilizes information from answers in an attempt to build a personal rapport. Teams asks questions to learn about the customers' interests.
Needs and Wants	Team confirmed and discovered customer needs and wants.
Demonstration	Team applied features and benefits of their product to the customers' needs/wants to their product features.
Trial Close	Team uses appropriate sales technique to confirm customer interest and/or identify buying signals.

Objections	Teams listens and clarifies customers' objections. Team applies and discusses the features/benefits of the product to address the customers' objections.
Close or Advance Sale	Team closes or attempts to close the sale.
Active Listening	Team actively listens to comments and answers from the customer throughout the presentation.
Teamwork	How well did each team member participate/communicate in the presentation?

Professionalism	Was the presentation delivered professionally?

- 1. Product Summary (15 pts): Each team will develop a product summary to be submitted via email to livestock@sarodeo.com by February 1, 2024. The email should be titled Ag Mechanics Marketplace-Club/Chapter/School Name. The team will receive a confirmation email upon receipt. The product summary should include: If the project summary is not submitted by February 1, 2024, the team will receive no points for this section. An example of the Product Summary will be posted at www.sarodeo.com.
 - a. Club/Chapter/School Name
 - **b.** Product to be sold
 - c. Statement of marketing situation
 - i. Who is the customer?
 - ii. Why would the customer want the product?
 - iii. Who are the major competitors selling a similar product?
 - **d.** Features of the product
 - **e.** Benefits of the product for the customer
 - f. Market Value (This will also be used as the minimum bid for the respective project)
 - i. All projects are required to sell (project ownership is transferred to the buyer) if the market value is met by a buyer through the Virtual Silent Auction or the Live Auction. The market value set by each team for a respective project may not be greater than \$6,000. If the market value is not met in the sealed bid process or the Live Auction, the project will be retained by the club/chapter/school and will follow appropriate check-out procedures. It is important to determine a reasonable market value. A bill of materials and comparative pricing may be helpful in justifying a reasonable market value. No matter what type of product sold, the price charged to customers or clients will have a direct effect on the success of the business. Though pricing strategies can be complex, the basic rules of pricing are straightforward:
 - 1. All prices must cover costs and profits.
 - 2. Assure price for product reflects the dynamics of cost, market demand, response to the competition, and profit objectives.
 - **3.** Prices must be established to assure sales.
 - **g.** Product Specifications (Weight, size dimensions, electrical specifications, weight ratings, maintenance requirements, etc.)

- h. As a supplement to the Product Summary the team should include at least three and up to five photographs or representative images (computerized renderings are acceptable) of the completed product, these photos should be high quality (3200 x 2400 resolution) and will be used for promotion of the project. The photos should be sent in the same email, but as a separate attachment.
- **2. Marketing Flyer (15 pts):** Each team will develop an 8.5" by 11" one or two-sided flyer promoting and detailing the product. Flyer should be designed to be utilized as an advertisement for and an overview of the product to be shared with customers. An example of the Marketing Flyer will be posted at www.sarodeo.com.

The Marketing Flyer will be turned in at upon arrival at check-in and teams should supply judges (up to 5) with a copy during the Sales Presentation.

AUCTION

- 1. The top 5 high scoring projects in each Project Division (Livestock and Farm Equipment, Trailers, Wildlife, Home Recreation and Conveniences) will be eligible for the Live Auction.
- 2. Show Management reserves the right to include additional high scoring projects in the auction at the discretion of the judges.
- **3.** If a division has less than 5 eligible projects to sale, Show Management reserves the right to include additional high scoring projects from a different division in the auction at the discretion of the judges.
- 4. All qualified projects will participate in the Virtual Silent Auction. If project is not selected for the Live Auction, the highest bidder through the Silent Auction is the winning bid <u>if the Market Value is met</u>. If the project is selected for the Live Auction, be advised that the Virtual Silent Auction highest bid may not be the winning bid as bids will reopen during the Live Auction.
- **5.** Silent Auction bids for projects eligible for the Live Auction will close at 6:00 PM on Saturday, February 24, 2024. The highest bid will carry forward to the Live Auction.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout.
- 2. Eligibility: Contestants must meet all Junior Show Rule Requirements. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to CEAs, ASTs and CTE/STEM Directors in charge of 4-H Clubs, FFA programs or High School CTE/STEM Programs, respectively, the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Agricultural Public Speaking Contest, subject to these rules. The Agricultural Public Speaking Contest is also an invitational contest to statewide CTE/STEM programs. Entries must be approved through the entry system by the exhibitors' respective CEA or AST or CTE/STEM director. Contestants must be bona fide members of a Texas 4-H Club, Texas FFA Chapter or a student of a Texas high school. They must be enrolled in and attending public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at the time of the event.
- 3. Age Divisions: The contest will be divided into two age divisions. Age as of August 31, 2023.
 - a. Junior (Individual Competition) Ages 8-13
 - b. Senior (Individual Competition) Ages 14-18
- 4. Contest Format: The event will be held in the following contest format:
 - a. Juniors: Contestants will be randomly assigned a speaking room and order on the day of the contest. Contestants MUST compete in their assigned speaking room. Speeches in the Junior Division must fit within one of the designated categories (see below) but will not be judged by category (i.e.: Animal Science). The top two Junior contestants in each speaking room will advance to the finals to compete for Overall Junior Age winner.
 - b. Seniors: Contestants will be randomly assigned a speaking room and order based on the category entered. Contestants MUST compete in their assigned speaking room. Speeches in the Senior Division must fit within one of the designated categories (see below) and will be judged by category (i.e.: Agricultural Policy/Agribusiness, Animal Science, Horticulture/Landscape/Natural Resources, Western Heritage/ Ag Advocacy). Show Management reserves the right to break categories into multiple speaking rooms as necessary. In those cases, the top two contestants in each speaking room will advance to the category finals. Top placing contestants within each category will not compete for an Overall Senior Age winner.
- 5. **Documentation:** ALL completed documentation (see below) must be submitted together as <u>one pdf document</u> to <u>www.sarodeo.com</u> form by January 10, 2024. The following information will be required, "Ag Public Speaking Exhibitor Name Club/Chapter." Contestants who fail to submit a copy of the required documentation by this deadline are subject to a penalty against their Total Score or disqualification.

- **a.** Abstract and Literature Cited Submission Page: A summary of the speech in 200-300 words. Minimum of 5 references and must be listed as Literature Cited using APA format.
- b. Statement of Originality: Signed by the contestant, parent/guardian, and AST/CEA.
- **c.** If a contestant chooses to not follow the documentation guidelines outlined, point deductions will be taken at the discretion of the Judges.
- **6. Manuscript:** While manuscripts are not required to be officially submitted, contestants must have a typewritten copy available on contest day to provide Show Management if requested.
- 7. **Dress Attire:** Business attire or official 4-H/FFA attire is recommended.
- **8. Time:** Junior & Senior Age Group: Each speech shall be a minimum of six minutes in length and a maximum of eight minutes. Time point deductions will apply as follows:
 - a. Under six minutes one point per ten seconds
 - **b.** Over eight minutes one point per ten seconds
- **9. Question/Answer Period:** For Finals contestants only: A three-minute question/answer period will follow each speech. At the end of three minutes, all questioning will end.
- 10. Props: The use of props of any kind is prohibited. Violation will result in disqualification.
- 11. Speech Categories: Each contestant may enter their speech in only one category (see below). Speech category must be declared on the Statement of Originality form. Speech category may be changed for no charge up to January 10, 2024. After January 10, there will be a charge of an additional entry fee (\$25) to change speech category. There are subject matters which may be appropriate in more than one category; final determination of all speeches will be at the discretion of Show Management and/or Judges.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout. Contestants are limited to one individual entry. Team entries are not allowed.
- 2. Eligibility: Contestants must meet all Junior Show Rule Requirements. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to CEAs, ASTs and CTE/STEM Directors in charge of 4-H Clubs, FFA programs or High School CTE/STEM Programs, respectively, the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Agricultural Science Fair, subject to these rules. The Agricultural Science Fair is also an invitational contest to statewide CTE/STEM programs. Entries must be approved through the entry system by the exhibitors' respective CEA or AST or CTE/STEM director. Contestants must be bona fide members of a Texas 4-H Club, Texas FFA Chapter or a student of a Texas high school. They must be enrolled in and attending public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at the time of the event.
- 3. Age Groups: All contestants will compete in one division.
- **4. Projects:** A project may be exhibited only one time at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo and must have been researched and developed within one calendar year of the exhibition date.
- **5. Divisions:** There are four divisions in which a contestant may enter.
 - **a. Animal Systems:** The study of animal systems, including life processes, health, nutrition, genetics, management and processing, through the study of small animals, aquaculture, livestock, dairy, horses and/or poultry. *Examples:*
 - Compare nutrient levels on animal growth
 - Research new disease control mechanisms
 - Effects of estrous synchronization on ovulation
 - Compare effects of thawing temperatures on livestock semen
 - Effects of growth hormone on meat/milk production
 - b. Power/Tech/Environmental Systems: The study of systems, instruments and technology used in waste management; the study of the management of soil, water, wildlife, forests and air as natural resources and their influence on the environment. The study of agricultural equipment, power systems, alternative fuel sources and precision technology, as well as woodworking, metalworking, welding and project planning for agricultural structures.

Examples:

- Effect of agricultural chemicals on water quality
- Effects of cropping practices on wildlife populations
- Compare water movements through different soil types
- Develop alternate energy source engines
- Create minimum energy use structures
- Compare properties of various alternative insulation products

- Investigation of light/wind/water energy sources
- c. Food Systems/Plant Systems: The study of product development, quality assurance, food safety, production, sales and service, regulation and compliance and food service within the food science industry. The study of plant life cycles, classifications, functions, structures, reproduction, media and nutrients, as well as growth and cultural practices, through the study of crops, turf grass, trees and shrubs and/or ornamental plants. Examples:
 - Effects of packaging techniques on food spoilage rates
 - Resistance of organic fruits to common diseases
 - Determining chemical energy stored in foods
 - Control of molds on bakery products
 - Determine rates of transpiration in plants
 - Effects of heavy metals such as cadmium on edible plants
 - Compare GMO and conventional seed/plant growth under various conditions
 - Effects of lunar climate and soil condition on plant growth
 - Compare plant growth of hydroponics and conventional methods
- **d. Ag Sociology:** The study of human behavior and the interaction of individuals in and to society, including agricultural education, agribusiness economic, agricultural communication, agricultural leadership and other social science applications in agriculture, food and natural resources. *Examples:*
 - Investigate perceptions of community members towards alternative agricultural practices
 - Determine the impact of local/state/national safety programs upon accident rates in agricultural/natural resource occupations
 - Comparison of profitability of various agricultural/natural resource practices
 - Investigate the impact of significant historical figures on a local community
 - Determine the economic effects of local/state/national legislation impacting agricultural/natural resources
- **6. Judging:** Judging is based on the criteria set forth for the State FFA Science Fair Judges Written Paper Scoresheet and Interview Scoresheet. Please refer to the Judge's Score Sheets. At the conclusion of Registration, the Superintendent will announce if a finals round will be necessary for any categories.
- 7. **Documentation:** Contestants must submit the following information electronically to www.judgingcard.com no later than January 10, 2024. **These forms can be located at www.judgingcard.com under SALE AgriScience Fair (February).**
 - a. Abstract
 - b. Manuscript (Maximum Page Length = 12 pages)
- **8. Electronics:** Participants will not be allowed to utilize personal electronic communication devices during the entire course of the event (Examples include iPads, tablets, computers, cell phones, Wi-Fi devices, etc.).
- 9. Contest Format:
 - **a.** Contestants must be present at their booths during judging to explain their research/science project to the public and judges to answer any questions.
 - **b.** Contestants will have a maximum of 10 minutes to present their project. This time should include approximately 3 to 5 minutes for student presentation, and 5 to 7 minutes for judges' questions.
 - c. Exhibited projects and project reports shall be the result of the contestant's own efforts. The official maximum size for a display is 48" wide by 30" deep (the distance from front to back) by 36" high (from table to top of display). Failure to meet these requirements will result in disqualification. Please note that the width of tables may vary but are generally 24" wide.
 - d. All projects must have the following information attached to the upper right-hand corner of the exhibit:
 - i. Name of student
 - ii. Chapter/club name and location (city)
 - iii. Title of category entered
 - iv. Division of category entered
 - e. Contestants must provide all supplies, including backing, to mount poster board.
 - f. Contestants must provide their own extension cords and tape to safely secure cords and prevent tripping.
 - **g.** There will be limited electrical supply provided by the show. Equipment should have an internal power supply for demonstrations.
- 10. Scholarships: Refer to the Junior Livestock Scholarship section of the 2024 Competitive Events Premium List.

CONTEST DESCRIPTION

This is a challenge-based contest. A pre-determined set of known challenges will be released September 1st prior to the contest, and the remaining on contest day. Teams must build and program their robot for known challenges prior to the contest. On contest day, the remaining unknown challenges will be revealed, and teams will be given time to build and program the robot to account for the unknown challenges. Known challenges and study resources are posted at https://texas4-h.tamu.edu/projects/robotics/.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters/Schools may submit a check if selected at entry checkout. There is no limit on the number of team entries entered per club/chapter, but a contestant may only participate on one team. However, due to time and facility restraints, entries may be selected by random drawing. If an entry is not selected, entry fees for the respective entry will be refunded.
- 2. Eligibility: Contestants must meet all Junior Show Rule Requirements. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to CEAs, ASTs and CTE/STEM Directors in charge of 4-H Clubs, FFA programs or High School CTE/STEM Programs, respectively, the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Agrobotics Challenge, subject to these rules. The Agrobotics Challenge is also an invitational contest to statewide CTE/STEM programs. Entries in the Agrobotics Challenge must be submitted in the name of the county 4-H club, FFA chapter or high school by the respective CEA or AST or CTE/STEM director. Contestants must be bona fide members of a Texas 4-H Club, Texas FFA Chapter or a student of a Texas high school. They must be enrolled in and attending public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at the time of the event.
- **3. Teams:** Each team will consist of at least three (3) and no more than four (4) members. Team may not include members from different age divisions. Team members may only compete on one team.
- 4. Age Divisions: The contest is divided into two (2) divisions (Age as of August 31, 2023):
 - i. Junior (Team Competition) Ages 8-13
 - ii. Senior (Team Competition) Ages 14-18
- **5. Participants with Disabilities:** Any competitor who requires auxiliary aids or special accommodations must contact the Livestock Office at least two weeks before the competition.

- 6. Registration Forms: Team registration forms are available here. Coaches are encouraged to bring completed forms to the registration table the day of the respective contest in order to expedite registration.
- 7. Minimum Construction Skills and Proficiency: Competitors must be capable of designing and building a functioning Lego® Mindstorm® robot that includes the use of:
 - Motors
 - Light/color sensor
 - Touch sensor
 - Ultrasonic sensor
 - Levers, arms, claws, etc.
 - Incorporating non-Lego® parts into robot design and/or function
- 8. Minimum Programming Skills and Proficiency: Competitors must be capable of programming a Lego® Mindstorm® robot in order for the robot to:
 - Move
 - Turn
 - Lift
 - Maneuver attachments effectively
 - Use sensors appropriately and effectively
- 9. Agriculture: The challenge will include various components focused on agricultural industry knowledge. This will include but is not limited to the basics of livestock breeds and crop production. Students should be familiar with basic agricultural concepts.

10. Equipment: Each team must supply their own equipment for the challenge. Each team may only bring the supplies listed in the table below. Equipment will be checked by contest officials as teams check in for the contest. Any extra equipment or item that does not meet specifications will be returned to the team coach. No infrared beacons (remote) or sensors allowed.

- a) All Lego® Mindstorm pieces must be in their original factory condition.
- **b)** No 3D printed pieces are allowed.
- c) Teams may use any software that facilitates autonomous movement of the robot, so long as the robot is solely controlled by the programs stored on the HUB or microSD card.
- d) No remote controllers of any type are allowed.
- e) No computers or tablets may be brought up to the game tables during any matches. It can be during build time.
- f) Note paper may only be used for note-taking purposes only. Teams may bring notes to the game table during matches. The paper is not allowed to be used for any other purpose (used on the robot for example).
- g) Teams are not allowed to bring their own game mat and/or pieces.
- 11. Scoring: Point values for each separate challenge may vary, depending on the level of challenge difficulty. Penalties will also depend upon challenge design, but examples may include: knocking over pieces, restricted human interaction with robot or game pieces, excessive retrievals, etc. Points will be awarded or deducted for each round of match play. Additionally, a teamwork score will be assessed by a panel of judges and added to the match scores to form the preliminary team score. The preliminary team score determines qualifiers for finals. After each match, the team captain will initial the score sheet, indicating agreement to the points awarded. Once signed, the match score is final and cannot be challenged. The contest tabulator will review the score sheet and will correct any mathematical inaccuracies.
- 12. Bluetooth and Internet Connectivity: Bluetooth connections can be made and utilized during the Build Time. It is not allowed during the competition phase while the robot is on the playing field. No internet connectivity will be provided. Teams are advised to make sure their computer's operating system, software, and robot firmware are up to date prior to the contest.

13. Match Setup and Inspection:

- a) Before the match begins, the robot and all its attachments must be placed and fit into the boundary of the Player Zone for inspection by a contest official.
- **b)** The Player Zone is 11"x17"x12" (length/width/height).
- c) To pass inspection, the robot and ALL attachments may not break the plane of the Player Zone boundary nor be taller than 12 inches from the surface of the game mat.
- **d)** Once the official inspects and approves the size of the robot, team members may set up their robot to prepare for the match.
- **e)** At all times during the match, the robot (including attachments) must not exceed the 11"x17"x12" (length/width/height).
- f) No game pieces found in the Resource Tray may be touched until the match begins. The tray may not be used by the robot nor placed on the game table for any reason.
- **g)** Contest officials reserve the right to remeasure the robot after a match. Any robot deemed to exceed the dimensions will forfeit the match.

TIP: Build designs that use fewer parts can not only save you space for maneuvering but may also save you time and present fewer mechanical/programming problems.

14. Rules of Play:

- a) The robot must be programmed to perform all challenges autonomously.
- All parts of the robot, attachments, and game pieces must **completely fit** within the Player Zone <u>each</u> time the robot is launched from the Player Zone.
- c) Teams must pre-build and program a robot prior to the competition.
- d) Teams will report to the designated location and time for check-in and submit their robot and additional pieces/equipment for initial inspection.
- e) After check-in, each team will be directed to a team pit (table and chairs) where they can work on their robot and programming. In some cases, teams may have to share a table with another team.
- f) S.A.L.E. will not have power available. Teams are encouraged to bring a portable battery powered AC power station.
- **g)** An orientation will be provided for all participants where superintendents will review the challenges, rules and scoring.

- h) After orientation, each team will have 90 minutes of Build Time for additional designing, building, programming and testing of their robot.
- i) Teams will practice and compete on the same game table.
- j) In the case where a team has to move tables (example: for finals), teams will be given a designated amount of time to practice on the new table.
- **k)** If time permits, teams are allowed to make alterations to their robot design and/or program between matches.
- 1) When match play begins, teams must report immediately to the game table when called. The robot must be powered up and ready for inspection when they arrive at the game table. Failure to report to the game table in a timely manner may result in the team forfeiting the match.
- **m)** Contestants may retrieve their robot at any time during the match without penalty. When retrieved, the robot must be returned to the PLAYER ZONE.
- n) Contest officials will not assist with any retrievals.
- o) When the contestant is retrieving the robot, he/she may do so any time during the match in order to start/re-attempt challenges, but must not manipulate, interfere, or intercept game pieces on the board during retrieval *unless game piece is in robot's possession see Rules of Play #15-18. If contestants physically alter where game pieces sit or land on the game board during retrieval, they may be subject to penalties or disqualification from the match.
- p) <u>Possession</u> is defined as a game piece that is not touching the playing surface and is under the control of the robot. Items in possession of a robot may be retrieved once any part/piece of the robot has broken the plane of the PLAYER ZONE boundary.
- **q)** If the robot is in possession of a game piece in the GAME ZONE, and the robot is retrieved by the player, the game official will return the game piece(s) to its original location/state.
- r) A robot that has possession of a game piece may be retrieved during the match. A robot that loses possession of a game piece during the match (ie robot drops piece outside of the player zone) the piece can no longer be retrieved by contestants.
- s) A player is not allowed to touch any game piece except when the piece is completely inside the PLAYER ZONE boundary, <u>OR</u> if the robot is deemed in the PLAYER ZONE <u>AND</u> in full possession of a game piece(s). Once the piece is deemed inside the PLAYER ZONE, contestants may remove the game piece from the game table/robot and store it in the RESOURCE TRAY.
- t) If a contestant intentionally touches a game piece in the GAME ZONE, the team will be given a 100-point penalty per occurrence. In such cases, the piece will be returned to its original starting position by contest officials as quickly as possible.
- u) All competing team members are allowed around the game table during competition, and any member may touch the robot when necessary.
- v) Teams not competing must remain at their tables or staging area.
- w) Good sportsmanship is always expected. This is crucial during practice times. Practice time on the game table may be limited as build time progresses.
- **x)** Only registered contestants and designated contest officials will be allowed in the robot Challenge pit areas.
- y) Due to space limitations, parents and other spectators must remain outside the designated contest
- **z)** Spectators will be allowed to enter the contest area during finals.
- aa) Teams that experience equipment malfunction(s) may not replace the equipment with supplies outside the contest area (from leaders, volunteers, CEA, AST, or contest officials). Instead, team members must work together and be creative in completing preparations without the malfunctioning/missing equipment or visit with other teams to borrow the needed part.
- bb) Depending on the challenges, contest officials may allow or require teams to use non-lego items in the design of the robot. In such cases, details will be outlined in the game release and/or orientation.
- cc) Coaches will be permitted to meet with their team for a 10-minute time period prior to build time and following orientation. This time should be used to help team members develop a plan and foster positive youth development.
- **dd)** No cell phones or other types of communication devices are allowed in the pit or contest areas. Exceptions include medical devices.
- **ee)** During Build Time and Match Play, contestants are not allowed to communicate with anyone outside of the contest (coaches, parents, siblings, etc.). Exceptions include medical emergencies. Contestants are welcome to ask questions to contest officials or other contestants.

- ff) A match will be 3 minutes in length. The official timekeeper and announcer will have a countdown to start and stop. Any activities performed by the robot after time has been called will not count for points.
- **gg)** Teams will have two preliminary matches in which to earn points. The sum score of the two matches plus the teamwork score will determine teams that qualify for the finals. The top 3 teams in each age division will advance to the final match. If there are fewer than 3 teams in an age division, no finals will take place. The total score from the preliminary matches (match + teamwork scores) will be used for preliminary placings.
- **hh)** Finals will consist of two additional matches. The two match scores from the final round will be added to the total preliminary score. Finalist teams will be ranked based on their total scores. Judges' results are final.
- ii) Any structures built by the team or game pieces cannot be placed onto the ROBOT ZONE by human players but may be permitted to be placed by the robot so long as it is done autonomously and is permitted by challenge rules.
- jj) Tie-breaker procedures/order will be as follows:
 - i. Highest total teamwork score
 - ii. Highest total preliminary match scores (does not include teamwork)
 - iii. Highest individual preliminary match score
 - iv. Contest officials will determine additional measures if a tie persists.
- **kk)** Any contestant, coach, or spectator that becomes disruptive or does not exhibit sportsmanship, may be removed from the contest area at the sole discretion of contest officials and/or show (host) management.
- II) Teams must clean up their pit areas prior to the awards ceremony. Teams not making it to the Finals are free to leave once their pit area has been cleaned and are dismissed by contest officials.
- **mm)** Final rankings will be shared with the contest host for them to post or distribute following the contest.
- **15. Awards**: Placings awards will be determined by the committee and are based on sponsorships. Special awards may also be given based on sponsorships and committee decision. The contest results, as announced, will be final.
- **16. Scholarships**: Refer to the Junior Livestock Show Scholarship section of the 2024 Competitive Events Premium List.

- 1. Contestants must be at least 12 years of age but younger than 18 years of age on January 1, 2024. Contestants also must be enrolled in school in a grade below 12th grade. FFA and 4-H members must reside in the State of Texas and be active members of an FFA Chapter or 4-H Club.
- 2. All contestants must have a personal Social Security Number to be eligible to participate in the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.
- **3.** No contestant will be permitted to compete in more than one scramble performance per year (finals excluded). Contestants may apply through 4-H or FFA, but not both.
- **4.** A contestant may be awarded no more than one (1) San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Calf Scramble Purchase Certificate during his or her FFA or 4-H career.
- 5. If a contestant accepts anything of value or any monetary award, in full or in part, in relation to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Calf Scramble, he or she will be ineligible for future San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Calf Scramble events.
- **6.** There will be 16 performances during the 2024 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, plus a Finals. Twenty-four contestants and 12 calves will be selected for each performance. Contestants and calves will be placed in the arena as determined by S.A.L.E. officials.
- 7. There will be one Finals Performance on Friday, February 23, 2024. Twenty-four contestants and 12 calves will be selected and placed in the arena as determined by S.A.L.E. officials.
- 8. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo will not be responsible for any injury to any contestant before, during, or after the Calf Scramble.
- Calf Scramble applicants should be aware of the time and financial commitment involved in raising a livestock project.

CONTESTANT SELECTION

- 1. Contestants must be approved by their AST or CEA.
- 2. The **Online Calf Scramble Entry** will be submitted through the online entry system from November 1 to December 1, 2023.

3. Selection:

- **a.** Entries must be submitted online via the online entry system found at sarodeo.com. There is no limit on the number of applicants entered per club/chapter.
- **b.** All applicants will rank the performances in the order in which they are available to participate.
- **c.** Scrambler positions will be assigned based on the availability of First Preferred Date applicants. Any additional openings for scrambler or alternate positions will then be filled by other applicants based on their availability for that performance.
- **d.** Contestants will be notified of their acceptance through their AST, CEA and/or parent.
- e. A confirmation along with Release and Indemnification Agreement along with the Medical Questionnaire must be submitted following notification of Scramble Date. NOTE: If confirmation has not been received and Release and Indemnification Agreement and Medical Questionnaire is not postmarked on or before December 30, 2023, your position will be made available to the next alternate.
- **f.** All appropriate credentials to enter the S.A.L.E. grounds, rodeo ticket purchase information, maps and any other correspondence will be sent directly to the AST/CEA.

- **Substitutions at Rodeo:** In a special circumstance, if a contestant is unable to scramble for any reason during their assigned performance, an alternate will be assigned by the Calf Scramble Office. Contestants may not designate substitute contestants.
- 5. Medical: Contestants receiving medical attention 30 days prior to scramble date MUST provide a doctor's release at check-in. Contestants will not be allowed to scramble if these requirements are not met.
- 6. Incomplete forms will **NOT** be returned. If incomplete forms are sent to the Calf Scramble Office, or brought to registration, the contestant will be replaced by an alternate.
- The University Interscholastic League State Executive Committee, in cooperation with the State Board of Vocational Education, has formulated a plan to permit Calf Scrambles and still protect the participant's amateur standing. This is accomplished by placing the whole matter under the supervision of the Agricultural Science Department of the participating school and the AST. Participants are prohibited from receiving anything of cash value for winning the athletic portion of the program.
 - **a.** A contestant shall not receive rewards of any kind for participating in a Calf Scramble.
 - b. Special awards may be given for these animals when they are exhibited in competition with other animals. All awards and other money derived from the sale of the animal will belong to the contestants as a reward for their labor, feed, veterinary, insurance and other costs after the year's project has been completed and the animal is shown at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.
 - Title to an animal received in a Calf Scramble shall not pass to the participant catching the calf until the participant has demonstrated under competent supervision their interest in caring for the animal and their ability to follow appropriate instructions in feeding, grooming and showing said animal. The animal must be returned for exhibit at the next Show, unless circumstances approved by the Livestock Show Management, sponsor and supervisor make this impractical. Example: The animal may turn out to be unsuitable for the project due to deformity, disease, or other unforeseen reasons.
 - d. Animals received in a Calf Scramble cannot be sold, traded or disposed of until the participant receives title to the animal. Under no circumstances will a "For Sale" sign be displayed while an animal is being exhibited at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.
 - e. Payments will only be made to the seller of the animal. No payments will be issued directly to a winner or member of the winner's family. Students, parents, or supervisors will not be issued payments for reimbursements.
- 8. Mailing Instructions: You must complete the following documents and postmark them on or before December 30, 2023.

ARENA RULES

- 1. Contestants will carry a halter with an attached lead rope supplied by S.A.L.E. into the arena. Neither the halter nor the rope may be used as a lariat contestants may not use the halter or lead rope to catch the calf. The animal must be caught by hand. Then, the halter must be placed on the animal as instructed in the Calf Scramble Orientation.
- 2. Contestants must wear appropriate clothing (jeans, S.A.L.E. supplied t-shirt). No oversized/baggy jeans, yoga pants, sweatpants, overalls, dresses, skirts, flip flops, halter tops, etc., will be allowed. Appropriate athletic shoes are highly recommended for footwear. Shoes with steel cleats are not allowed. While boots are allowed, they are discouraged because they are difficult to run in. Each contestant will be issued a numbered T-Shirt to wear in the arena.
- **3.** Contestants may not work as a "team" they may not provide assistance to other contestants, and they may not receive assistance from contestants or judges. Each contestant catching a calf is required to lead the calf across the finish line without assistance. After placing the halter on the calf, the contestants will not be permitted to fasten the lead rope to them in any manner.
- 4. If a contestant has hold of a calf by any means, to include by the tail, ear, hoof, etc., that contestant will be given an appropriate amount of time to halter the animal. Other contestants are instructed to find another calf. If said calf breaks away, it is available to be caught again (unless it has been properly scored). If two or more contestants catch a calf at the same time, the contestant closest to the head will be given an appropriate amount of time to halter the animal.
- 5. If a calf is caught by the tail, the contestant will be allowed an appropriate amount of time to place the halter on the calf. If the contestant fails to halter the calf in an appropriate amount of time, he/she must release the calf. The judges will make the determination and provide instruction to the contestant.
- 6. Poor sportsmanship will automatically disqualify the contestant. Undue roughness will not be tolerated, whether towards other participants or to the calves. Contestants may not slap, punch, kick or otherwise strike or treat the calves in any manner that would be construed as abusive. If a haltered calf lays down, contestants may not drag or strike the calf as previously described. In this case, direction will be given to the contestant in the arena as to how to proceed.
- 7. Scoring: Two official scorers will be positioned at the front edge of the scoring box, approximately 12 feet apart, and will face the bucking chutes. The scoring line will be the imaginary line established between the two scorers. A contestant and calf will be scored and recorded by the scorers when:
 - **a.** the calf is properly haltered as instructed during the orientation.
 - b. the head of the calf crosses the plane of the imaginary line between the two scorers: and
 - **c.** both scorers agree the head of the calf has crossed the line.

Contestants must enter the scoring box through the front, between the two scorers. If they enter the scoring box from the rear, side or behind the scorers, they will not be scored.

8. There will be no fewer than 8 judges appointed per performance.

CALF SCRAMBLE FINALS

- 1. Contestants for the finals will be the first-place contestants from the prior 16 performance nights.
- 2. Alternates for the finals will be the second and third place contestants from the prior 16 performance nights.
- **3.** There will be 24 contestants for the Finals Performance. The first-place contestants from the prior 16 performance nights will be the first 16 contestants. The final spots will be randomly selected at roll call on Finals night from alternates. Any open spots from cancellations of first place contestants will be filled by randomly selected alternates.
- **4.** Contestants that compete in the finals performance will be eligible to receive an additional tiered premium, based on the position you finish in the finals.

- **5.** Contestants winning the premiums must complete all aspects of the Calf Scramble program prior to receiving the premiums. Contestants who fail to fulfill all or part of the obligations as listed in Purchase Certificate Rules will result in the revocation of all rights to the Purchase Certificate and premiums as well as possible repayment of all or part of the value of the Purchase Certificate to S.A.L.E.
- **6.** Premiums for contestants, who fully complete the Calf Scramble program, will be issued by March 31, 2025.

2024 PURCHASE CERTIFICATE RULES

- 1. The 2024 S.A.L.E. Purchase Certificate total value is \$1,500.00. This Purchase Certificate may be used to purchase <u>registered</u> animals in only one of the following Junior Breeding Departments: Junior Breeding Heifers, Junior Dairy, Junior Breeding Sheep & Goats, or Junior Purebred Gilt. Exhibitors may <u>not</u> purchase a Crossbred Gilt, Commercial Ewe or Commercial Doe with the certificate.
 - **a.** Contestants who fulfill all obligations as listed in Purchase Certificate Rules, will receive an additional \$500 premium to offset project expenses.
 - **b.** Premiums for these contestants will be issued by March 31, 2025.
- 2. Animals purchased must be approved by the Contestant's AST or CEA. Exhibitors are required to enter and show all animals purchased with this certificate at the 2025 San Antonio Stock & Rodeo in the respective Junior Breeding Show as the Exhibitor's 4-H or FFA project(s).
- **3.** Purchase, delivery, possession, and registration transfer into Contestant's name must all take place before the required date as listed below:

Registered Breeding Sheep and Boer Breeding Goats:

October 1, 2024

Registered Breeding Beef, Dairy, and Angora Goats:

November 1, 2024

Registered Breeding Gilt:

December 1, 2024

- 4. Contestants may NOT purchase animals from themselves, a person to whom they are related by blood or marriage, an entity or ranch in which they or any such related person owns or holds any interest, or their AST or CEA. This is to include animals which were previously owned or bred by Contestant or any of such persons and entities.
- 5. If animal(s) is/are purchased for less than the S.A.L.E. Purchase Certificate amount, a check will be issued to the seller for the actual cost of the animal(s). Under any circumstance, checks will NOT be issued to the Contestant, 4-H Club, FFA Chapter, AST or CEA or Contestant's parents. Payment will be made to the seller after the completed Purchase Certificate and Original transferred registration paper are received.
- 6. Contestants may combine the S.A.L.E. Purchase Certificate with Calf Scramble Purchase Certificates from other major shows. If combining certificates, those shows (ex. Fort Worth, Houston) should be designated on the S.A.L.E. Purchase Certificate. The original registration papers must be sent to the show that is earliest in the calendar year. The earliest show will make copies of the original registration papers and then forward the original registration papers to the later shows. The original registration papers will be held by the last show until the contestant's Calf Scramble requirements are met.

7. Contestants are required to:

- **a.** Email a copy of the Thank You letter sent to the sponsor to the S.A.L.E. Calf Scramble Office no later than April 15, 2024.
 - Purchase Certificate will not be mailed until a copy of the Thank You letter is received in the Calf Scramble Office.
 - ii. Purchase Certificate will be mailed out by April 15, 2024, if the thank you letter has been received.

UPDATED

- b. Submit the Original S.A.L.E. Purchase Certificate along with the Original Registration Papers showing the Exhibitor as the current, sole owner to the Calf Scramble Office at your earliest convenience, but no later than December 15, 2024. Refer to Purchase Certificate Rule 3 for transfer and ownership deadlines for each species. Once the completed Purchase Certificate has been submitted, a stamped copy of the registration paper(s) will be emailed to the contestant. If this information is not received within three weeks of submission, please contact the Calf Scramble Office. The stamped copy of the registration paper should be accepted at prospect and/or major shows throughout the year.
- c. Submit appropriate show entry materials through the AST or CEA by December 1, 2024.
- **d.** The Official Calf Scramble Reports, found at www.sassr.zsuite.org must be submitted on the website by the 10th of each month (June January) and is required by each recipient.

UPDATED

- e. Reports will be submitted as a Final Report Book no later than January 10, 2025. The final report book will be submitted on www.sassr.zsuite.org.
- f. All animals purchased with a S.A.L.E. Purchase Certificate must be entered and shown at the 2025 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo as the contestant's 4-H or FFA project(s) in the respective Junior Breeding Show. If any Calf Scramble requirements have not been met, then the animal may become ineligible to show at the 2025 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.
- **g.** If all Calf Scramble program requirements have been fulfilled, the original registration papers will be mailed to the contestant by April 15, 2025.
- h. Please refer to the website, www.sarodeo.com, for important news and updates throughout the year.

- 8. Contestants who fail to fulfill all obligations as listed in these rules may result in the revocation of all rights to the Purchase Certificate, additional premiums, possibly re-pay all or part of the certificate value to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo and will be required to write a letter to the sponsor and the Calf Scramble Committee. Failure to comply with these rules could also result in forfeiture of Calf Scramble entries for one year for that club/chapter. If repayment is not made within 30 days of the 2025 Show, San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo reserves the right to revoke invitations to participate in future San Antonio Livestock Shows. Contestants ineligible to show at the 2025 San Antonio Livestock Show will be required to re-pay the certificate value to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.
- **9.** In addition to the rules and regulations listed, contestants are required to follow the guidelines as listed in the 2025 Competitive Events Premium List.

The Texas 4-H Food Challenge Guidelines can be accessed at http://texas4-h.tamu.edu/projects/food-nutrition/.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout. Contestants are limited to one individual entry.
- 2. Eligibility: Contestants must meet all Junior Show Rule Requirements. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to CEAs, ASTs and CTE/STEM Directors in charge of 4-H Clubs, FFA programs or High School CTE/STEM Programs, respectively, the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Food Challenge, subject to these rules. The Food Challenge is also an invitational contest to statewide CTE/STEM programs. Entries must be approved through the entry system by the exhibitors' respective CEA or AST or CTE/STEM director. Contestants must be bona fide members of a Texas 4-H Club, Texas FFA Chapter or a student of a Texas high school. They must be enrolled in and attending public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at the time of the event.



- 3. Teams: THIS CONTEST WILL MOVE TO A TEAM CONTEST IN 2025. Each team will consist of at least three (3) and no more than four (4) members. Team members may only compete on one team.
- 4. Age Divisions: The contest will be divided into two age divisions. Age as of August 31, 2023.
 - a. Junior (Individual Competition) Ages 8-13
 - **b.** Senior (Individual Competition) Ages 14-18
- **5. Assigned Cook Time:** Contestants will be notified of their assigned cook time and must check-in at least 30 minutes prior to their assigned cook time.
- **6. Contest Format:** Contestants will be randomly assigned to a contest category (see categories below). The first-place contestant in each category will advance to the final challenge.
- 7. Rules of Play: The following is a summary of the contest procedure and rules:
 - a. Preparation: Contestants are challenged with creating their own recipe with the ingredients provided. Each contestant will create an entire dish/recipe (not a full meal) using the provided key ingredient and grocery store items. The "grocery store" will include items commonly found in stores such as produce, canned goods, crackers, dairy products, etc. Contestants must select and use at least two additional items and will be provided the maximum number of items that can be selected during orientation. Dishes/recipes created should include two or more servings. Contestants should not create side or multiple dishes with their ingredients/grocery store items
 - **b.** *Nutrition*/*Resources:* Each station will have a variety of nutrition resources/references. Each contestant should highlight key nutrients in his/her dish and their functions during their presentation.
 - **c.** *Presentation:* After the preparation time, each contestant will give a 5-minute presentation to a panel of judges. Contestants should present the entire dish/recipe to the judges and communicate during their presentation what an individual serving size should be. Contestants will be responsible for determining the number of servings their dish provides.

- 8. Time: Each contestant will have 40 minutes for the preparation portion of the contest (prepare a dish, plan a presentation, and clean up their assigned preparation area). Five (5) minutes are allowed for the oral presentation, followed by three (3) minutes for judges' questions.
- 9. Question/Answer Period: At the conclusion of each contestant's presentation, judges will have three (3) minutes to ask questions of the contestant related to the dish prepared and knowledge of nutrition, food safety and food preparation.

UPDATED

- **10. Supplies:** Each contestant must supply their own equipment for the Food Challenge. No sharing of equipment among contestants. Contestants may only bring the supplies listed in the official supply box list (see below). Supply boxes may be checked by contest officials. Contestants should plan to not have access to a kitchen facility and, therefore, should plan to clean supplies upon returning home from the contest.
- 11. Pantry Ingredients: Each contestant may include in their equipment box the following "pantry" ingredients which they may use when preparing their dish, if desired. There is no requirement to use these items, nor is it mandatory that contestants include these in their supply box. Salt, Pepper, Oil (up to 17 oz), 1 jar chicken bouillon, 1 medium onion, 2 cans vegetables and/or fruit (up to 16 oz) contestant choice, rice (white or brown) or pasta (16 oz) contestant choice. * rice/pasta must be uncooked and Cornstarch (up to 1 lb.) or Flour (up to 1 lb.) contestant choice.
- **12. Dress Attire:** Each contestant will have the option of wearing coordinated clothing and/or aprons. Contestants must wear closed toe shoes and a hair restraint.
- **13. Finished Dishes:** Finished dishes MAY NOT leave the preparation/judging areas. Dishes must be discarded after contestants complete the judging process to ensure contestants in following heats do not see what ingredients are available to gain an advantage.
- **14. Categories:** There will be four food categories in each age division: Appetizer, Main Dish, Side Dish and Healthy Dessert. Contestants will be randomly assigned to a category, which will not be announced until the day of the contest.
- 15. Key Ingredient: Each contestant will receive an information sheet with their contest category and "key" ingredient for that category (no ingredient amounts, recipe or instructions will be provided at the station). The "key" ingredient will be representative of one of the following categories as noted above (#14). Contestants will have access to a "grocery store" of additional ingredients to "select" and combine with the contestant's "key" ingredient to create an original recipe/dish during the contest. Contestants must select at least two additional ingredients.
- **16. Scholarships:** Refer to the Junior Livestock Show Scholarship section of the 2024 Competitive Events Premium List.

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JUNIOR JUDGING CONTESTS

ENTRY DEADLINE: DECEMBER 1, 2023

These contests are subject to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo General Rules, the Junior Livestock Show Rules and Special Rules listed in this section.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Entry: Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout.
- 2. Eligibility: Contestants must meet all Junior Show Rule Requirements. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to CEAs, ASTs and CTE/STEM Directors in charge of 4-H Clubs, FFA programs or High School CTE/STEM Programs, respectively, the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Junior Judging Contests, subject to these rules. Consumer Decision Making, Dairy Judging, Floriculture, Nursery/Landscape, Poultry, Wildlife, and Wool Judging are also invitational contests to statewide CTE/STEM programs. Horse, Livestock and Meats will ONLY remain open to 4-H/FFA programs. Entries in these contests must be submitted in the name of the county 4-H club, FFA chapter or Bexar County high school by the respective CEA or AST or CTE teacher. Entries in the Agrobotics Challenge must be submitted in the name of the county 4-H club, FFA chapter or high school by the respective CEA or AST or CTE/STEM director. Contestants must be bona fide members of a Texas 4-H Club, Texas FFA Chapter or a student of a Texas high school. They must be enrolled in and attending public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at the time of the event. One to four members may constitute a team. The three high scores will determine the teams' score. Team members are eligible for individual awards. All team members must be in good standing with their organizations.
- 3. Participation: Only contestants officially entered in the contest may participate.
- 4. Contestant/Team: Contestants making up a team must be from the same chapter or county; teams consisting of contestants from different chapters or counties (mixed teams) will be disqualified and not eligible for team awards. All contestants on the 'disqualified' team will also be disqualified and not eligible for individual awards.
 - Teams that have more active participants than are allowed in a given event shall be disqualified once it is verified by event officials that the additional members are from the chapter or county in question.
- 5. Individual/Team Number: Contestants are to use the team or individual number provided at the registration site by the S.A.L.E. contest superintendent. Contestants marking team numbers other than the number provided by S.A.L.E. or numbers that are unreadable by the scanner will be disqualified. The use of state assigned FFA and County numbers is <u>not</u> acceptable and will be disqualified.
- 6. Scantron care: Individual contestants are responsible for providing accurate scoring information on each scan sheet including the S.A.L.E. provided team or individual number. Individual contestants are responsible for keeping the scan sheet free of stray marks, and protected from being torn, folded, creased or mishandled in such a way that the scanner is unable to read the marks. Contest officials will not correct, enter or change ANY scan sheet marks or errors. Scan sheets that have been mishandled by the contestant or unreadable by the scanner will not be scanned and scored.
 - Contest superintendents may opt to create a 'Disqualification' file so scores may be accessible by coaches.
- 7. **Disqualification:** While a contest is in progress, there will be no use of electronic devices (smart watches, cell phones, etc.), talking or unethical communication between contestants or audience. Violating this rule may cause the contestant and the team to be disqualified and ineligible to receive awards. - Boneless further-processed poultry meat products (50 points, no reasons)

- 1. Divisions: All contestants will compete in one division.
- 2. Classes: Contestants will judge four wool classes and 20 grading fleeces.

Evaluation for fineness, length, and yield will be done on the scan sheet. Students will be given 30 minutes to evaluate 20 fleeces (at least one minute per fleece, based on provider preference.) Each fleece is worth 10 points. Correct checks receive 4 points for fineness, 2 points for length, and 4 points for yield. Fineness will be determined according to the Spinning Counts. Correct answer will receive full credit of 4 points, answers that

are one fineness away will receive 2 points, and answers more than one fineness away will receive 0 points. Length will be classified as staple, French combing or clothing. Staple lengths will also be pulled and attached to a paper background and mounted on card stock for staple length. This is the only staple that should be analyzed to determine staple length. Correct answers will receive 2 points any incorrect answer will receive 0 points. Students will write in a percentage for yield any answer within 4% will receive full credit of 4 points. Any answer within 5% to 8% will receive 2 points. 9% or more away 0 points. The use of any type of measuring device will not be allowed, including markings on hands or other body parts or attire. Mishandling of fleeces will cause a contestant to be disqualified.

Four classes of four fleeces each will be placed and questions will be asked on each class (two breeds and two commercial). The wool placing and questions will be scored on scan sheet. Students will be given 15 minutes to place and fill out reasons on each class. The highest possible placing score for a class is 50 points and the highest possible questions score for a class is 50 points, making a total possible score of 100 points for each class. See sample of wool placing and questions sheet (in Resources). For questions, the student must list the number of the fleece, which matches the fleece description. Students must use only one number for each description. Officials have the option of giving credit for more than one answer for a particular description if they think the fleeces are equal. Three points are deducted for each incorrect answer in determining questions score. The list posted below will be the questions that must be completed. The use of any type of measuring device will not be allowed, including markings on hands or other body parts or attire. Mishandling of fleeces will cause a contestant to be disqualified.

- **3. Materials:** Scantrons will be provided by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. The official scantron will be Wool #528-5. Students should know how to use scantrons and forms properly before coming to the contest. Each contestant is required to bring two #2 pencils and one clipboard.
- **4. Social Security Number Requirement**: Exhibitors/Contestants offered a scholarship must provide their Social Security Number to show management upon request in order to fully qualify for funding.
- **5. Registration Forms:** Team registration forms are available <u>here</u>. Coaches are encouraged to bring completed forms to the registration table the day of the respective contest in order to expedite registration.

SPECIAL RULES

- 1. Entry: The entry fee for each team is \$75.00. Entries and payment must be submitted online and any necessary official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo forms must be completed. 4-H Clubs/FFA Chapters may submit a check if selected at entry checkout.
- 2. Eligibility: Contestants must meet all Junior Show Rule Requirements. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo makes available to CEAs, ASTs and CTE/STEM Directors in charge of 4-H Clubs, FFA programs or High School CTE/STEM Programs, respectively, the opportunity to enter members of their programs in the Landscape Challenge, subject to these rules. The Landscape Challenge is also an invitational contest to statewide CTE/STEM programs. Entries in the Landscape Challenge must be submitted in the name of the county 4-H club, FFA chapter or high school by the respective CEA or AST or CTE/STEM director. Contestants must be bona fide members of a Texas 4-H Club, Texas FFA Chapter or a student of a Texas high school. They must be enrolled in and attending public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at the time of the event.

UPDATED

- **3. Teams:** Entries must be made in the name of the FFA Chapter or County 4-H Club. <u>Teams are comprised of a minimum of four (4) or a maximum of six (6) students.</u> Must list team member names on project plans. All teams will compete in one age division. There is no limit on the number of entries entered per club/chapter, but a member of the club/chapter/CTE-STEM Program may not participate on more than one team.
- 4. Materials and Supplies: For the Final Challenge, contestants should bring a clipboard, calculator and two #2 pencils. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo will provide one wheelbarrow, shovel, rake and gloves for the team. Each 10 X 10 planter will contain mulch for the contestants to spread out along with specific plant material. Please note: No additional outside materials or design elements are allowed to be included in the final design. (All plots will remain during the entire San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo and will be watered by volunteers.)

- 5. Disqualification: While a contest is in progress, there will be no use of electronic devices (cell phones, etc.), talking or unethical communication between teams and audience. Violating this rule may cause the contestant and the team to be disqualified and ineligible to receive awards. Challenge Overview

- a) **Objective:** This challenge is meant to promote landscape design knowledge and professionalism to youth by simulating a real-life interaction between customer and landscape professional. Additionally, the challenge will serve to educate the public on the value of landscaping by beautifying the grounds.
- b) **Contest Format:** This challenge will be broken into two parts:

- **Project Plans:** Teams will submit one (1) completed Project Plan in accordance to the rules and requirements listed below. Project Plans must be submitted via www.sarodeo.com by December 15, 2023. The title for the email should read "Landscape Challenge-Club/Chapter Name." Plans not meeting all required documentation and/or submitted after the December 15, 2023, deadline will not be considered.
- Final Challenge: The top 8 placing Project Plan submissions will advance to the Final Challenge held
 during the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Final Challenge qualifiers should be prepared to install
 their Project Plans. However, contestants may be exposed to certain alterations in the Customer
 Objectives or Design Materials during the Final Challenge. Instructions will be given during the Final
 Challenge Orientation.



Project Plans

- a) **Project Plan Overview:** Team members will submit one (1) Project Plan based off of Customer Objectives. Plan must be completed in its entirety to be considered for the Final Challenge. The Project Plan should consider the landscape plot in <u>full sun.</u>
- b) Customer Objectives:
 - i. You are a commercial landscaper who has been awarded a bid to install landscaping at the front entrance of an office building for a new tech firm located in Central Texas. This company prides itself on sustainability and as a client wants your landscape firm to include elements of water-saving plants, xeriscaping and if possible, attract pollinators. Curb appeal is extremely important to this tech company's brand, so this landscape design needs to attract their customers. This front entrance is full sun. Right now, this location is experiencing a severe drought with impending water restrictions so designing with the right plants and materials will be key.
- c) Complete Job Site Description: The front entrance is 10'x10', full sun. You can see the front entrance from the street and the company plans on taking photos once the landscape project is done to add it to their online google maps listing.
- d) Plot Description: Project Plan should be based on a 10' x 10' (100 square ft.) landscape plot.
- e) **Documentation:** Project Plan should include the following documentation:
 - i. Customer Objectives Report: Detailed outline explaining how the proposed Project Plan meets the Customer Objectives. Include any relevant information that would help the customer understand why the Project Plan satisfies their goals. This is to be essay/paragraph format, at least 200 words.
 - **ii. Sketch:** Legible landscape design drawing representing the intended layout of the plot which could easily be understood by the customer.
 - iii. Installation Report: Step-by-step process on how the Project Plan will be installed from the beginning to end. Provide explanation for the order of the steps, when applicable. Give the customer an estimate of how long it will take to complete the install (Max = 90 min.).
- f) **Design Materials:** See the list below outlining available design materials for the Project Plan. Contestants must take into consideration the Customer Objectives when deciding on which design materials to incorporate into their plot. Team members should outline their decision-making process on which design materials to use within the Customer Objectives Report for the Project Plan.

- 1. Entry: An entry fee of \$10 per entry made payable to S.A.L.E. is required. Entries must be submitted online, and official San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo entry forms must be completed. Exhibitors may only enter 2 photographs per class for a total of 30 entries per exhibitor. Photos entered in the State 4-H Photography contest may be entered in this contest. Photographs must be taken between the dates of November 2022 and Entry Deadline of December 1, 2023. Once entered, entries must be uploaded online at https://www.sarodeo.com/p/competitive-events/contests.
- 2. Eligibility: To be eligible, boys or girls must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at time of show; be between the ages of 9 and 18 on August 31, 2023 or be between 8 and in the third grade and 18 on August 31, 2023, and be bona fide residents of the State of Texas.
 - a. **Age Divisions** (Age as of August 31, 2023)
 - i. Junior: 8 (and in the 3^{rd} grade) 10 years
 - ii. Intermediate: 11- 13 years
 - **iii. Senior:** 14 18 years
- 3. Division/Classes: The following Division/Classes and descriptions are active for the 2024 Photography Contest

a. LIVING THINGS DIVISION

- i. PEOPLE: Photos focus from all walks of life, parenting and family, children, babies, models/fashion, sports, and couples. All individuals in the photos must have provided consent and permission as a subject. If requested, a release will be needed from the photographer and subject. Examples: Babies, families, kids, portraits, models/fashion, etc.
- ii. ANIMALS-WILDLIFE: Category focuses on animals not tamed or domesticated and commonly found in the wild throughout the country and world. Photos can be of wildlife in nature, zoos, and/or petting zoos. Examples include: Birds, deer, elephants, snakes, whales, etc.
- iii. ANIMALS-DOMESTIC: Photos focusing on the various animals that have been tamed and made fit for interaction in a human environment. To be considered domesticated, the animals must have their behavior, life cycle, or physiology systemically altered as a result of being under human control for many generations. Examples include: Chickens, cows, dogs, cats, hamsters, horses, pigs, sheep, goats, etc. All waterfowl (ducks and geese) should be entered in Animals Wildlife

b. THE LAND DIVISION

- i. FOOD: Category is a still life specialization of photography, aimed at producing attractive photographs of food for use in such items of advertisements, packaging, menus, and/or cookbooks. PHOTOS OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE PROHIBITED. Examples include: Thanksgiving dinner, cakes/pies, fruits and place settings, Easter eggs, sandwiches, ingredients, etc.
- ii. TRAVEL & PLACE: Category includes images that express the joys and adventures of travel photography, showcasing place as an important part of the photo. This category can include historic buildings, ruins, islands, any subject you might encounter while traveling, as long as the photo expresses a sense of PLACE. Not Allowed: Photos in the travel & place category cannot be entered into other categories (nature /landscape, but may be similar, however, photos in this category must depict traveling and experiencing other parts of the world. Examples: Disney World/Land, Roman Ruins, Great Wall of China.

- **iii. NATURE & LANDSCAPE:** The focus of this category includes landscapes, outdoor sceneries, nature images, sunsets, urban landscapes, seascapes, cityscapes, and farms. Images focus on the beauty of the outdoors. *Examples include: Landscapes, Sceneries, Outdoors*
- iv. PLANT/FLORA: Photos of interesting, unique, and beautiful flowers and flora. Photography can occur outdoors or indoors. Photo subject should be that of a single flower, plant, bush, tree, etc. Large collections of plant/flora should be considered for entry into the Nature & Landscape category. Examples include: a rose, upward shot of a tree, a flower bouquet, etc.

c. TECHNICAL DIVISION

- i. **DETAILS & MACRO:** Getting in close is the name of the game for this category. We welcome pictures of small details that suggest a larger story. This is also the place for macro photographs (although a macro image of a flower might equally go into the Plant/Flora category). Examples include: detail of a knot, a lock, or an abstract close up anything as long as it is tight composition of a detail. Macro examples include flowers, insects, stamps, ice crystals, etc.
- ii. **DIGITAL DARKROOM:** Photos are for digital art images created or drastically altered in software like Adobe Photoshop. Although digitally manipulated images are also allowed in the other categories, this is a category exclusively showcasing such art. If the digital darkroom is the main attraction of the photo, or plays a big part, enter it here. Examples include: Photoshop composites and creations, images greatly manipulated with a variety of filters, photos with artistic borders, photos stitched into a panoramic.
- iii. ELEMENTS OF DESIGN: Images use of graphic elements of design. Photos that showcase line, shape, pattern, form, texture, perspective, etc. Photo can consist of any subject matter. Category is not for graphic illustrations made in commercial programs (i.e. Adobe Illustrator) nor for extreme digital creations. Examples include: Perspective, Line, Pattern
- iv. NIGHT PHOTOGRAPHY: Photos taken outdoors between dusk and dawn. Generally these photos are achieved by using artificial light or using a long exposure. This category can include any subject as the focus should be on the skill and technique used to acquire the photograph. Examples include: buildings/structures, animals, plant/flora, people, etc.

d. SPORTING DIVISION

- i. **RODEO:** Photos taken of all types of rodeo events. Examples include: cowboys or cowgirls, competitions, livestock, crowds, buildings, fairgrounds, etc.
- **ii. MOTION/ACTION:** The capture of movement within a single photo. NOT ALLOWED: Photos which would clearly fit into another category, such as sports. *Examples: Horse Running across field/pasture, Ferris Wheel Spinning.*
- iii. **SPORTS:** Photos that captures individual or team sports. Can be either professional or amateur (human) and the focus could be on the sportsperson, the sport environment, the effort expended, or the conflict/rewards. Must reflect a strong message. *Examples: Gymnast, Football player or team, Swimming.*
- iv. CATCH ALL: Category for photos that DO NOT CLEARLY FIT into one of the other categories. NOT ALLOWED: A photo that can clearly be submitted in another photography category. Catch All is not intended for the use to eliminate duplicate/multiple photos from Contestants. Examples include: Polaroid image & emulsion transfers, still-live, long exposure zoomed images, painting with light.

- **4. Entry Disqualification:** Entries that do not follow rules or category descriptions and guidelines are subject to automatic disqualification:
 - a. Photographs uploaded after December 1st, 2023
 - b. Photographs that are entered into the incorrect category

Model, Liability, and Property Releases: The submission of a photograph acknowledges that the photographer has obtained any and all required written permission of any recognizable locations or people appearing in their photograph(s).  - To be eligible, boys or girls must be enrolled in, and attending, public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at time of show; be between the ages of 9 and 18 on August 31, 2023 or be between 8 (and in the third grade) and 18 on August 31, 2023, and be bona fide residents of the State of Texas.
 - Exhibitors must be bona fide members of a Texas County 4-H Club or Texas FFA Chapter.
 - All exhibitors and contestants must have a personal Social Security Number to be eligible to participate in the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. <u>Exhibitors/Contestants offered a scholarship must provide their Social Security Number to show management upon request to fully qualify for funding.</u>
 - Junior exhibitors and contestants suspended under Texas Education Code 33.081 "No Pass, No Play" are ineligible to participate in any San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Junior Livestock Show activity, event, or competition.

In addition, contestants must have competed in a minimum of one of the following in order to be eligible to enter the 2024 Junior Shoot-Out.

- i. Texas 4-H Shooting Sports shotgun competitions prior to January 31, 2024.
- ii. 2023 San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo Junior Shoot-Out
- iii. Texas Agriculture Science Clay Target Shooting Competitions (381 AG Clays) within the 2023 calendar year.

New contestants enrolled in the 2023-2024 Texas County 4-H Club or a Texas FFA Chapter must attend one Qualifying Shotgun Club competition prior to January 31, 2024 to complete 2024 Junior Shoot-Out eligibility requirements.

A Qualifying Shotgun Club competition is defined as:

- i. Sponsored, organized, and ran by one or more FFA/4-H shooting sports clubs (or approved affiliate).
- ii. Have two or more 4-H or FFA shotgun shooting sports clubs represented in competition.
- iii. Follows 4-H or 381 AG Clay's rules.

- 3. Side Event Entry: In addition to the Junior Shoot-Out Trap Event, Junior Shoot-Out Sporting Clays Event, and Junior Shoot-Out American Trap Doubles Event, there are additional shooting competitions open to Junior Shoot-Out Contestants, Adult Participants, Collegiate Participants, and Youth Participants. Side event rules and entry information will be available at_www.sarodeo.com after January 1, 2024.
- **4. Check-In**: Junior Shoot-Out and Youth Participants must check-in at the Registration Building at NSC prior to orientation to receive their ID Badge. The ID Badge must be brought to orientation and must be displayed at all times during the event.
- 5. Orientation: Orientation is required and consists of a Safety Meeting. Orientation will be held in the Safety Meeting tent by the stadium field every hour or on an as needed basis. Each Junior Shoot-Out Contestant, Adult Participant, Collegiate Participant and Youth Participant must obtain their ID Badge and verification of attendance at a safety meeting prior to any shooting at NSC. One safety meeting attendance will permit a Junior Shoot-Out Contestant and Youth Participant to shoot every day of the event. Junior Shoot-Out Contestants and Youth Participants without verification of attendance will NOT be permitted to shoot until attendance to Safety Orientation is verified. Orientation times can be found in the Junior Shoot-Out schedule.

- 6. Adult and Collegiate Participant Orientation: Adult Participants and Collegiate Participants must attend a Safety Meeting prior to shooting at NSC. <u>One</u> Safety Meeting attendance will permit an Adult Participant or Collegiate Participant to shoot every day of the event. Orientations will be held in conjunction with Junior Shoot-Out Contestants and Youth Participants.
- 7. Squadding: Squadding for all events will be done at the discretion of Junior Shoot-Out management. With no guarantee, special requests will be considered and accommodated, when possible, for those with other SALE conflicts. Squadding will be posted on or before January 15, 2024 online at www.nationalshootingcomplex.com and the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo website, www.sarodeo.com. Contestants and Participants should check periodically, as updates or changes may be made. All squadding inquiries should be directed to Royce Graff at regraff@nssa-nsca.com. Contestants and Participants should report to the appropriate location approximately 30 to 45 minutes prior to their scheduled time. Contestants or Participants missing their appointed shooting times should contact the Shoot Coordinator.
- **8. Practice**: The following practice times are available for Contestants and Participants at the NSC. *Practice targets are not included in the registration fee and will be an additional expense.
 - Wednesday, February 14 from 1 P.M. to 8 P.M. Trap, Sporting Clays and American Trap Doubles
 - Thursday, February 15 from 8 A.M. to 8 P.M. Trap, Sporting Clays and American Trap Doubles
 - Friday, February 16 from 9 A.M. to 6:30 P.M. Sporting Clays and Trap
 - Saturday, February 17 from 9 A.M. to 2 P.M. Sporting Clays and Trap
- 9. Official Scores: The official score is the record kept by the referee/scorer on a sheet furnished to them by Management. The referee/scorer's decision on whether a target is dead or lost is final. All reported scores are checked for accuracy and corrections will be made when required. Junior Shoot-Out Management maintains the objective of producing timely, accurate and complete scoring records for each event. They do not represent any club, county, team, or individual. The NSC, via the Shoot Coordinator, will be responsible for conducting all aspects of the event pertaining to "shooting" including, but not limited to squadding, scoring, posting of scores, determination and conducting shoot-offs, determination of winners, and rules interpretation.
- 10. Appeals: A Contestant may appeal a dead/lost ruling on the field if he/she feels a referee has missed a call. Once the Contestant has changed posts or exited the shooting cage, such right of appeal is lost. The referee may seek assistance from the official scorer or may poll the squad at his or her discretion. The decision of the referee regarding dead or lost targets on the field is final and not subject to further appeal. A parent or coach's score is not an official score and will not be consulted.
- 11. Protests: Only Contestants may protest any perceived injustice, violation of the rules, or other circumstances that may have resulted in placing them at a disadvantage relative to other Contestants. Such conditions must be reported to the field referee immediately. If satisfaction is not obtained, the situation should be reported immediately to the Shoot Coordinator or Chief Referee. If resolution is not reached at this point, the Contestant only has the right to present a written protest with a non-refundable \$20.00 protest fee to the Chief Referee or Shoot Coordinator within one (1) hour of the time their squad has finished, or score was posted. The Protest Jury will investigate and reach final resolution of the matter as soon as possible considering all circumstances. Results of all protests are final and will be reported to the Contestant. The names of the Chief Referee, Shoot Coordinator and Protest Jury members will be posted at the shoot.
- **12. Equipment**: Any 12 gauge or smaller fired from the shoulder shotgun, which conforms to governing body rules, will be allowed.
 - Ammunition FACTORY AMMUNITION ONLY NO RELOADS Contestants must furnish their own appropriate ammunition which conforms to governing body rules. It is vitally important to allow extra ammunition for practice rounds, shoot-offs, malfunctions or other contingencies. Ammunition is subject to inspection and verification. Ammunition will be for sale at the NSC Pro Shop.
 - i. No load may contain more than 1-1/8 of shot.
 - ii. No load may contain any shot larger than Number 7-1/2 for lead and Number 7 for steel.
- 13. Safety: All range safety rules will be strictly enforced. Any Contestant or Participant failing to conform to safety standards will be warned or disqualified from the event. Minor infractions will be noted and marked on the Contestant's or Participant's badge. Repeated infractions or major safety violations will result in disqualification from the event.

All persons on or near the trap firing line or on the sporting clays course or inside the rail fence in the stadium field during shooting are required to wear eye protection. Shooting glasses or equivalent prescription glasses are required.

All persons on or near the trap firing line or on the sporting clays course or inside the rail fence in the stadium field during shooting are required to use hearing protection. Ear plugs or earmuffs are required. Electronic devices, other than those specifically designed for hearing protection only, are forbidden on the shooting field forward of the safe line. This includes, but is not limited to radios, CD players, MP3's, walkie-talkies and cell phones either wired or wireless.

All firearms will remain open and empty until the Contestant or Participant is on the shooting station/cage. The gun must be open and empty before leaving the shooting station/cage. If carrying an over and under shotgun over your shoulder, the muzzles must be forward and under your control.

Contestants and Participants must maintain control of their muzzles at all times. Regardless of condition, muzzles may not be pointed toward or rested upon any part of the body of the Contestant, Participant or another person. This includes the use of toe pads. The only exception is the limited exposure required in changing chokes. Violation of this rule may result in a warning, disqualification from a round, or disqualification from a match.

- 14. Property/Security: All Contestants, Participants, or persons in charge of property, shall care for, guard, protect, and preserve same, as the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, NSCA, NSSA and NSC does not undertake to do so, and shall not be held responsible for any loss or damage to said property of Contestants or Participant thereof. All Contestants and Participants are responsible for security of their own property. The Contestant or Participant is the absolute insurer of and is responsible for the condition of their property. The San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, NSSA and NSC are not responsible for the acts of a third party.
- **15. Alcohol Policy**: No shooting allowed following the consumption of alcohol. No alcohol is allowed on shooting ranges. Consumption, use, and possession of alcohol by persons under the age of 21 is prohibited by law and is not permitted anywhere on the grounds at any time.
- **16. Drug Policy**: No shooting is allowed while under the influence of any drug or prescription medications that affects judgment and conduct to a degree that a Contestant or Participant is unsafe.
- 17. Tobacco Policy: No smoking (including the use of electronic cigarettes and vapes) is permitted on or near the firing lines or in any area where it would be considered inappropriate or in a situation where the smoke constitutes interference to Contestants or Participants. Use and possession of tobacco products (including smokeless) by minors is prohibited by law and is not permitted anywhere on the grounds at any time.
- 18. Dress Code: Contestants, Participants and spectators are required to dress appropriately. Both young people and adults should wear attire appropriate for the weather while remaining modest and socially acceptable. Contestants and Participants must wear a shirt with sleeves. Clothing deemed immodest or distracting to other Contestants or Participants will not be permitted. Eye and/or ear protection is required, and fully enclosed shoes must be worn for safety reasons by Contestants, Participants, and spectators.
- 19. Photographs: All photographs taken by the official photographer(s) become the property of the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. Unofficial (i.e., personal) photographs may not be published without written approval of Management. Contestants or Participants wishing to purchase photographs must contact the Official Photographer.

At no time will any photographer, personal or professional, be allowed to interfere with competition(s). This includes violating the designated boundaries rule (Firing Line Boundary) and/or altering the pace of competition for photography purposes. Any violation of this rule will be subject to appropriate actions, up to and including removal from the event, range, area, or grounds.

Commercial photography and filming are often conducted at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo. You may be depicted in photographs or video recordings of any San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo event, and by entering the grounds, NSC and/or competitive events associated with the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, you consent to the use of any depictions in connection with advertising, news reporting, public relations, webcasts or other broadcasts, or any other activities relating to the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, and you further release and waive all claims for compensation and any rights of review and approval, copyright, and right of publicity with respect thereto.

- **20. Firing Line Boundaries**: Spectators are not allowed beyond designated boundaries. The firing line boundary for trap is behind the gun rack/bench. The firing line boundary for sporting clays is per NSCA rules. Please respect these boundaries and the directions of officials. Failure to do so or argument with officials is considered unsportsmanlike conduct and will result in appropriate actions, up to and including removal from the event, range, area, or grounds.
- 21. Use of Two-way Radios: To assist us in range and match operations, only authorized persons are permitted to use two-way radios on the grounds. Any action by either youth or adults interfering with the frequencies in use imposes a safety hazard. Deliberate disruption of range communications by anyone at the event will be considered a safety violation and treated as such.
- 22. Coaching: Coaching during competition will not be permitted while Contestants and Participants are on the firing line. Coaching includes any communication between the coach, parent or other spectator and the Contestant or Participant, verbal or non-verbal (including any electronic and/or smart devices). The Contestant or Participant may request assistance from a Range Officer and the Range Officer may assign an assistant.
- **24. Electronic Devices**: Electronic devices, other than those specifically designed for hearing protection only, are forbidden on the shooting field forward of the safe line except by shoot personnel. This includes, but is not limited to radios, CD players, mp3's, walkie-talkies, cell phones, and smart watches. Any violation of this rule will be subject to appropriate actions, up to and including disqualification and/or removal from the event, range, area, or grounds.
- **25. Disruption**: Parents, coaches or other individuals should remain positive and supportive, being careful not to disrupt or exhibit behaviors deemed detrimental to Contestants, Participants or the operation of the match. Sanctions ranging from a warning to ejection from the grounds or disqualification of Contestants or Participants may be imposed for interference with the operation of the match or disruption of the events on a firing line or field.
- **26. Interference**: If any Contestant or Participant, in any way, whether in person or by agent, interferes with the judges during their adjudication, or shows any disrespect to them or the show or competition, they are subject to be penalized. Management may demand a proper apology from the Contestant or Participant, may exclude him/her from competition, bar him/her from the grounds/NSC, and may also withhold any prizes that may have been awarded.
- 27. Use of Drones: Drones are only allowed when operated by SALE/NSC approved personnel.

 total of 125 targets. All ties will be determined by a shoot-off.
- Lewis Class finalists start with a score of "zero" in the Finals Event. The winners for each Lewis Class will be

ATTACHMENT A - LEWIS CLASS SYSTEM

There will be six (6) Lewis Classes (Class one (1) being the top Class). The Lewis Class calculation format below governs the 2024 Junior Shoot-Out. All Contestants in any of the Top Gun Classes will not be included in the Lewis Class event. After all of the Contestants in the Top Gun Classes have been removed from the overall total, the remaining Contestant scores will be listed in descending order. The remaining Contestants represent the total Lewis Class number used in the following calculations. The list of Contestant's scores will be divided into classes by placing dividing lines (original line) based on the following calculation: Total number of Contestants in Lewis Class divided by number of classes. If the result is a whole number, it is the number of Contestants for each class.

In the event that the calculation does not end up as a whole number, the whole number portion of the result is the base number for each class. The remainder is to be multiplied by the number of classes. This will generate a remaining whole number that will be less than the total number of classes. This is the number of classes that need to have one (1) added to the base number, starting with the lowest class and then moving up. When an original line is placed between a number of tied scores, the Contestants will be reassigned as follows: Majority above the line, those Contestants below the line are moved above the line. Majority below the line, those Contestants above the line are moved below the line. Equal number above and below, those Contestants above the line are moved below the line. Only the lines with ties are moved. The original lines in all other classes remain as originally drawn. There is the possibility of having a significantly different number of Contestants for each class.

Contestants must be bona fide members of a Texas 4-H Club, Texas FFA Chapter or a student of a Texas high school. They must be enrolled in and attending public, private or home school elementary or secondary schools in Texas at the time of the event.
